This after school tutoring program is brought to you by Cross Plains ISD and ResourceCare.


Students can get help with your homework, study for tests, make up work, UIL and Ag competition practice, ACT practice, dual credit and other projects.

Happy 100th Birthday to our National Park Service

If you've had the chance to view the sun setting into a deep gorge at Big Bend National Park, or stargaze from the Permian Era fossil reef in West Texas' Guadalupe Mountains, you understand the importance of preserving Texas' wild spaces.

And if you've watched turtle hatchlings crawl into the Gulf of Mexico along the longest stretch of undeveloped barrier island on Padre Island National Seashore or spoken with a staged 19th century soldier about the outbreak of the Civil War at Fort Davis National Historic Site, you can appreciate why our state's history and natural treasures are cause for celebration.

The National Park Service (NPS), which maintains these sites in Texas, has a celebration of its own this week as it observes its 100th birthday. The NPS was established on August 25, 1916, when President Woodrow Wilson signed the Organic Act into law,

creating a new federal bureau within the Department of Interior to manage our national parks.

At that time, the United States only had 35 national parks. One hundred years later, our national park system has grown to more than 400 national parks, monuments, and historic sites across all 50 states.

Texas is home to 16 of these nationally recognized sites, and each year they attract more than five million visitors and plug more than \$216 million into our state's economy.

It's no mystery why. In Texas, we have a park for everybody. You can reflect upon Texas' hard-fought independence at the San Antonio Missions National Historical Park, or you can watch a movie under the stars at President Lyndon B. Johnson's ranch just like he would have hosted 50 years ago.

Active outdoorsmen can mountain bike along the rough terrain of the Harbor Bay Trail at Lake Meredith. Paddlers can navigate their way along

cypress-lined bayous at Big Thicket. You can even scuba dive in the middle of the desert at the Amistad National Recreation Area in Del Rio.

Visitors to the Alibates Flint Quarries in the Panhandle can learn how to make ancient mammoth-hunting tools from 13,000 years ago. And at Texas' newest national park, Waco Mammoth Site, you'll find the largest concentration of Columbian mammoth remains in North America.

The list goes on. So to celebrate all the National Park Service has to offer on its Centennial Anniversary, I encourage you to visit one or many of the national parks we have right here in our backyard. Many sites are holding centennial events this month, but on any day of the year, the views, the history, and the experience are worth the trip. ###






Mom's Peach Pie Prep Time: 15 Minutes Bake Time: 40 Minutes

- \* 1/2 cup packed brown sugar

- \* 1/4 cup cold butter, cubed
- \*6 cups sliced peeled
- fresh peaches



Directions

1. Brush egg white over pastry shell; set aside.

2. In a small bowl, combine flour and sugars; cut in butter until mixture resembles fine crumbs. Sprinkle two-thirds into pastry; top with peaches. Sprinkle with remaining crumb mixture.

3. Bake at 375° for 40-45 minutes or until filling is bubbly and peaches are tender. Yield: 6-8 servings.








# **Buffaloes Snap Streak! Down Menard 39-26**

The Cross Plains Buffaloes opened the 2016 season at home on a good note, downing the Menard Yellowjackets 39-26. The season opening win broke a streak of 13 season opening losses.

The Buffaloes are now 1-0 on the season.

The offense was led by senior quarterback, Holden Senclair, and junior, tailback, Creed Goode. The two combined for 318 yards of the teams total 397 yards on offense. They also accounted for all six touchdowns.

In the first quarter of play, the Yellowjackets received the opening kick-off and the Buffaloes defense forced a quick three and out.

It took just four plays for Senclair to find a seam and race 35 yards for the touchdown. The two point conversion try failed, and the Buffaloes led 6-0. The defense tightened up again, holding the Yellowjackets to just 8 yards of offense before forcing another punt.

With 1:10 left in the first quarter, Senclair would find pay dirt again from 7 yards out. In the second quarter, Senclair, would keep his TD tally going with a 33 yard run, with 9:10 to play in the second. Senior, Nain Martinez would hit the extra point kick to give the Buffaloes a 19-0 lead.

Menard would get on the board next, as TeeJay White would dive in from one yard out, the kick was good, as they would cut the lead to 12. With Yellowjackets trailed 25-19 with 6:11 to play in the third.

Junior tailback, Creed Goode would take over in the third, as he ran in from 15 yards out to give the Buffaloes a 31-19 lead. After the ensuing kick-off to the Yellowjackets, sophomore cornerback, Bryce Petree, would come off the edge to force a safety. Cross Plains 33, Menard 19.

The final Buffalo score of the night would come on a big 24 yard run by Goode, to give the Buffaloes a 39-19 lead.

Menard would tack on a rushing touchdown late with 7:26 to play in the game and that would be the final. Cross Plains 39 – Menard 26. The Buffaloes were led on

defense by senior safety, Holden Senclair (10 tackles), Bryce Petree with 4 solo tackles, 2 for a loss, and 2 sacks. Sophomore defensive end,

Tripp Thomas tallied 7 total tackles, 1 tackle for a loss, and junior, defensive tackle, James Rhyne tallied 7 tackles with 1 QB hurry, and a forced fumble. Sophomore, safety, Theron Allen intercepted the Menard quarterback once on the evening.

Gladney was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, in 1886 to a under other circumstances, that young woman named Minnie Nell. Her mother was seventeen at the time she gave birth and unmarried, considered scandalous at the time. Very little was known about her father. However, her mother later married a hard-working clerk. After her stepfather's death in 1904, her mother sent her to Fort Worth nated for four Academy Awards to live with relatives.

While living in Fort Worth, she and Garson for Best Actress. met Sam Gladney. The two had an interest in helping children as she joined the board of directors for the Texas Children's Home and Aid Society by 1910. In 1913, she and her husband moved to Sherman where her husband opened the successful Gladney Milling Company. Gladney herself joined the Sherman Civic League and became deeply involved in local causes.

A visit to the Grayson County Poor Farm changed her life. Like many other southern counties, Grayson County had established a farm where the poor, mentally ill, homeless, orphans, and elderly could live. However, the facility had been neglected for years, and Gladney found children at the facility in appalling conditions. She began sending many of the orphans at the facility to the Texas Children's Home in Fort Worth. Along with other women in Sherman, she organized a free day care and kindergarten facility to help working women, financed by the Gladneys and local businesses.

In 1927, she was named superintendant of the children's home and redoubled the education efforts of the children and attempts to find them good homes. By the 1930s, she expanded the home's reach by adding programs to help unmarried mothers.

Gladney also began a campaign to change the state law to remove the word "illegitimate"

Her work began to change ensuring that in loving homes in treatment for "illegitimate" or " adopted" and those born they would all just be seen as children and as worthy of love off-site, counseling services, and a chance for a good life as anyone else.

In 1941, a movie was made about Gladney's life and work, Blossoms in the Dust. It starred famed actress Greer Garson as Gladney. The movie was nomiin 1942, including Best Picture

In 1950, the children's home married in 1906. Already, she bought the adjacent West Texas Maternity Hospital, and the board of directors changed the name of the entire facility to the Edna Gladney Home in honor of her work.


Within a few years of her death, the Gladney Home had expanded to include an on-site middle school and on-site high school, coordinating with Fort Worth school officials. By the 1980s, the organization included services for expectant mothers parenting classes, and services to help adopted children find their biological parents through a voluntary registry system and was later renamed the Gladney Center for Adoption. It has now found homes for more than 20,000 children. Personal note: The author of

this column has adopted two fine sons in addition to having four other children. ###

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What Are You Reading?

In Robert Thornhill's "Lady Justice and the Class Reunion,' Kansas City cop Walt Williams is facing his 50th high school reunion with dread, while his new wife, Maggie, is eager to meet the friends who shaped his teen-age years - especially the old flames. This is book #12 in the Lady Justice Series - a collection that I have read from the beginning and am enjoying very much. I often find myself laughing out loud - although the subject matter is usually very serious. Thornhill seems to use each of his books to explore a current social issue - this time it's the drug-running cartel from Mexico.

Walt and his partner Ox are trailing a drug lord who is using young girls to transport drugs. These girls are enticed by the money they will receive for smuggling the drugs in breast implants - but the girls somehow never seem to make it through alive. The Kansas City police are stymied until Walt gets a clue from an unlikely source - one of his reunion classmates. Thornhill uses his own high school days as a template for the story and the book contains photos from that time.

In a parallel storyline are three old friends who are facing terminal illnesses and want to do something useful before they die. They decide to help bring down the drug cartel and become entangled with the police investigation. And of course, Walt's friends from Whispering Hills Retirement Village provide the comic relief, helping Walt work on the decorations for his class reunion.

### **Cross Plains ISD enrollment down** 15 students compared to 2015

Callahan County public schools reported mixed enrollment for the first day of school Monday, August 22nd, with Clyde CISD and Eula ISD slightly higher than 2015 and both Baird and Cross Plains lower than 2015 enrollment totals.

Cross Plains ISD Superintendent Phil Mitchell said the school district reported 342 students reported for the first day of school this year, which is 15 students below the 2015 total. Cross Plains ISD reported total enrollment for the first day of school in 2015 was 357. Cross Plains High School,

which includes grades 7-12, reported 140 students enrolled for the first day of school this year, which is lower by 21 students compared to 2015 when 161 students reported for the first day of school.

School, which includes grades Pre-K though sixth grade, reported 202 students enrolled for the first day of school Monday, which is higher by six students from last year. Mitchell reported elementary school enrollment was 196 in 2015

for the first day of school in 2016 at 310, down 16 students from the first day of school in 2015 when 326 students reported.

Baird Superintendent Jarod Bellar said Baird High School, with grades 9-12, reported 85 students in 2016, down six students from the first day of school in 2015 when 91 students enrolled.

Baird Middle School, which includes grades 6-8, reported 69 students for the first day of school this year, compared to 85 students last year, a decrease of 16 students from year-tovear.

Baird Elementary School, which houses Pre-K through fifth grade, reported 156 students enrolled this year. That's six students over the 150 students reported for the first day of school in 2015.

Clyde CISD Superintendent Keith Scharnhorst reported through second grade, reported 1,467 students enrolled for the first day of school this year, an first day of school on Monday, increase of 55 students over an increase 19 students over the first day of school 2014 when 1,412 reported for

the first day of school. Clyde CISD has seen student enrollment grow by 112 students in the past two years. Clyde ISD enrollment was 1,355 in 2014. Clyde High School, which includes grades 9-12, reported 418 students on Monday, an increase of seven students over the first day of school in 2015 when 411 reported.

Clyde Junior High School, with grades 6-8, reported 335 students for the first day of school Monday, a decrease of six students compared to last year. The campus reported 341 students for the first day of school in 2015.

Clyde Intermediate School, with grades third through fifth, reported 349 students this year, an increase of 35 students over 2015 when 314 students reported for the first day of school. Clyde Elementary School,

which includes grades Pre-K 365 students reported for the

2015 when 346 students reported for the first day of school. Eula ISD Superintendent Tim Kelley reported Eula had 414 students enrolled for the first day of school this year. That's an increase of five students compared to 2015 when 409 students enrolled for the first day of school.

Eula High School, with grades 9-12, reported 119 students enrolled this year, which is higher by nine students compared to 2015 when 110 students enrolled for the first day of school. Eula Junior High, which includes grades 7-8, reported 58 students enrolled for the first

day of school this year, which is higher by six students compared to 2015 when 52 students enrolled for the first day of school.

Eula Elementary School, which includes grades Pre-K through sixth grade, had 237 students enrolled for the first day of school this year. That's a decrease of 10 students over 2015 when just 247 students reported for

# Dove season opens Thursday, September 1st Texas dove hunting prospects are bright

AUSTIN - More validation that everything's bigger and better in Texas, dove populations are soaring and the hunting season, which gets underway Sept. 1, is the longest in 80 years.

A new 90-day season this fall means hunters will have 20 more days of opportunity compared with previous years. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) is integrating those additional days early in the season to take advantage of mourning dove migrating into the state, as well as at the end of the season in the Special White-winged Dove Area to offer more bird hunting opportunities.

"Hunters will now be able to take advantage of those northern birds riding early November cool fronts into Texas, without sacrificing days of opportunity early in the season," said Dave Morrison, TPWD Small Game Program Director. "We've also tacked on extra days to the back end of the season in late January when South Texas prospects are still pretty solid. It's a winwin for dove hunters."

Roughly 10 percent of the nation's 350 million mourning dove reside in Texas, along with about 9 million whitewinged dove. Each fall, over 415,000 Texas dove hunters take to the field in pursuit of these acrobatic, fast-flying game birds. Based on field observations by TPWD wildlife biologists, prospects for the 2016-17 hunting season are good to excellent.

"During the start of breeding season (March) in Texas, habitat conditions for dove were good to fantastic, thanks to the carryover of precipitation from 2015," said Shaun Oldenburger, TPWD Dove Program Leader. "Biologists witnessed good early production on both whitewinged and mourning doves throughout the state until the May rains arrived. However, good production was witnessed in June and July as more sporadic, isolated storm events continued across the state.'

Based on early survey results at TPWD, mourning dove numbers may be some of the highest in more than a decade in the Panhandle with similar numbers as 2015 in the rest of the state. White-winged doves continue to increase in numbers across the state, but the growth is gradually slowing. "Hunters should be prepared for good seed production across the state, so there will be plenty food available for mourning doves except in areas where flooding occurred," said Oldenburger. "This may make hunting a little more difficult

due to thick vegetation cover, and hunters will need to spend a little more time finding downed birds in areas due to this issue during opening day in some areas.

Dove season in the North Zone runs Sept. 1 - Nov. 13 and Dec. 17-Jan. 1, 2017; in the Central Zone from Sept. 1 - Nov. 6 and Dec. 17 - Jan. 8, 2017; and in the South Zone from Sept. 23 - Nov. 13 and Dec. 17 - Jan. 23, 2017. The daily bag limit for doves statewide is 15 and the possession limit 45.

In the Special White-winged Dove Area, the season runs Sept. 3-4, 10-11, Sept. 23 -Nov. 9, Dec. 17 - Jan. 23, 2017. During the early two weekends in the Special Whitewinged Dove Area, hunting is allowed only in the afternoon and the daily bag limit is 15 birds, to include not more than two mourning doves and two white-tipped doves. During the general season opens, the aggregate bag limit is 15 with no more than two white-tipped doves.

For novice dove hunters or those new to the sport, TPWD is offering Hunting 101 workshops this year dedicated to dove hunting. These 3-8 hour, hands-on seminars and workshops are designed for family members of all ages to learn more about the animals hunted, tools used in hunting and the shooting sports and where to go in Texas to enjoy these activities. 

# If your child support is due, you can't Renew!!!

Beginning in September, certain parents who are behind on child support will not be able to renew their vehicle registrations. Parents subject to this new enforcement tool have an Office of the Attorney General (OAG) child support case and have gone at least 180 days without making any payment.

Thedenialofvehicle registration renewals is authorized by state law that provides for non-. renewal of Texas licenses, registrations and permits held by parents who are behind on court-ordered child support payments (TFC 232.002)

Parents whose vehicle registrations expire in December will receive notice in September from the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles (TxDMV) that their renewal is being denied due to a child support delinquency.

Also, parents will receive a letter 90 days in advance informing them that their vehicle registration renewal will not be processed until they contact the OAG to arrange a payment plan and make a satisfactory payment toward the plan. Some of these parents may attempt to renew their registration without contacting the OAF to make payment arrangements. If this occurs, the County Tax Assessors. Collector's Office MUST deny the vehicle registration renewal! The Tax Office will have available, cards that provide the Attorney General's Office contact information. Your local Tax Office/Substation HAS NO CONTROL OVER THIS !! So remember, as of September 1, 2016; IF YOUR CHILD SUPPORT IS DUE, YOU CAN'T RENEW!!!!!







#### **Howard Payne University and Ranger College** collaborate to provide nursing education

BROWNWOOD - August 24, 2016 - A new collaboration between Howard Payne University and Ranger College has been established to recruit nursing students to Brown County. Through this arrangement, students can become registered nurses and earn the Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree in four years plus one semester. The exact time frame depends upon a student's pace and applicable transfer credit.

Ranger College has prelicensure approval through the Texas Board of Nursing to offer the Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) that prepares students to attempt Registered Nurse (RN) licensure. Howard Payne University has been approved by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges to offer the RN-to-BSN program, making the post-licensure Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree available to candidates holding RN licensure. The cooperative effort between the two educational institutions creates a single, streamlined process culminating in the BSN degree.

A Memorandum of Understanding was recently signed to formalize the arrangement between the two

coordinated process," said Dr. Bill Ellis, HPU president. Dr. Bill Campion, president of

Ranger College, agreed. "Ranger College is pleased to join with HPU in this important endeavor, which will greatly benefit students and better serve our geographic area," said Dr. Campion.

Throughthenewarrangement, which went into effect for the start of the fall 2016 semester, the student will take approximately three semesters of general education and prerequisite coursework at HPU, during which the university will provide assistance with the process of applying to Ranger College. If accepted by Ranger College, the individual will then become a degree-seeking student there, working to earn the Associate Degree in Nursing during the next four semesters. Following the conclusion of this period of study and the student's subsequent passing of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing Licensure Examination, or NCLEX, the student will resume coursework at HPU for two more semesters to complete the requirements of the university's post-licensure RN-to-BSN program.

"This cooperative effort is a new variation on a two-plus-two arrangement that institutions have used for many years," said






