

Callahan County's jobless rate drops to 4.2% in February 2016

The unemployment rate in Callahan County dropped onetenth of one percent to 4.2% in February 2016, according to jobless figures released Friday, March 25th by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in February 2015 was 4.0 percent.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 4.3% in January,

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 4.4% in December 2015, 4.4% in November, 4.3% in October, 4.2% in September 2015, 4.3% in August, 4.4% in July, 4.0% in June, 3.9% in May, 3.7% in April, 4.1% in March, 4.0% in February, according to the unemployment

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for February 2016 include: Brown, 4.1%; Coleman, 5.8%; Eastland, 5.1%; Jones, 5.2%; Runnels, 3.7%: Shackelford. 3.5%; Stephens, 4.9%; and Taylor County, 3.5%

The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 3.7% in February, 2016, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. The Abilene MSA Combined Labor Force is 75,600. There were 72,800 employed during February 2016, while 2,800 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of 3.7%.

The Abilene MSA reported the workforce was 75,200 in January, 2016. Total employment of 72,300 was reported in January 2016, while 2,900, or 3.8% were unemployed in January 2016.

Medical Giant to Add 975 Jobs in Move

DALLAS, TX (Dallas Morning News)-Medical industry giant McKesson Corporation will add 975 jobs in North Texas as part of a plan to consolidate offices in Irving. The San Francisco-based company, which distributes pharmaceuticals and medical products, is buying the former NEC Corporation of America office complex in Las Colinas. McKesson also will move 900 workers already in the Dallas-Fort Worth area to

the property.

McKesson said it plans to invest \$157 million in the new offices. McKesson senior vice president David Evanglista said, "Investing in this new, modern workspace will enable our associates to more effectively serve McKesson customers in the evolving health care industry." The state of Texas will provide a \$9.75 million Enterprise Fund grant to help pay for McKesson's move. The company plans to start moving into the Irving buildings late this year or in early 2017.

Pantex to Add Jobs

AMARILLO, TX (KFDA CB9 Channel 10)—Pantex is planning to add 300 new employees in the next few months. Due to increased demand to monitor the nation's nuclear stock pile, the National Nuclear Security Administration is increasing the workload at Pantex over the next few years. The company is aiming to hire a total of 650 new employees by the end of the fiscal year to handle the extra work. According to Steve Myers, a Pantex media relations spokesperson, having that many new, well-paying jobs at Pantex will have a positive impact on the local economy. Wayfair to Open New Cus-

tomer Service Center BRYAN, TX (BUSINESS WIRE)—Boston-based Wayfair Incorporated, one of the world's largest online destinations for home furnishings and decor, announced plans to open a new customer service center in Bryan, Texas.

Wayfair plans to hire approximately 450 employees in the new location as it scales operations to service its rapidly growing customer base.

"We look forward to expanding our operations to the Bryan-College Station area as we welcome new talent to our world-class customer service team," said James Savarese, Chief Operating Officer for Wayfair. The company selected the location based on the strong local talent pool, the community's thriving business community, and its proximity to Texas A&M University—a leading university for research and innovation. The Bryan service center is expected to open this spring. Wayfair has more than 3,250 full time employees globally.

Home Depot to Add Many Seasonal Jobs in Texas

AUSTIN, TX (San Antonio Business Journal)—Home Depot Inc plans to hire 585 people at 13 Austin-area stores as part of its annual ramp up for the busy spring season. Home Depot said it would hire 80,000 seasonal employees nationwide. The Atlanta-based home improvement retailer, with nearly 2,000 stores nationally, will also add seasonal jobs throughout Texas.

Home Depot plans to hire about 750 people in San Antonio, 1,800 in Dallas/Fort Worth. and 1,800 in Houston.

Black-tailed Jackrabbits

Many, if not most, Texas residents are astonished at the diversity of wildlife that inhabits this great state of ours. The vast majority of the hundreds of varieties of fauna that reside here are not easily recognizable to most Texans. However, there is a "big-eared" fellow is so familiar to most everyone that even a professional hockey team in west Texas has donned the name based on it, and that animal is the well-known Black-tailed Jackrabbit.

Black-tailed Jackrabbits (Lepus californicus) dwell within suitable habitats of almost the entire state of Texas, save for a small swath of land in the coastal southeast. It is far more abundant in the Trans-Pecos and Panhandle eco-regions. It is the only member of its genus to inhabit this state, although further analysis in DNA may ultimately show that there are actually two or more. Jackrabbits are the larger of the two genera of hares that occur in Texas. Adult. "jacks" may approach twenty four inches in total length, of which only four inches is the tail. Adult males can weigh as much as an astonishing nine pounds, although the average is usually between five and six pounds.

As the common name implies, this large hare can be described by the black-tipping of its ears. However, it is far more celebrated for not the coloration on the ears, but rather the size of the ears themselves. Unlike the other genera of rabbits found in this state which have small to modest-sized ears, this species almost looks laughable with its ears almost the size of its hind feet, approaching six inches or so. The body is rather drab, grayish to brown with light frostings of black. The underbelly is white, as is a narrow rings that encircles each eye. The short tail, just like the humongous ears, is decorated at the tip with a black patch. The back legs are long and lanky while the front legs, though gangly in appearance as well, are noticeably shorter. The eyes are large and are often colored a light yellow hue.







Completely devoted to her husband, Oveta Hobby served as a research editor for the Post before becoming executive vice-president in 1938. She also served on a variety of local cultural boards in Houston as well as president of the Texas League of Women Voters.

In 1943, she was asked by Gen. George Marshall to organize and lead the Women's Army Corps. This was the first American military organization designed specifically for women. The WAC trained women to fill vital service roles from drivers to telephone operators to clerks but would not serve in combat. Hobby led tens of thousands of women volunteers, eventually earning the rank of colonel and becoming the first woman to



Classic black state license plate now available

21 March 2016 (Austin, TX) - For the first time since 1968, a full black background license plate with white lettering is now available on the streets of Texas. My Plates, the official license plate vendor for the state of Texas proposed the Classic Black plate design for TxDMV Board approval last November. Following a unanimous approval, My Plates then had to reach 200 pre-orders in order to move the plate to production and final release.



Callahan County World War II Soldiers Honored in the Netherlands

Callahan County World of its liberation. War II Soldiers Raymond Tennison and James Rawson are immortalized among the thousands of white marble crosses row after row overlooking the American War Cemetery in the town of Margraten, the Netherlands. The markers are testimony to the sacrifices made by many young American men and women, who like Tennison and Rawson made the supreme sacrifice for the freedom of Europe during World War II.

Through The Faces of Margraten tribute in May of this year the Dutch will pay special tribute to these soldiers by decorating their more than 10,000 graves and names on the Walls of the Missing with personal photos of the soldiers. The project has started a quest to locate more soldiers' photos.

Photos are needed of two Callahan County soldiers, Raymond Tennison of Cross Plains, and James Rawson, whose address was just listed as Callahan County.

Photos can be submitted through the project's website, www.TheFacesOfMargraten. com. All submitted photos as well as other information on these soldiers can already be found in the foundation's Fields of Honor - Database. The photos will be placed next to the headstones from May 1-5, when the Netherlands observes the 71st anniversary

Since 1945, Dutch locals have adopted the graves of the soldiers buried in Margraten. Out of heartfelt respect and gratitude, the graves' adopters regularly visit the graves and decorate them with flowers. Many of the graves' adopters also continue to correspond with the families of soldiers back home in the United States. The care for the graves of their loved ones has been a comfort to many of these families and the foundation of long-lasting friendships between Dutch and American families.

Seventy-one years after the war, younger generations have taken up the responsibility to remember these soldiers. "When I speak to people they sometimes say that the youth no longer cares about the past and those who fought for their freedom. I do not believe that. Many young Dutch people show an interest in the war and continue to visit these cemeteries, and many, like me, have adopted a grave and are volunteers for The Faces of Margraten tribute. We will continue to remember those who made the ultimate sacrifice for many years to come," Vonk, 23 himself, concludes.





Are You Widening Home Plate? A Baseball Story Worth Reading

during the first week of January, 1996, more than 4,000 baseball coaches descended upon the Opryland Hotel for the 52nd annual ABCA convention. While I waited in line to register with the hotel staff. I heard other more veteran coaches rumbling about the lineup of speakers scheduled to present during the weekend. One name, in particular, kept resurfacing,

always with the same sentiment "John Scolinos is here? Oh man, worth every penny of my airfare."

Who is John Scolinos? wondered. No matter, I was just happy to be there.

In 1996 Coach Scolinos was 78 years old and five years retired from a college coaching careen that began in 1948. He shuffled to the stage to an impressive standing ovation, wearing dark polyester pants, a light blue shirt, and a string around his neck from which home plate hung -- a full-sized, stark-white home plate.

Seriously, I wondered, who is

this guy? After speaking for twenty-five minutes, not once mentioning the prop hanging around his neck, Coach Scolinos appeared to notice the snickering among some of the coaches. Even those who knew Coach Scolinos had to wonder exactly where he was going with this, or if he had simply forgotten about home plate since he'd gotten on stage.

Then, finally...

"You're probably all wondering why I'm wearing home plate around my neck. Or maybe you think I escaped from Camarillo State Hospital," he said, his voice growing irascible. I laughed along with the others, acknowledging the possibility. "No," he continued, "I may be old, but I'm not crazy. The reason I stand before you today is to share with you baseball people what I've learned in my home plate in my 78 years." Several hands went up when Scolinos asked how many Little League coaches were in

"Do you know how wide home plate is in Little League?" After a pause someone offered, "Seventeen inches?" more question than answer. "That's right," he said. "How about

the room.

coaches in the house?" Another long pause. "Seventeen inches?" came a guess from another reluctant

Babe Ruth? Any Babe Ruth

"That's right," said Scolinos. "Now, how many high school coaches do we have in the room?" Hundreds of hands shot up, as the pattern began to appear. "How wide is home plate in high school baseball?" "Seventeen inches," they said

sounding more confident. 'You're right!" Scolinos barked. "And you college coaches, how wide is home plate in college?"

"Seventeen inches!" we said, in unison.

"Any Minor League coaches here? How wide is home plate in pro ball?'

"Seventeen inches!" "RIGHT! And in the Major Leagues, how wide is home plate in the Major Leagues?" "Seventeen inches!"

"SEV-EN-TEEN INCHES!" he confirmed, his voice bellowing off the walls. "And what do they do with a Big League pitcher who can't throw the ball over seventeen inches?" Pause. "They send him to Pocatello!" he hollered, drawing raucous

"What they don't do is this: they don't say, 'Ah, that's okay, Jimmy. Your can't hit a seventeen-inch target? We'll make it eighteen inches, or nineteen inches. We'll make it twenty inches so you have a better chance of hitting it. If you can't hit that, let us know

life, what I've learned about so we can make it wider still, say twenty-five inches." Pause

.. what do we do when our best player shows up late to practice? When our team rules forbid facial hair and a guy shows up unshaven? What if he gets caught drinking? Do we hold him accountable? Or do we change the rules to fit him. do we widen home plate?

The chuckles gradually faded as four thousand coaches grew quiet, the fog lifting as the old coach's message began to unfold. He turned the plate toward himself and, using a Sharpie, began to draw something. When he turned it toward the crowd, point up, a house was revealed, complete with a freshly drawn door and two windows. "This is the problem in our homes today. With our marriages, with the way we parent our kids. With our discipline. We don't teach accountability to our kids, and there is no consequence for failing to meet standards. We widen the plate!"

Pause.

Then, to the point at the top of the house he added a small American flag. "This is the problem in our schools today. The quality of our education is going downhill fast and teachers have been stripped of the tools they need to be successful, and to educate and discipline our young people. We are allowing others to widen home plate! Where is that getting us?" Silence. He replaced the flag with a Cross.

'And this is the problem in the Church, where powerful people in positions of authority have taken advantage of young children, only to have such an atrocity swept under the rug for years. Our church leaders are widening home plate!

I was amazed. At a baseball convention where I expected to learn something about curveballs and bunting and

how to run better practices, I had learned something far more valuable. From an old man with home plate strung around his neck, I had learned something about life, about myself, about my own weaknesses an about my responsibilities as a leader. I had to hold myself and others accountable to that which I knew to be right, lest our families, our faith and our society continue down an

undesirable path. "If I am lucky," Coach Scolinos concluded, "you will remember one think from this old coach today. It is this: if we fail to hold ourselves to a higher standard, a standard of what we know to be right; if we fail to hold our spouses and our children to the same standards. if we are unwilling or unable to provide a consequence when they do not meet the standard; and if our schools and churches and our government fail to hold themselves accountable to those they serve, there is but one thing to look forward to ... "

With that, he held home plate in front of his chest, turned it around, and revealed its dark black backside

.. dark days ahead."

Coach Scolinos died in 2009 at the age of 91, but not before touching the lives of hundreds of players and coaches including mine. Meeting him at my first ABCA convention kept me returning year after year, looking for similar wisdom and inspiration from other coaches. He was the best clinic speaker the ABCA has ever known because he was so much more than a baseball coach.

His message was clear: "Coaches, keep your players - no matter how good they are -- your own children, and most of all yourself at seventeen
