



Callahan County's jobless rate stays unchanged at 3.9% in May

The unemployment rate in Callahan County stayed unchanged at 3.9% in May 2016, according to jobless figures released Friday, June 24th by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in May 2015 was also 3.9 percent. -

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 3.9% in April,

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 4.3% in March 2016, 4.2% in February, 4.2% in January 2016, 4.4% in December 2015, 4.4% in November, 4.3% in October, 4.2% in September 2015, 4.3% in August, 4.4% in July, and 4.0% in June, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for May 2016 include: Brown, 3.9%; Coleman, 6.2%; Eastland, 5.1%; Jones, 5.2%; Runnels, 3.6%; Shackelford, 4.2%; Stephens, 5.2%; and Taylor County, 3.5%.

The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 3.6% in May, 2016, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. The Abilene MSA Combined Labor Force is 75,600. There were 72,900 employed during May 2016, while 2,800 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of 3.6%.

The Abilene MSA reported the workforce was 75,800 in April, 2016. Total employment of 73,100 was reported in April 2016, while 2,700, or 3.5% were unemployed in April 2016.

The Abilene MSA unemployment rate for May, 2015 was 3.9%. The total workforce was reported at 75,800, with 72,900 employed and 2,900 or 3.9% unemployed in May, 2015.

The state's unemployment rate for the month of May, 2016 was 4.2 percent. The total Texas labor force was 13,281,200 in May 2016. The total number of Texans employed is 12,722,100. The total number of unemployed Texans was 559,100 in May

Over the previous five years, the unemployment rate increased by an average of two-tenths of a percentage point between April and May. I may have mentioned this before, but a dear friend of mine once told me that there were only three types of birds: if it soars, it's a hawk; if it swims, it's a duck, and everything else are just little brown birds. While his description would not inspire even the least interested hobbyist, besides not even close to being taxonomically correct, it could be utilized to describe a diminutive little brown bird that can be observed in the desert Southwest.

The Rock Wren (Salpinctus obsoletus) is a common yearround resident throughout much of the southwestern portions of the United States, ranging from central Texas westward to northern California. From there it occurs throughout much of the Chihuahuan Desert and Mexican Plateau regions of Mexico. It can be observed year-round in the western two-thirds of Texas, save for a small area of the Llano Estacado, where it apparently merely overwinters.

This ordinary and subtly colored species of bird is of intermediate build, with a body length of only six inches and a wingspan of barely nine inches. 





Governor S.W.T. Lanham profiled

1845. Some enjoyed remarkable success and achievements during their terms and have been remembered fondly years later. S. W. T. Lanham, who served as governor from 1903 to 1907, was a respected figure though he has been nearly forgotten.

Samuel Willis Tucker Lanham was born in rural South Carolina on July 4, 1846. He was the oldest of eight children born previously. into a modest farm family. As a young man eager for adventure, he enlisted in the Confederate prize he had so coveted. He Army in 1861, barely 15 years old. His unit participated in several battles, and he served with distinction. At the age of bloody Battle of Spotsylvania Courthouse in Virginia.

After the Civil War ended, Lanham married, and left for Texas. After his arrival, he worked as a school teacher for several years, first near Clarksville and then in Bowie County before moving to Weatherford. Like many other frontier teachers, he was interested in furthering his own education and ambitions. He studied law in his spare time. In 1869, he was admitted to the state bar.

Lanham impressed locals with his skills, and he gradually developed powerful connections. In 1871, Gov. Edmund J. Davis appointed him as district attorney, a position he would hold ably for five years.

In 1882, he ran for Congress in the new Eleventh District, a massive district that included Parker County and ninety-seven other counties (and also included the Clyde area), covering hundreds of miles from Weatherford to El Paso to Amarillo. Once in Congress, Lanham rose quickly. By 1887, he was made chairman of the Committee on Claims, a committee which oversaw petitions made to Congress and requests for exemptions to federal laws. In 1892, he declined to run for re-election. Though he enjoyed his time in Congress and was well-respected, he had his eyes on higher office.

He prepared to run for governor in 1894 and worked hard to consolidate his connections across the state. At this time,

Lanham chose not to seek re-election in 1906. His successor, Gov. Thomas M. Campbell, appointed him as a regent for the University of Texas, but it was not an honor that Lanham's declining health would allow him to enjoy. He died at his home in 1908 at the age of 62.



Question #1: Can I afford to have my spouse in a nursing facility? • Answer: Yes! TSSWCB Receives \$5.2 Million Grant to Address Flood Control Dams

TEMPLE — Texas is home to more than 2,000 flood control dams, many of which many were severely damaged by the extreme rainfall events of May 2015 and October 2015. In November of 2015, four organizations from the state of Texas wrote a letter to the entire Texas congressional delegation expressing the need for assistance in repairing the dams that were damaged. The request was made to acquire federal funds to match state and local dollars to put toward the repairs. The Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts (ATSWCD), the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB), the Texas Conservation Association for Water and Soil (TCAWS), and the Texas Association of Watershed Sponsors (TAWS) all strongly advocated for financial assistance to address

these needs. As part of the appropriations bill passed by Congress in December 2015, \$157 million


was made available to the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) for the Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) Program. The EWP Program was created by Congress to respond to emergencies caused by natural disasters. It is designed to help reduce imminent hazards to life and property threatened by excessive erosion and flooding caused by heavy rains, drought, earthquakes, windstorms and

other natural disasters. On June 7, 2016 funds were released to TSSWCB from the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) as a part of the EWP Program to repair dam structures across six counties in Texas. An estimated \$5.2 million of federal funds will be put towards flood control dams that need vital repairs as a result of the heavy rainfall events of May 2015. TSSWCB will dedicate an estimated \$1.5 million of its funding from the Texas Legislature to ensure that all of the federal funding

utilized on a local level.

The following counties will receive funding to repair a total of 26 dam structures: Cooke County (6 dams), Denton County (1 dam), Ellis County (2 dams), Guadalupe County (1 dam), Montague County (5 dams), Williamson County (2 dams) and Wise County (9 dams). The scope of repairs totaling \$6.1 million ranges from auxiliary spillway repair to debris removal and embankment repair.

The TSSWCB's flood control programs provide grants to local sponsors of flood control dams to address minor operation and maintenance needs where 90% of the cost comes from the state, and more elaborate structural repair grants that 95%. When federal dollars are available through EWP, the state's share is lessened to 25% or less. For more information on the agency's program, go to: https://www.tsswcb.texas. gov/en/floodcontrol.



DPS increases traffic enforcement for Fourth of July

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is encouraging Texans to make safe driving practices a priority during the July Fourth holiday weekend. From July 1 - July 4, DPS Troopers will join law enforcement from across the state in looking for drunk drivers, and speeding, seat belt and other traffic violators.

"DPS is calling on Texans to help keep our roadways and communities safe by celebrating responsibly and using extra caution during Independence Day festivities," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "During the holiday weekend, Troopers will be on the lookout for impaired and dangerous drivers; and anyone who plans to drink alcohol should also plan to take alternate transportation or designate a sober driver."

During the 2015 Fourth of July enforcement period, DPS Troopers made 496 DWI arrests, and issued 7,211 speeding citations, 1,156 seat belt/child safety seat citations and 1,007 no insurance citations. In addition, Troopers made 268 fugitive arrests and 187 felony arrests.

According to the Texas Department of Transportation, in 2015, 960 people were killed in motor vehicle traffic crashes where a driver was under the influence of alcohol, accounting for 27 percent of the total number of last year's traffic fatalities.

DPS offers the following tips for a safe July Fourth holiday:

* Do not drink and drive. * Slow down - especially in bad weather, construction areas, traffic and unfamiliar

* Monitor weather conditions. In the event of inclement weather, avoid high water and

use extra caution on roadways. * Eliminate distractions while driving, including the use of mobile devices.

* Buckle up everyone in the vehicle - it's the law ... "Click It or Ticket."

* Be careful when driving off road since hot catalytic converters can ignite dry vegetation.

* Do not use personal fireworks - attend sanctioned, professional displays instead.

* Never toss a cigarette out of a car window, and don't put cigarettes out on the ground. Keep a fire extinguisher

and water handy if cooking outdoors or during a campfire. Slow down or move over for tow trucks and police, fire, EMS and Texas Department

of Transportation vehicles stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated - it's the law. * Also, move over a lane or slow down if you see a fellow motorist on the side of the road.

There's no safe way to use consumer fireworks

June 28, 2016 - As the Fourth of July approaches, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) is reminding the public that there's no safe way to use consumer fireworks. According to NFPA. coordinator of the Alliance to Stop Consumer Fireworks, U.S. fire departments responded to an annual average of 18,500 fires caused by fireworks between 2009 and 2013. These fires included 1,300 structure fires, 300 vehicle fires, 16,900 outside and other fires, and killed two people per year.

Last year, two NFL players made headlines by losing fingers in accidents involving fireworks. The two separate high-profile incidents raised awareness about the dangers of consumer fireworks.

Almost half (47 percent) of the fires reported on Independence Day in the U.S. during this period were started by fireworks, more than any other cause of fire. However, the vast majority of fireworks injuries occur without a fire starting. According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), more than half of fireworks injuries each year are to extremities - hand or finger (36 percent), legs (14 percent), and arms (5 percent). Most of the remaining injuries were to parts of the head (38 percent), including the eye (16 percent

"Each-year, thousands of. people are injured from using consumer fireworks and some of those injuries are extremely serious," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice president of Outreach and Advocacy. "Even sparklers, which are often thought of as harmless enough for children to hold, burn at 1,200 degrees Fahrenheit and can cause significant injuries."

The Consumer Product Safety Commission's 2014 Fireworks Annual Report shows fireworks were involved in an estimated 10,500 injuries that were treated in hospital emergency departments across the United States in 2014. The report indicated that 67 percent of

these incidents occurred from June 20-July 20, 2014. That year, there were also 11 nonoccupational fireworks-related deaths in the U.S., several of which involved people who were not using fireworks but were trapped in house fires that were caused by them.

Thirty-five percent of people injured by fireworks were under the age of 15, with children between the ages of five and nine requiring the highest level of emergency treatment. Seventy-four percent of the victims that sustained fireworks-related injuries were males, while 26 percent were females.

So how can you celebrate the holiday safely? Attend public fireworks displays put on by trained professionals.

"Knowing the harm fireworks inflict each year, particularly on young people, we urge everyone to leave fireworks to the professionals who are trained to safely put on spectacular displays. It is by far the safest way to enjoy them,"

Daughters of the Republic of Texas settle lawsuit with General Land Office

(AUSTIN, Texas) - The collection closed to the public Daughters of the Republic of Texas and Texas Land Commissioner George P. Bush have reached a legal settlement to their yearlong dispute over an archival library housed on the Alamo grounds since 1950.

"The Daughters held fast and our prayers were answered," said Dr. Betty J. Edwards, president general of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. "With this behind us, we can refocus on our mission to ensure the next generation of Texans understand and appreciate our unique history as a sovereign republic."

As a result of the settlement, the General Land Office dropped any ownership claims to the Daughters of the Republic of Texas Library Collection. The



Take precautions to avoid rare, dangerous Amoeba on Texas rivers and lakes

WACO, Texas (June 15, 2016) - Warm weather in the Brazos River basin and the upcoming holiday make this a great time to enjoy area rivers and lakes. However, the conditions that make the water temperature enticing also foster the growth of a rare but

dangerous microorganism. Primary amebic meningoencephalitis (PAM) is a rare disease caused by Naegleria fowleri, an amoeba found in almost all untreated, fresh surface water and in soil. The amoeba thrives in low levels of fresh water that is warmer than 80 degrees and stagnant or slow-moving. The water containing the organism is forced into the nasal passages - usually from diving or jumping into water or from water skiing. The amoeba makes its way destroying brain tissue.

Symptoms of the infection include severe headache, high fever, stiff neck, nausea, vomiting, seizures and hallucinations as the condition informed that the patient has worsens. Although PAM is rare, taken part in activities in warm those infected usually succumb to the disease within a week.

There were 34 known cases of PAM in Texas between 1962 and 2015, according the national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The Texas Department of State be undertaken quickly. Health Services confirmed two cases of PAM in Texas in water during warm summer

For many years, Naegleria fowleri infections were considered to be fatal with no specific treatments available. However, in recent years, there have been a few patients with confirmed cases of PAM that have survived. Of those who

have contracted the disease, there are three known survivors since 1962, including Kali Hardig of Arkansas, who was infected in 2013.

To prevent infection, it is recommended that those taking part in warm, fresh water-related activities use nose clips or hold their noses shut while jumping into water. With the amoeba often found in soil, it is best to avoid stirring up underwater sediment. The Texas Department of Health recommends that people avoid stagnant or polluted water and take "No Swimming" signs seriously. PAM cannot be spread person to person nor pools and hot tubs that are properly cleaned, maintained and chlorinated are generally safe, as is salt water.

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
