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
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Plains Pocket Mouse

It is rare in this day and age to encounter an animal that lives in our own backyard whose life history is virtually unknown. However, there is a small rodent that calls the Panhandle of Texas its home that fits that bill.

The Plains Pocket Mouse (Perognathus flavescens) is a small, secretive rodent that inhabits the High Plains eco-region of Texas. Basically, it can be viewed north of a line that is drawn from the Monahans region northeast to Wichita Falls. Outside of Texas its natural range extends northward through the High Plains to southwestern Minnesota and southeastern North Dakota.

There are three members of this genus that reside in Texas, and this species is the largest. Adults are just over five inches in total length, with almost half of that being the tail. As with most other pocket mice, as well as the closely related Kangaroo Rats, this species feeds primarily on seeds, while grasses and insects are also consumed. Seeds are packed into their cheek pouches to allow for easy transference back to their burrows for later consumption. However, it does not seem to pose an issue from a financial standpoint, for even those specimens that have been found in agricultural areas with seeds in their nests or cheek pouches typically are only feeding on the seeds of nuisance plants

Although there is little data on the life history of this secretive rodent, the population dynamics appear to show that it is presently stable.

Famed Texas writer O. Henry, pen name for William Sydney Porter

short pen name, "O. Henry." The man behind the stories, William Sydney Porter, was a complicated character with a sharp imagination. Porter wrote hundreds of stories in his short career and became one of the best-known short story writers of the twentieth century.

Porter was born in Greensboro, North Carolina, in 1862. His father was a doctor. His mother died of tuberculosis when he was a child. He showed a deep imagination and strong artistic talents as a child. He loved reading from an early age. As a teenager, he began working at his uncle's drugstore as a pharmacist and drew sketches of the customers in his spare time.

In 1882, he moved with a friend to South Texas to attempt to rehabilitate his shaky health, working for a time on a sheep ranch as a ranch hand and a cook. Two years later, he moved to Austin to work as a pharmacist. It was in Austin that Porter began writing.

In 1887, he married and took up a new job. Porter worked for four years at the Texas General Land Office drawing maps and took a job as an accountant at a bank in 1891. However, three years later, the bank came across several accounting errors, accused him of embezzlement, and fired him. At that point, he took up writing full time, briefly publishing his own weekly humor magazine and eventually found work with The Houston Post.

Not long after the move to Houston, federal auditors charged him with embezzlement from his former bank job. He was arrested but released on bail. He fled to New Orleans where he continued to write and took up the pen name of O. Henry after a conversation with a friend. He then fled to Honduras but returned to the United States when his wife's health collapsed. His wife died within weeks of his arrival, and he was again arrested.

The trial was held in Austin, where he was sentenced to five years in prison in 1898. Ironical-

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A Texas Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is near, and the story of buckle-hatted pilgrims breaking bread with Native Americans in Plymouth, Mass. is being told all across America.

That is, except for here in the Lone Star State, where some Texans swear we did it first.

As the story goes, Spanish explorer Juan de Onate and his men pioneered the Thanksgiving tradition before the Mayflower even hit the shores of Cape Cod. In April 1598, 23 years before those storied pilgrims sat down to feast in New England, Juan de Onate ordered a day of thanks for survival after a treacherous journey. His expedition's arrival at the Rio Grande broke a five day drought, and to give thanks, the Spaniards shared

natives, who brought fish, and they feasted together in thanks for the earth's blessings in San Elizario, near El Paso.

A second Texas claim to the first Thanksgiving goes even further back in the 16th century. The expedition of Francisco

Vazquez de Coronado is said to have feasted with thanks in Palo Duro Canyon in May 1541. However, since records say pecans and grapes were gathered for this feast, and neither naturally grow near Palo Duro Canyon, some doubt this story's accuracy, or at least its

Our state's ties to modern-day Thanksgiving are more clear, and center around the best part of Thanksgiving dinner: the pie. Texas farmers supply bakers across the country with to fill their crusts each year, and don't forget that Pumpkin Capital, USA is just northeast of Lubbock in Floydada, Texas.

We certainly can't talk about Thanksgiving without paying homage to Texas' biggest game bird. After all, the turkey has lent its name to Turkey Peak, Turkey Mountain, and most notably, the city of Turkey, Texas located in the Panhandle. After nearing extinction in the late 19th century, Texas' turkey population today is again alive and well. Three native species roam across the Lone Star State

-- the Rio Grande, the Eastern, and the Merriam - and about 20,000 Texas turkeys will be hunted and served fresh at the hunter's Thanksgiving table.

But of course, the most Texan thing on our proverbial plate

this Thanksgiving won't be the turkey or the pie, but the annual tradition of giving thanks and giving back.

Prevent tooth decay kits contain: a toothbrush, toothpaste, dental floss, healthy teeth sticker, two-minute timer (optimal brushing time), Tips for Healthy Teeth educational information for parents in both Spanish and English, and a summary of MHS services. All first graders at three is the single most common chronic childhood diseasefive times more common than asthma and seven times more common than hay fever. With more than 1.5 million Texas children living in poverty, there is a great need for preventive dental care.

Dental problems also directly affect success for children, with more than 51 million school hours lost each year to dental-related illness. Teachers have judged both classroom performance and classroom behavior to be significantly poorer among children in need of dental care. Pain and suffering due to untreated dental disease can also lead to problems in eating and speaking.




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

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


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DPS urges Thanksgiving drivers to pack safety first
