





Hinkle is most famous for teaching Hollywood stars to "talk Texan." In the classic movie Giant, Hinkle coached Rock Hudson, Carroll Baker, Dennis Hopper, Mercedes McCambridge and James Dean to "talk Texan." Hinkle then took his experience from Giant to the set of Hud and did for Paul Newman what he had done for James Dean by coaching Newman, Patricia Neal and Melvin Douglas.

Hinkle's career was not limited to "talking Texan." He did a variety of notable things: creating and directing the pig scramble in "Hud," signing an unknown singer named Glen Campbell to a country music series, developing and

promoting "Evel Knievel" as he became the world's best known showman-daredevil, and being the personal manager for Marty Robbins.

Hinkle says his most memorable achievement, however, goes back to winning a \$20 bet that he could get a date with the Queen of the Rodeo in Moses Lake. After introducing himself to Sandra Larson, he dedicated his bull ride to her along with a tip of his hat from the center of the arena. Sandra not only went to the dance with him that night, but married him a year-and-ahalf later! The Hinkles raised three children and now live back

In the spirit of the night's theme we will host a contest to pick the best person who can "talk Texan." We are featuring this as a Book-to-Author event, made possible by a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services and the Texas State Library and Archives Commission. The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2017 are just over seven percent higher than 2016, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Glenn Hegar reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, January 11th.

Cross Plains' 2017 sales tax payments for the year totaled \$19,164.81, which is 7.74 percent higher than the \$17,787.51 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2016.

The payment to the city for January 2017 was the same amount as the yearly total.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today, Wednesday, January 11th, he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$647.4 million in local sales tax allocations for January, 4.9 percent more than in January 2016. These allocations are based on sales made in November by businesses that report tax monthly.

"The cities of Dallas, Fort Worth, Austin and San Antonio continue to see significant increases in sales tax allocations," Hegar said. "The cities of Houston and Sugar Land saw noticeable decreases in sales tax allocations."

Hegar sent Texas cities \$421.4 million in January 2017, which is higher by 4.8 percent compared to January 2016 and higher by 4.8 percent year-to-date.

He reported \$38.5 million in January 2017 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 3.0 percent compared to January 2016 and higher by 3.0 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$146.5 million in January 2017 sales tax allocations, which is 3.6 percent higher than January 2016 and higher by 3.6 percent year-to-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$41.0 million in January 2017 allocations, which is 12.3 percent higher than January 2016 and higher by 12.3 percent year-to-date.

Total sales tax allocations were \$647.4 million in January 2017, which is 4.9 percent higher than January 2016 and higher 4.9 percent year-to-date.



Disable applicants must apply with the appraisal district and furnish a determination letter from Social Security. Disabled persons now receive all benefits on their home that are available to over 65 persons (see below).

PERSONS WHO ARE **OVER 65 YEARS OF AGE-EXEMPTIONS AND DEFERRAL** 

Persons who are over 65 years of age or disabled persons may file for additional exemptions and a ceiling on school taxes for their residential homestead if they become 65 during 2016 or will be 65 during 2017. Over-65 persons should apple for this exemption at the appraisal district office in their county.

Over-65 person are also eligible to defer paying the tax on their residential homestead if they wish. The taxes continue to accrue during the deferral along with an interest rate of 8% annually, but no attempt will be made to force payment during the deferral. Details and an application may be obtained from any appraisal district or the State Comptroller.

### **DISABLED VETERANS**

Persons who have been declared disabled by the Veteran's Administration are eligible for additional exemptions on property they own. The declaration letter from VA is mailed annually, but the appraisal district only needs a copy in the first year of eligibility or if the percentage of disability changes. In certain situations where the disabled vet is 100% disabled and unemployable, their homestead can be completely exempt. An annual reapplication for the 100% exemptions may be required by the Chief Appraiser.

### **FARM AND RANCH OWNERS**

Farmers and ranchers may be entitled to receive an alternate method of appraisal determined by the farm income to the property. This method is available to farms and ranches commercially raising crops or livestock or which are used as a wildlife habitat under State guidelines. An application for agricultural use value and additional information is available from your appraisal district. Re-filing is only necessary if requested to do so by the Chief Appraiser.

### **EXEMPTION APPLICATIONS**

Exemption applications for all property tax exemptions including total exemptions for charitable, religious, and other total exemptions may be obtained from an appraisal district nearest you or

through the State http://www. windowns.state.tx.us/taxinfo/ taxforms/02-forms.html.

### **BUSINESS PERSONAL PROPERTY OWNERS**

State law now requires the filing of a rendition declaring what types of business personal property that a person or company owns. Failure to file the rendition will result in a 10% penalty. If a fraudulent rendition is filing, a 50% penalty is mandated. A rendition can be obtained from the appraisal district office where the property is located. Deadline-April 15. A 30 day filing extension is available by written request.

Callahan County Business reminded to render taxable property by April 15th

If you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income, you must file a rendition with the Callahan County Appraisal District by April 15th, 2017.

A rendition is a report that lists all the taxable property a person owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. Tax laws require all businesses to pay property tax based on the value of the assets used in the business to generate income. These assets include inventory, furniture, fixtures, machinery, equipment and vehicles. Owners do not have to render exempt property, such as church property or agriculture producers' equipment used for farming, unless specifically requested from the Chief Appraiser. By April 15th of each year, business owners must provide the appraisal district with a listing of those assets. Your business should have received a Confidential **Business Personal Rendition** from the appraisal district. If you have not received this form please call at 325/854-5865. If you own multiple business locations, you will need to complete the rendition form for each location.

The Appraisal District

may use the information submitted in the rendition to set property values as well as field inspections of businesses. You can also file a report of decreased value to notify the district of significant deprecation of your property. For example, if your property was damaged by a storm, flood, or fire last year, you should file a report of decreased value. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2017.

The last day to file a rendition or report of decreased value is April 15, 2017. If a rendition is filed late or incomplete or not at all a 10 percent penalty will be imposed, if a fraudulent rendition is filing, a 50 percent penalty is mandated. Property owners who need more time to file their renditions may file a written request for an extension with the chief appraiser on or before April 15, 2017 to receive an automatic extension to May 15th or the next business day if it falls on a holiday or weekend.

For more information about rendering property, deadline extensions, penalties and rendition forms, taxpayers may contact the Callahan County Appraisal District, 132 w. 4th St., Baird, TX 79504 or by phone at 325/854-5865.

### AVAILABILITY OF ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATIONS

Taxpayers may receive certain notices required by law from the local appraisal district in electronic format. Written agreements with the county appraisal district must be entered firs, t ensuring what electronic means of delivery are acceptable. If you are interested in receiving communications in electronic format, you should contact your local appraisal district to receive a form requesting electronic communication and how that communication should be transmitted.



As a child, his father was often in battle against frontier Națive American tribes. These experiences, coupled with the kidnapping of an uncle by one tribe, led Ross to develop a great deal of animosity against the tribes. When he came of age, he served with the army in raids on the Comanches, even briefly leaving college to fight. He grad-Alabama in 1859 and joined the Texas Rangers in 1860, engaging in numerous battles against the tribes in the Young County area and northwest toward the Pease River.

He entered the Confederate army when the Civil War began. He became a colonel with the 6th Texas Cavalry and participated in the bloody Confederate losses at Pea Ridge, Arkansas, and Corinth, Mississippi. In 1864, he was promoted to general, and at age 26, was one of the youngest in the Confederacy.

He returned to Texas in 1865 and rebounded from the war. He expanded his property holdings and was elected sheriff of McLennan County in 1873. As Reconstruction came to an end, he was elected as a delegate to the state constitutional convention that drafted the 1876 constitution the state still uses. In 1880, he was drafted to run for state senate. The county Democratic convention could not agree between two candidates and chose Ross as a compromise. Ross reluctantly accepted and won in a landslide.

As early as 1884, newspapers began calling for Ross to run for governor. In 1886, he threw his hat into the ring and won

In 1894, he was a offered a figure on campus, and students developed a great deal of loyalty toward him. However, he died suddenly at the age of 59 in 1898. University students accompanied Ross's body to Waco where the funeral was held.

In 1917, the state established Sul Ross State Normal College in Alpine in his memory. Nearly three thousand students now attend Sul Ross State University. Ross's influence continued to be felt at Texas A&M. A street on campus was later named in his honor. A statue of Ross was placed on the Texas A&M campus in 1918. Students to this day often place pennies at the feet of the statue for good luck on their exams.

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
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### Swainson's Hawk

As I have stated time and again, my passion for the outdoors began with an unbridled fascination with reptiles. Growing up as a budding naturalist, I was not the most avid birdwatcher, but even at an early age, I would find myself somewhat enamored with the group of birds known as raptors. And one raptor species that I most assuredly witnessed as a youngster was a common summer resident, the Swainson's Hawk.

The Swainson's Hawk (Buteo swainsoni) is a large bird of prey that occurs throughout the plains of North America, from southern Canada southward to Texas. Throughout its North American range, it is a migratory species. This means that it resides in North America (including the western ¾ of Texas) during the warmer summer months and dwells in warmer areas during the winter. 

Mr. Pyle volunteered to talk to the school students. It was something he had been thinking about for sometime. While working as a trustee at the Jail, he was moving some

boxes of new drug abuse literature from a building behind the jail to another location. He approached me about the literature and told me that when I decided to pass out this material to the school students he would like to go with me and talk to the students about the dangers of drug use, by using his own life as an example.

I was thrilled to hear this because it went along with my philosophy of education, prevention, and enforcement. Mr. Pyle made notes of his life history concerning drug use that started in the 5th grade and has ended in the Callahan County Jail.

Mr. Pyle said he was at a turning point in his life and wanted to use this opportunity to reach out to the students to prevent them from taking the

path that he took and most importantly to encourage them to stay in school and finish their education. His greatest regret was droping out of school in the ninth grade at Lake Travis High School as his grades began to decline because of drugs. He played baseball as a starting 3rd baseman. He said he was also a very good hitter and batted in cleanup position.

Mr. Pyle also wanted the opportunity to reassure his wife and family that he was using his time in a productive manner.

Each student attending the program received lliterature explaining the dangers of drug use. Callahan County has good schools, excellent teachers and wonderful children. Lets all work together to keep dangerous drugs away from our young people!
