



Jose A. Navarro, one of the signers of the Texas Declaration of Independence

next is the actions of that generation as children so closely watch their parents. Jose Antonio Navarro, a leader of the Texas Revolution, was inspired for a life of service by his father. In turn, he would inspire his own children and citizens across the state.

Navarro was born in San Antonio in 1795. He was one of twelve children, only six of whom survived to adulthood. His father, Angel Navarro, was a generous and popular figure died in 1808 when the younger

Navarro was only 13. His father's worldly adventures, success, dedication to his family, and the deep respect the people of San Antonio had for him had a profound impact on. Angel Navarro was born into a wealthy family in Corsica, just south of France in the Mediterranean Sea. His mother was a noble, and his father was a businessman, and in 1762, at the age of 14, his ran away from home. After a series of adventures between Corsican revolutionaries and seedy ports and working a series of odd jobs, he made his way to the New World. He arrived in San Antonio by 1777, where he established his own successful business enterprises. He was the city's first elected alcalde in 1790, a position that was a combination of mayor and judge.

Jose Navarro grew up determined to live up to his father's legacy. He trained to become an attorney. In 1813, San Antonio was briefly occupied by forces Gutierrez-Magee Expedition, a brief effort to tear Texas away from the faltering Spanish occupation and annex it to the United States. Navarro supported the revolt, but was forced to flee to the United States for three years after Spanish forces rallied and defeated the expedition.

In the 1820s, he had developed a friendship with Stephen F. Austin and began helping him with his colonization efforts. By the 1830s, he was a popular voice for Texas. He first won election to the Coahuila y Texas state legislature and then to Mexico's federal Congress. He also served as a land commissioner, helping settlers into the new land.

He became increasingly critical of Mexico's policies toward Texas. He openly supported the

Texas Declaration of Independence. He supported the initial attempt at annexation to the United States in 1836, but was disappointed when the United States declined out of fear of provoking Mexico into war. In 1838, he was elected to the Texas Congress, representing Bexar County. He supported policies attempting to expand trade outlets for Texas, defending Texas against continued reprisals from Mexico, and defending the rights in San Antonio. However, he of Hispanics, which were under mounting assaults.

In 1841, he participated in the disastrous Santa Fe Expedition. Texas President Mirabeau Lamar had hoped to tap into trade with New Mexico to expand the reach of Texas. However, New Mexico was deep into Mexican territory. Troops captured Navarro and the caravan. After being imprisoned in Veracruz for more than a year, Navarro managed to escape and return to Texas by mid-1843.

Navarro returned to politics and was a delegate to the state native, writer, and history proconstitutional convention of fessor. He can be reached at 1845, which completed Texas's

The most important legacy of Texas Revolution when the war first state constitution. After one generation leaves for the erupted. In 1836, he signed the statehood, he served two terms in the state senate.

In honor of his work for the state, the Texas legislature named Navarro County after him in 1846. Navarro himself founded the county seat of Corsicana, now a thriving city of nearly 24,000 residents, in 1848, naming it in honor of his father's homeland.

His four sons served in the Confederate army during the Civil War, and one son later served in the state legislature, continuing a tradition of public

Navarro spent his later years writing and ranching near Seguin. The site has since become a historical landmark. He died in San Antonio in January 1871 at the age of 75. At a statue at the Navarro County Courthouse in Corsicana, he is described as a "Lover of Liberty; Foe of Despotism" - a fitting epitaph to a man who dedicated his life


Guests were treated to free copies of Hinkle's book, thanks to a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services and the Texas Library and Archives Commission.



Pronghorn

Simply taking a drive on back roads throughout this great state can open endless opportunities for viewing wildlife that normally would be overlooked. When driving in the grasslands of the Panhandle or the Trans-Pecos, I always invite the occasion of viewing a small, distinctively curious mammal that once had a significantly larger range. That mammal is the Pronghorn.

Pronghorns (known erroneously by many as Antelope) are hooved mammals that have a deerlike appearance about them. The coloration is two-toned with a brown, tan, or fawnlike back, neck and head interspaced with large patches of white on the belly, sides, and face. The tail and back end are also white. The chin, jaw and tip of the ears are black.

The Pronghorn is relatively small as adult males are typically just under 5 feet in total length (with a comparatively petite - 6 inch - tail) and a weight of just over 130 pounds. Females are somewhat smaller with a top weight of just under 90 pounds.

Male Pronghorn have horns that are spiked (hence the common name) and extend well past the tip of the ears. Females on the other hand have much shorter horns that are generally not "pronged".

The Pronghorn (Antilocapra americana) is the only remaining species in a family known as Antilocapridae; this family was once distributed throughout North America and was comprised of roughly 12 species. Until the past several decades, Pronghorn could be spotted throughout the western 3/4 of Texas on a fairly regular basis. At one point, its range in this state was anywhere westward from a line that extends from Dallas southward through Austin to the lower Rio Grande Valley. Presently, its range is

Abilene man charged with murder after body found on T&P Lake near Baird

A woman's body found lake south of Baird Friday. Friday, January 27th near a Callahan County lake is that of Megan Dearman, 31, of Abilene, an Abilene Police Department spokesman said.

The body was found about noon near the T&P Lake, south of Baird, according to Callahan County Sheriff Terry Joy.

Abilene police investigators looking into the disappearance of a 31-year-old Abilene woman were called to the scene about 1:00 p.m. and requested Texas Rangers join the investigation, police spokesman Rick Tomlin said in a statement.

Police are investigating the disappearance of Meagan Dearman, who was last seen January 17th.

Dearman's family was notified only that a body was found. Tomlin said. He said identification will be made by a medical examiner.

Sheriff Joy said Baird Police Officer Trica Simcik notified the Callahan County Sheriff's Department around noon on Friday of a body discovered on the T&P Lake, which is owned by the City of Baird.

Sheriff Joy said he and investigator Frank Weise were called to the scene by Officer Simcik and they immediately called the Texas Rangers and Abilene Police Department.

Sheriff Joy said the body was found by Lonnie McIntosh, who owns property adjacent to T&P Lake and said the body was found on the ground along a fence line near the lake.

The body was taken by Abilene Professional Services from the scene.

A 32-year-old Abilene man

Justin Bennett, who was arrested Thursday on unrelated

charges, was charged with murder in connection with the death of Meagan Dearman, who had been missing since

"Early on (Jan. 25) we began to receive some information that Ms. Dearman was deceased," Abilene Police Sgt. Lynn Beard said Monday. "Also, the early information indicated her boyfriend, Justin Bennett, was the suspect. On the 26th of January, we located Mr. Bennett at a residence in Merkel. Members of our SWAT team were able to take him safely into custody."

According to a search warrant for Bennett's DNA released Monday, an Abilene police detective was investigating the case when he learned that Bennett and Dearman had gotten into a fight before she disappeared.

The detective reportedly was told by an informant that Bennett said he (Dearman) bad." Police later Bennett had buried Dearman's body at a lake after the fight. On Friday, the body of a woman situations like hers. was found near T&P Lake in

The body was identified as Dearman's, according to the affidavit for the search warrant. By the time the woman's body was found, Bennett already had been arrested on of that abusive relationship," four outstanding warrants, Beard said. But when he was questioned about her disappearance, Bennett was "very uncooperative," telling

Beard said Bennett remains uncooperative with police, adding a motive for Dearman's

death has yet to be determined. Police interviews with more informants revealed that one of Bennett's friends allowed him to use her car earlier this month, according to the warrant. She gave detectives permission to search the vehicle, where they found what appeared to be blood. The informant also said that Bennett admitted to her that he killed Dearman by strangulation.

The warrant also says that a size 16 shoe print was found "at the crime scene" - it doesn't specify whether the scene of the crime was at the lake or elsewhere — that matched the shoes Bennett was wearing when he was arrested.
