



Buffaloes Fight Hard Against Albany

State-Ranked Albany Too Much for Cross Plains in 47-14 Win

Cross Plains running back Creed Goode, the leading rusher in the Big Country, had another big game Friday night, but it wasn't enough as No. 8-ranked Albany rolled to a 47-14 victory over the Buffaloes in a District 6-2A Division II game.

The victory moved Albany to 7-1 overall and 3-0 in district play. Albany and Miles are the only two remaining teams without a district loss with two games remaining on the schedule. Cross Plains, which had its four-game winning streak snapped, fell to 5-3 overall and 2-1 in district.

Goode carried the ball 14 times for 103 yards and both Buffalo touchdowns. Albany quarterback Brian Hamilton, however, completed 16 of 20 passes for 238 yards and four touchdowns.

The Lions jumped out to a 14-0 first-quarter lead on a 40-yard interception return by Adam Faith and a 31-yard TD pass from Hamilton to Roman

Goode scored on a 16-yard run early in the second quarter, but Albany responded with 1-yard run by Hunter Owen

and a 37-yard TD pass from Hamilton to Dax Neese to build its halftime lead to 27-7.

Owen added two more scores in the second half on a 27yard pass from Hamilton and a 7-yard run, while Neece grabbed his second touchdown pass, a 6-yard aerial from Hamilton. Goode raced 68 yards with 3:27 remaining in the game for the final touchdown of the game.

Cross Plains had 155 yards rushing, but the Buffaloes were held to only 25 yards in the air. Albany totaled 394 yards total offense. The Lions played errorfree, too, with no turnovers and no penalties.

The Buffaloes will play at Winters (2-6, 0-3) Friday night.

Lloyd Millard Bentsen, Jr., was born in Mission in South Texas in 1921. He arrived penniless and grew to become one of the most important businessmen and ranchers in the region.

With America fighting World War II, he enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Force and rose to command a squadron of B-24 bombers. He flew thirty-five missions and missteps. He was honorably discharged after the war as a lieutenant colonel but would serve in the reserves from 1950 to 1959.

He returned to Hidalgo County and won election as county judge for Hidalgo County in 1946. He was elected to Congress in 1948, unopposed in each of three terms. He was a respected figure in Congress and worked closely with Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn, a fellow Texan. With a wife and growing family, Bentsen stepped down from Congress in 1955 and started a successful insurance company in Houston and also served on the board of directors of several energy companies.

In 1970, Bentsen re-entered politics, challenging liberal Sen. Ralph Yarbrough in the Democratic Primary. Bentsen scored a surprise win in the hard-fought contest. In spite of the divisive primary, Yarbrough endorsed Bentsen in the fall contest, the Democrats united, and Bentsen went on to win against George H. W. Bush with a comfortable 53% of the vote.


Ahh, Halloween. During the weeks leading up to this fall holiday, our minds are inundated by images that range from creepy to downright horrifying. Many of these images that bring about fear incorporate animals that many people consider terrifying, including bats, rats, wolves, snakes, and probably the most feared: Spiders. And one species that is found in west Texas is among the most feared - the Brown Recluse.

The Brown Recluse belongs to the family Sicariidae, or the Six-eyed Sicariid Spiders. Sixeyed Sicariid Spiders are a large and diverse family of spiders with approximately one hundred twenty something species that can be found in all of this planet's temperate regions. This group is represented in Texas by one genera with five species. However, the most familiar and Loxosceles reclusa.





The number of unemployed Texans decreased in September by 6,900 to a total of 662,100 people. Over the previous five years, the number of unemployed people decreased by an average of 34,000 in the month of September. Since September of last year, the number of unemployed people has increased by 75,300 individuals.

Between August and September, the unemployment rate decreased in 16 Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) in Texas. The College Station-Bryan and McAllen-EdinburgMission MSAs experienced the largest over the month rate decrease, with both dropping by four-tenths of a percentage point. The Amarillo and Austin-Round Rock MSAs had the lowest September unemployment rate with both at 3.5 percent.

Mall Construction Starts

FORT WORTH, TX (Dallas Business Journal—Candace Carlisle)—After years of various delays, Greensboro, North

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Carolina-based Tanger Factory Outlet Center Inc. started construction on a retail center that will bring more than 80 upscale retailers to this part of the region. In all, the new outlet mall is expected to employ more than 900 full- and part-time employees upon its opening in 2017. The upscale outlet mall broke ground at Interstate 35W and State Highway 114 in Fort

Tangers Outlets CEO Steven Tanger told the Dallas Business Journal, "This will be a regional shopping destination that will have a draw from 20 to 30 miles away." As part of the economic incentive agreement, the outlet giant plans to invest at least \$70 million to build the center and will employ hundreds of employees. Earlier this year, Tanger had signed real estate leases with Nike, Levi's, Gap, Skechers, Old Navy, Express, Carter's and Oshkosh.

Chinese Energy Company Established

EL PASO, TX (El Paso Inc .--Robert Gray)—A Chinese company that manufactures materials for the wind power industry has established a manufacturing operation in El Paso—its first in North America. PGTEX is the first Chinese manufacturer to set up a major operation in El Paso. Company spokesperson Sharon Xue told El Paso Inc. the company has invested \$6.7 million in its facility in Far East El Paso and executives plan to invest an additional \$11 million over the next four years, to keep up with growth in the renewable energy market in North America. PGTEX plans to employ 150 people in El Paso by 2020, according to Xue.

IKEA to Open New Store GRAND PRAIRIE, TX (CBSD-FW.Com)-Swedish home furnishing retailer IKEA plans its second Dallas-area store. The new store will be located along the eastern side of State Highway 161 just north of Interstate-20. More than 500 jobs are expected to be created during the construction phase and another 300 workers are expected to be hired when the

store opens in 2017. "This store will provide a more convenient IKEA shopping experience for current and potential customers throughout central and western parts of the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex who maybe live too far from IKEA Frisco," said Lars Petersson, IKEA U.S. president. HOUSTON, TX (Houston Business Journal--Jack Witthaus)— LyondellBasell Industries will build a \$700 million polyethylene plant at its manufacturing complex in La Porte on the south shore of the Houston Ship Channel.

Construction is scheduled to start early next year and is slated to wrap up around 2019. It's expected to create up to 1,000 construction jobs and 75 permanent jobs. The plant is part of the company's \$4 billion expansion through 2020 in the Texas and Gulf Coast regions. 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

Murder Conviction rate within Callahan County is 100% for the last four years

Things have happened this month that have made me very, very proud to be a citizen of Callahan County. I was born and raised in Callahan County. I went away for about 35 years to pursue a law enforcement career and returned home as soon as I retired.

I ran for and was elected to be the Sheriff of the greatest county in Texas. That feeling of pride in Callahan County was reinforced Monday afternoon October 17, 2016. when the twelve Callahan County Jurors returned a guilty verdict on all three charges of murder. robbery and theft of a firearm. The twelve jurors deliberated about 3 hours before bringing

in a verdict of quilty. Our Callahan County Attorney Shane Deel did a great job of presenting his case to the Jury and in presenting his closing statement. Investigator Tee Barton and the rest of Shane's department also, deserve

Even though the Sheriff's Department was short 2 deputies during the trial, and we had a major animal shelter raid, rescue and recovery in progress on FM 603 west of Clyde during the time, plus many other calls during the days of the trial, we still managed to cover the courtroom with 2 Deputies present at all times. Part time

Court Bailiff Randy Havens, Retired Texas Ranger Bob Favor, and Chief Deputy Rick Jowers, and I made sure that there were two law enforcement Officers at the trial at all times.

The female defendant was out on bond. The male defendant was housed in the Taylor County Jail and Deputy Jowers brought him to the Callahan County Jail the day the trial started. He stayed in the Callahan County Jail during the trial and the night after sentencing. After the verdict of guilty, the

female was booked in by the dispatcher/jailers and moved to Shackelford County Jail right after the trial. The next day the male was taken to the Taylor County Jail. They will be moved to prison as soon at

the state calls for them. There have been 4 murders in Callahan County during the 4 year I have been Sheriff. The first murder was committed by one person and he was in Taylor County Jail almost a year before pleading guilty and going to prison.

The second murder was committed by two people and they stayed in Taylor County Jail a longtime before going to prison. There were four people charged in the third murder and it was almost a year before the last of the four defendants went to a Texas State Prison.

There were two people charged in the fourth murder before they were found guilty by this awesome Callahan County Jury. Tuesday, October 18th they were sentenced to 40 years in a Texas Department of Corrections facility. This makes a total of nine people charged with and sentenced to prison on murder charges in Callahan County. Of those nine only one was a citizen of Callahan County,

The other eight who were charged with murder were from Abilene and came here to Callahan County to commit the murders.

I am sure that most outlaws and criminals seldom read the Sheriff' Corner in the Callahan County newspapers, but I do know that they read and participate on Facebook.

I encourage all Facebook users to spread the word that law enforcement is active in Callahan County and our county is not the place to come to for criminal activity, The risk of being caught and found guilty is high.

In Callahan County criminals will be vigorously investigated by law enforcement. Evidence will be presented and then the court process will begin. The conviction rate for murder within Callahan County is 100% for the last four years.

Follow these tips to avoid jury service scams

AUSTIN — As Texas if you missed your assigned celebrates Jury Appreciation time to report to jury duty. Week the first week in May, the State Bar of Texas Jury Service Committee wants to educate the public on how to avoid jury duty scams.

Jury Appreciation Week is dedicated to honoring those who give of their time to participate in our judicial system. The Jury Service Committee wants residents to be aware that, across the state, people are being targeted by phone calls and emails, threatening them with prosecution for failing to comply with jury service in federal or state courts. These calls and emails are fraudulent and not connected with U.S. or

Texas state courts. During a typical scam call, victims are told that a warrant was issued for their arrest because they failed to appear for jury duty. The caller then asks the victim to "verify" personal information, such as their date of birth and Social Security number. In other cases, scammers go further and ask that the victim pay a fine over the phone to avoid arrest. Victims are pressured to provide a credit card number or other payment information.

According to a recent notice from the Better Business Bureau of Southeast Texas, the jury duty scam is the latest in a series of identity theft schemes where criminals try to get people to reveal personal information over the phone. Victims are often caught off guard and, given the nature of the call, provide the information, the Better Business Bureau reported.

To help protect Texas residents, the State Bar of **Texas Jury Service Committee** compiled the following tips from federal and state courts, the Better Business Bureau, and Consumer Reports. Remember

· Courts will not call you about jury duty. Legitimate jury notices will come by mail, even

 Courts will not ask you for personal information over the phone or require you to provide sensitive information such as Social Security or credit card numbers by phone or email.

 Scammers can mask their identity. Be aware that criminals may use software to disguise their phone numbers and make it appear that their calls are originating from your local courthouse or police department. Don't trust your caller ID!

· Courts will not call you asking for money. If you receive a call from someone claiming to be a court official asking for money for missing jury duty, hang up and report the scam to your local police department.

If you receive a call or email of the type described above, report it to your local. police department. Any questions about jury service should be directed to your local district
