





Buffaloes are the Bi-District Champions!

Cross Plains Outscores Wink to Advance to Area Round

Cross Plains used its powerful running game to outscore Wink 50-42 in a Class 2A Division II bi-district playoff game Friday night in Roscoe, but it was a rare pass completion that provided the winning margin for the Buffaloes.

It was the first football playoff victory for Cross Plains in 19 years. The Buffaloes, who are now 8-3, will meet Munday in the area round at 7 p.m. Friday in Colorado City. Munday (10-1) blanked Perrin-Whitt 68-0 in its bi-district game.

Wink took the lead 36-34 on the second play of the fourth quarter on a 7-yard touchdown run by C.J. Mercier and quarterback Kenny Hrncir's run for the two-point conversion.

It took Cross Plains only four plays to answer Wink's score, however, after recovering on onside kick. Quarterback Holden Senclair ran 25 yards on a keeper and then passed 31 yards to Bryce Petree for the go-ahead touchdown with 10:04 remaining. That was one of only two a completions for Senclair in the game.

The Buffaloes added an insurance touchdown on a 19yard run by Senclair with 1:46 left. Senclair ran for two-point conversions following both fourth-quarter touchdowns.

Wink cut the final margin to 50-42 when Hrncir hit Wade Halterman on a 35-yard TD pass with 42 seconds to go.

Cross Plains kept it on the ground for most of the game, rushing for 431 yards. Creed

yards and three touchdowns, and Senclair also gained 190

yards on 22 carries. Goode scored a pair of firstquarter touchdowns on runs of 21 and 61 yards as Cross Plains led 13-6 at the end of the first period. Touchdown runs of 28 yards by Kaiden Petree and 13 yards by Goode allowed the Buffaloes to take a 26-20 lead into the locker room at halftime.

After Wink took a 28-26 lead on a Mercier's 2-yarad run and Hrncir's two-point conversision pass to Josh Riley, Kaiden Petree scored his second touchdown of the game on a 7-yard with 2:08 remaining in the third quarter to put Cross Plains back in front 34-28 going into the fourth stanzaa.

Hrncir threw for 262 yards and three touchdowns for Wink, which finished its season with a 6-5 record. Mercier had 121 yards and three touchdown rushing for the Wildcats.

Cross Plains 2016 retail sales lower by 11% compared to 2015

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2016' are just over eleven percent lower than 2015, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Glenn Hegar reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, November 9th.

Cross Plains' 2016 sales tax payments for the year totaled \$206,361.51, which is 11.48 percent lower than the \$233,130.15 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2015.

The payment to the city for November 2016 was \$23,006.14, which is higher by 0.66 percent from the November 2015 payment of \$22,854.85.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today, Wednesday, November 9th, he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$737.9 million in local sales tax allocations for November, 0.8 percent more than in November 2015. These allocations are based on sales made in September by businesses that report tax monthly, and sales made in July, August and September by quarterly filers.

"The cities of San Antonio, Fort Worth and Plano saw noticeable increases in sales tax allocations," Hegar said. "The cities of Houston and Midland saw significant decreases in sales tax allocations."

Hegar sent Texas cities \$486.4 million in November 2016, which is higher by 0.9 percent compared to November 2015 and higher by 1.1 percent year-

He reported \$40.1 million in November 2016 allocations to Texas counties, which is lower by 6.3 percent compared to November 2015 and lower by 5.6 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$165.3 million in November 2016 sales tax allocations, which is 0.9 percent higher than November 2015 and higher by

1.1 percent year-to-date. Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$46.1 million in November 2015 payment of Fund and use it for normal November 2016 allocations, which is 7.1 percent higher than November 2015 and higher by 2.0 percent year-to-date.

Total sales tax allocations were \$737.9 million in November the 2015 payments to the city sales tax to help fund local 2016, which is 0.8 percent higher than November 2015 and higher 0.7 percent year-to-date.







Mountain Lion

As a naturalist who has had the opportunity to observe literally thousands of species of "critters" in the American Southwest, I have witnessed a few that have been forever etched into my memory banks. Some of the most memorable have been the three sightings that I have of the largest feline species in Texas, the cougar, or Mountain Lion.

The Mountain Lion, (Puma concolor) is the second most common of the six species of the family Felidae that have called Texas home at one time or another. Other members of this family include the Bobcat, the Ocelot, the Margay (now extinct in Texas), the Jaguarundi, and the massive Jaguar (also extinct in Texas). Netscape founder and Plainview native James Henry Clark

Sometimes the most unlikely people are the ones who change the world. Those remarkable individuals who find the inner strength to remake themselves can remake the world around native James Henry Clark is one such individual.

Clark was born in handle ranching community, in 1944. He was very bright, but he was distracted by a troubled home life. His parents divorced in the 1950s, and his mother worked very meager jobs to try to support the three children. He steadily got into more trouble at school. When he was in high school, his various misdeeds got him suspended. Frustrated, he dropped out at the age of 16. Needing work and looking for adventure, he joined the navy.

The navy changed his life. The service offered many educational opportunities, and Clark earned his high school equivalency diploma and became interested in electronics. After his stint in the navy, he found himself in New Orleans and began making plans to restart his education. He went to night school at Tulane University hoping to gain enough credits to be admitted into a regular college program. Eventually, he gained admission to the University of New Orleans, majoring in physics. He earned both a bachelors degree and a masters degree within a few years. Along the way, Clark married and had two daughters.

In 1974, he earned a Ph.D. in computer science from the University of Utah and was quickly offered a teaching position at the University of California at Santa Cruz. The one-time high school dropout had in just over a decade earned a doctorate and become a college professor. While this turnaround in his life would by itself be an inspirational story, it was just the beginning of the journey for James Clark.

Clark wanted to do more than just teach. He started doing research and consulting work on the side. In 1978, he began work as a professor of electrical engineering at Stanford

In 1981, Clark left Stanford, borrowed \$25,000 from a friend, and started Silicon Graphics, Inc., based on his Geometry Engine. Most of his team from Stanford followed, and the graphics firm became increasingly successful. The corporation worked not just with other corporations, but by the mid-1980s, also found a lot of success producing increasingly sophisticated graphics for

The company was earning tens of millions of dollars by the early 1990s when he began clashing

University. Much of his doctoral restrain his creative style. As a result, he quit and immediately formed a partnership with fellow programmer Marc Andreessen. In 1993, just as the Internet was starting to become widely accessible to the general public, the two announced the creation of Netscape, an extraordinarily successful web-browser program. The new company became a billion-dollar sensation by the time it was sold to America Online in 1999.

Clark continued with other ventures, including a collaboration that eventually became the medical information site WebMD. He has since been known for his charity work, including creating the James H. Clark Center for Biomedical Engineering at Stanford and a scholarship program at Tulane.







Rep. Craddick files **Distracted Driving Bill**

(AUSTIN) - For the 4th Bill 62 because there should be session in a row, Rep. Tom Craddick (Midland) filed a bill to create a traffic violation for smartphone use while driving.

"I am proud to propose House Bill 62 during this upcoming 85th Texas Legislative Session. Distracted driving is an epidemic in Texas and we must pass a law to address this lifethreatening habit," Craddicksaid. "I am committed to giving our Texas drivers safer roads; I am determined to be a voice for the distracted driving victims and families of victims; and I am extremely motivated to enact legislation that will prevent any

loss of life." "Ninety-eight cities in Texas have an ordinance governing the use of smartphones while driving, and 46 states, D.C., Puerto Rico, Guam and the U.S. Virgin islands have a law governing the use of smartphones while driving," Craddick said. "But the number that gets my attention and concerns me gravely is the 482 deaths that occurred on Texas roadways in 2015 due to distracted driving. I filed House

ZERO deaths." While there is not a statewide smartphone use law for all drivers. Texas has several laws in place that regulate cell phone use while driving. State law bans cell phone use for drivers under 18; school bus drivers are prohibited from using a cell phone while driving with children on the bus; and drivers cannot use a cell phone or other handheld wireless device in an active school zone where signs are present.

"We have come to a tipping point in this distracted driving crisis. ZERO Texans need to die because of the selfishness of Texas drivers who are addicted to their phones," Craddick said. "When HB62 is passed into law, I will be able to resolutely reassure victims and family members that their loved one's death was not in vain and

others' lives will be saved." Monday, November 14, 2016 is the first day state lawmakers could file legislation for the upcoming 85th Legislative Session, which convenes Tuesday, January 10, 2017.



Follow up on Year old Case!

October 17th 2015, slightly over one year ago, there was a home invasion in the western part of Callahan County.

Governor Abbott Statement On Texas' Intention To Withdraw From Refugee Resettlement Program

Decision Comes After Requests By Texas For Federal Government To Ensure Refugees Pose No Security Threat

AUSTIN - The State of Texas today sent a letter to the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) giving official notice of its intention to withdraw from the federal refugee resettlement program should ORR not unconditionally approve Texas' state plan by September 30th. Today's letter comes after ORR's unwillingness to approve Texas' updated state refugee plan, which would require national security officials to ensure that refugees do not pose a security threat to Texas. As required by ORR, Texas' withdrawal from the refugee resettlement program will be effective 120 days after the September 30th deadline, on January 31st, 2017.

Governor Greg Abbott issued the following statement on Texas' intention to withdraw from the refugee resettlement

"The federal government's refugee settlement program is riddled with serious problems that pose a threat to our nation. The Director of the Federal

Bureau of Investigation and the Director of National Intelligence have repeatedly declared their inability to fully screen refugees from terrorist-based nations. Even with the inability to properly vet refugees from Syria and countries known to be supporters or propagators of terrorism, President Obama is now ineptly proposing a dramatic increase in the number of refugees to be resettled in the

"Empathy must be balanced with security. Texas has done more than its fair share in aiding refugees, accepting more refugees than any other state between October 2015

and March 2016. While many refugees pose no danger, some pose grave danger, like the Iraqi refugee with ties to ISIS who was arrested earlier this year after he plotted to set off bombs at two malls in Houston.

"Despite multiple requests by the State of Texas, the federal government lacks the capability or the will to distinguish the dangerous from the harmless, and Texas will not be an accomplice to such dereliction of duty to the American people. Therefore, Texas will withdraw from the refugee resettlement program. I strongly urge the federal government to completely overhaul a broken and flawed refugee program that increasingly risks American

It's time to look at your health care coverage for 2017 By Bob Moos/Southwest public affairs officer/U.S. Centers for Medicare & **Medicaid Services**

Now's the time to check your health care coverage for 2017 or sign up for the first time. Open enrollment through the Health Insurance Marketplace began on Nov. 1 and runs until Jan. 31.

Here are six key facts to know about this year's enrollment

Your actual premium costs probably aren't as high as you've heard.

More than seven in 10 Texans with coverage through the marketplace will be able to find a health plan for less than \$75 per month, thanks to financial assistance.

If your income falls below 400 percent of the federal poverty level - that's \$48,000 for one person or \$97,000 for a family of four - you'll qualify for federal tax credits that will help make your coverage affordable. About eight in 10 marketplace consumers in Texas are eligible. Because the tax credits increase dollar for dollar with the cost of a benchmark health plan, most consumers are protected from rate increases.

Also, if you're buying an individual health plan but not through the marketplace, you'd be wise to visit healthcare. gov and recheck your eligibility for the tax credits. An estimated 252,000 Texans who purchased coverage outside the marketplace and paid full price for it last year have incomes low enough to qualify for assistance.

All consumers still have choices.

About eight in 10 marketplace customers will be able to choose from competing insurers for 2017. But even consumers served by a single insurer will select from a range of plans.

Texans can choose from an average of 26 health plans, though the exact number will vary from county to county. Rural areas are likely to have fewer. You can view all of the plans for sale in your area at healthcare.gov.

If you haven't purchased a health plan through the marketplace before, you should know that all plans cover a comprehensive set of benefits, including doctor visits, hospital stays, preventive care, pregnancy and prescription

drugs. The plans must treat you fairly. Insurers can't deny you coverage because you have a medical issue, such as cancer or diabetes. Nor can they charge you more than they would someone who's in

good health. It pays to shop and check out your options.

If your health plan from this past year is continuing into 2017, you may be automatically re-enrolled. But you'll still want to review it to make sure it meets your needs.

Every year, insurers adjust premiums, out-of-pocket costs and benefits. You should have received a letter from your insurance company explaining the changes for 2017.

Even if you're satisfied with your current coverage, it'll be smart to log into your marketplace account at healthcare.gov and update your information on household income and family size.

Updating your personal information is important, because you may be eligible for lower costs than last year.

Comparing plans at healthcare.gov is easier than

The marketplace simplifies your shopping for coverage by letting you make convenient comparisons of health plans.

The process is faster and more streamlined this year. You can even shop and enroll from a smartphone or tablet.

Healthcare.gov helps you put together the full picture of your health care costs, including premiums, deductibles, copayments and coinsurance. An "out-of-pocket calculator" will give you an estimate of your total yearly costs for each health plan, based on factors like your age, gender, income, ZIP code and how much health care you expect to use.

You can also check out a plan's list of covered drugs and find out which doctors and hospitals participate in the plan you're considering.

Deductibles can often be made more manageable.

Most marketplace consumers qualify for financial assistance that lowers their deductibles -- the median marketplace deductible is now \$850.

All plans cover some preventive services, such as cancer screenings, vaccines and well-child visits, without a deductible. And eight in 10 marketplace consumers select

Texas Rainy Day Fund

(AUSTIN) - In 1988, in the wake of a recession caused by slumping energy prices, the Texas Legislature created the Economic Stabilization Fund (ESF) as a cushion for state budget writers to fall back on in lean times.

The ESF - commonly called the "Rainy Day Fund" - has grown from less than \$20 million to \$9.7 billion at the end of fiscal 2016. Deriving most of its revenues from the state's oil and gas production taxes, Texas' rainy day fund is the largest of its kind in the nation.

In the latest issue of Fiscal Notes, the Comptroller's office examines the rainy day fund and how it's been used over

the years. "Sound fiscal management, conservative budgeting and responsible stewardship of the rainy day fund have allowed Texas to weather previous budgetary challenges, address

pressing infrastructure needs and avoid short-term borrowing to close cash flow gaps," Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said. "While our state faces a more challenging fiscal climate than in recent biennia, our rainy day fund remains an essential and robust backstop to help Texas through times of economic adversity."

SBA economic injury disaster loans available to Texas small businesses

SACRAMENTO, Calif. - Small nonfarm businesses in 29 Texas counties and neighboring counties in Oklahoma are now eligible to apply for low-interest federal disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans offset economic losses because of reduced revenues caused by the high winds, hail, tornadoes and flooding in the following primary counties that occurred May 1 - June 24, 2016, announced Director Tanya N. Garfield of SBA's Disaster Field Operations Center - West.

Primary Texas counties: Armstrong, Callahan, Clay, Coleman, Jack and Taylor;

Neighboring Texas counties: Archer, Briscoe, Brown, Carson, Concho, Donley, Eastland, Fisher, Gray, Jones, McCulloch, Montague, Nolan, Palo Pinto, Parker, Potter, Randall, Runnels, Shackelford, Swisher, Wichita, Wise and

Neighboring Oklahoma counties: Cotton and Jefferson. 'SBA eligibility covers both the economic impacts on businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers that have

Businesses primarily engaged in farming or ranching are not eligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural enterprises should contact the Farm Services Agency about the U.S. Department of Agriculture assistance made available by the Secretary's declaration.
