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Little Brown Skink


I know I have written time and time again how funny common names of creatures can be to me. Sometimes these common names can describe where an animal lives, or what time of day it is active, or even its coloration. One such common Texas native that the latter grouping applies to is a diminutive lizard known simply as the Little Brown Skink.

The Little Brown Skink (Scincella lateralis) is one of eight species of skinks that reside in Texas, but it is the only one of its genus. The other seven species of Texas skinks belong to the genus Plestiodon. This common lizard has a fairly large distribution as it can be observed roughly east of an imaginary line from Sanderson northeastward to Wichita Falls. Outside of Texas it may be found eastward to Florida and northward to New Jersey

This little lizard prefers to live in areas where the humidity can be maintained at somewhat high levels. This is usually accomplished in wooded areas with an abundance of leaf litter, including canyons and other woodlands. Additional habitats include grasslands where the ground vegetation is dense and along the edges of ponds and creeks. It also will utilize manmade cover such as boards and flagstones and as such, many specimens can be found in the most urban of settings.

The Little Brown Skink is an elongate lizard with exceptionally tiny legs and a long, somewhat slender tail. Adults of this thin skink can reach a total length of nearly 5 ½ inches; however, the body makes up a small portion of this at less than 2 inches in length. As with all species of this genus, the scales are so slick and shiny that the lizard at first glance appears to be wet. However, like other reptiles, the skin is completely dry and not slimy at all.

As the common implies, not only is this sleek lizard petite, but it is also brown. The color-

Part II of John Wesley Hardin Profile

of the most violent figures of a violent age. Born in Bonham to a Methodist preacher in 1853, he quickly moved to a life of crime. By the time he was 18, he killed perhaps eight people. This was only the beginning of a bloody career as a gunfighter.

He escaped Texas authorities in 1871 after killing the Waco town marshal and found work on a cattle drive. According to several sources, he engaged in several gunfights with would-be cattle thieves that left maybe five men dead before arriving in Kansas.

It was August 1871 that saw one of his most notorious killings. He was in Abilene, Kansas, then a notoriously riotous trailhead town. He had fallen into a drunken stupor after a night of gambling and retired to a hotel room for the night. More than a century the thin walls. Hardin started officer John Selman, Jr., on a after Hardin's death, he still shouting at the man about his snoring, to no avail. Still drunk, Hardin pulled out his guns and started firing through the walls, shooting the snoring man in the head, killing him instantly. Hardin then jumped out of his second-story window to avoid arrest, stole a horse, and then rode back to Texas.

Two months later, he found himself in another gunfight with two Texas state policemen, killing one and wounding another. He claimed to have killed three members of a posse near Austin. After several more gunfights, he injured another state policeman near Hemphill in July 1872. In August, he was shot after an argument over a poker hand in Trinity. Once his identity was confirmed by local authorities, he was arrested but accidentally shot while in custody. After recovering from his injuries, he escaped the county jail and was on the run again.

In May 1874, he killed Deputy Sheriff Charles Webb in a saloon in the central Texas town of Comanche. The killing enraged townspeople, resulting in the lynching of Hardin's own brother as he escaped from Brown County to Florida. Texas authorities set a large reward for his capture. Hardin was on the run for nearly three years before Texas Rangers captured him on a train in Pensacola in August 1877. Rangers knocked him unconscious and dragged him

time, there would be no escape. He was found guilty in June 1878 and sentenced to 25 years in prison, a surprisingly light sentence for the time. He served his time at the state prison in

Huntsville, and tried and failed several times to escape. In spite El Paso the next day. of his crimes, he studied law and theology and eventually ran the prison Sunday School. In February 1894, he was released for good behavior, though he still had eight years left on his

After his release, he plotted his next career move and somehow decided that becoming an attorney was the best fit. He passed the bar exam and moved to Gonzales. He left shortly afterward when he shot a man on a \$5 bet. His next move was to El Paso where he spent time scrambling for money in poker games and


> In the end, the man who lived by the gun died by the gun. As for Selman, he escaped conviction but was killed in a gunfight with a U. S. Marshal the next year.

Since Hardin's death, many studies have been done on his wild career. Hardin recounted his own life in a book that was published posthumously in 1895. As in life, so many details of his career were embellished or could never be verified. The 1956 film The Lawless Breed was loosely based on Hardin's autobiography. He was also featured in Texas writer Larry McMurtry's The Streets of Laredo within the city limits. Hardin a gunman that left more than

patriotic holiday honoring the memory of those brave men and women who gave their lives in the military service of our country to preserve the freedom we enjoy today.

Beginning with 8 citizensoldiers who fell near Lexington, Virginia at the start of the American Revolution, more than 1,354,664 Americans have died serving our country and over 40,917 remain missing in action. This ultimate sacrifice is still being made by our courageous men and women in the prolonged War on Terrorism. There will be more as long as we homo sapiens are a warring species.

Memorial Day is always observed on the last Monday in May (May 29 this year) to memorialize those who died in the military service of our country. The weekend traditionally begins the summer vacation season. Memorial Day should not be confused with Veterans Day (every November 11) that recognizes those who have served in the military of our country.

"On fame's eternal campingground

their silent tents are spread, and glory guards, with sudden sound.

The bivouac of the dead." These lines from the poem "Bivouac of the Dead" by Theodore O'Hara (1820-1867, American poet, veteran of the Mexican War & Civil War) grace the original entrance to Arlington National Cemetery. There on every Memorial Day a wreath is ceremonially placed at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier by our President. The National Memorial Day

Memorial Day is a national Concert is held on the Capitol lawn. Patriotic parades and ceremonies occur throughout the country. The National Moment of Remembrance Act passed by Congress requests that we pause at 3 pm to remember our fallen heroes.

> The American flag is customarily raised to the top of the staff in the morning and lowered to half-staff until noon when it is returned to full staff for the rest of the day. Lowering to half-staff represents remembrance of those fallen. Return to full staff symbolizes their memory being raised by the living who resolve not to let their sacrifice be in vain, but to rise up for them and fight for liberty and justice.

The most unique Memorial Day celebration in Callahan County takes place at historic Belle Plaine Cemetery 8 miles south of Baird off of US Highway 283. This pioneer cemetery was established in the 1870s by Belle Plaine settlers on a solitary hill overlooking the ruins of old Belle Plaine city. The 9 acre cemetery was deeded to the county by the Texas & Pacific Railroad in 1884 and is maintained by the nonprofit Belle Plaine Cemetery Association composed of local volunteers. The oldest marked grave is dated 1878, but there are unmarked graves that may date earlier. Those buried there are county pioneer settlers and their descendants, including Civil War, World War I & II, Korean War, Cuban Crisis and Vietnam War veterans. It is an official state historical site designated by the Texas Historical Commission. County residents may be buried there upon approval of the

Association.

A memorial stone at the cemetery entrance is dedicated to the Belle Plaine pioneers. It is inscribed with this poem by the late Callahan County rancher and descendant of Belle Plaine settlers, Jack Flores, Jr.:

"As fade the leaf and morning

so fades our lives each passing hour

as dews that melt before the

so pass our lives one by one "

The town of Belle Plaine (French for "beautiful prairie") was founded by pioneer families who came west and settled this frontier prairie land of the buffalo, rattlesnake, cactus, mesquite and Comanche. It was the first official county seat of Callahan County as well as home of one of the area's first colleges. From 1865 until 1885, the Western Trail (or Texas Trail) for longhorn cattle trail drives that began in South Texas and ended at the northern rail-heads in Dodge City (KS), Ogallala (NB) and Fort Union (ND) came through Belle Plaine. In 1883, the Texas & Pacific Railroad construction west was routed through Baird and the county seat changed to Baird. By 1909, Belle Plaine had declined with most residents

relocating to Baird. For the past 35 years, the Belle Plaine Cemetery Association has hosted an annual Memorial Day gathering, ceremony and meal to honor all deceased veterans who sacrificed their lives in the service of our country. It is open to the public, admission is free and there is convenient parking. The ceremony will begin promptly at 11 am on Monday, May 29th.

You are requested to please arrive and be parked by 10:30 am. 

Celebrating 100 years of **Ellington Field in Houston**

A lot has changed in Houston, Texas over the past 100 years. For one, the city's population is now about seventeen times what it was in 1917. We've found better ways to beat the year-round heat than 300-pound blocks of ice, thankfully. And you don't see too many horses and buggies riding down Houston's

Westheimer Road anymore. But one institution that has stood the test of time, and is still up-and-running on its 100th anniversary this month, is Houston's Ellington Field-and you could say its history is the story of a lifetime.

Ellington Field was built in May of 1917 - just weeks after the United States entered World War I - when the War Department purchased 1,280 acres of land south of Houston. The location was chosen for its favorable flight conditions. It would soon be the site of a firstclass pilot training base to meet the rising demand for military pilots in Europe.

The 120th Aero Squadron was transferred from San Antonio's Kelly Field to Ellington Field, and civilian pilots were brought in from across the nation to train America's newest airmen for battle. They trained quickly and efficiently, and returned home from Europe as victors

of the Great War. The end of the war threatened the deactivation of Ellington Field, but it wasn't long before another unit took advantage of the prime real estate. In 1923, when the War Department authorized the Texas National Guard to establish its first aviation squadrons, the 111th Observation Squadron -- tasked with mapping, photography, and reconnaissance support for the U.S. 36th Infantry Division -- found its home on traveled the nation to survey the runways of Ellington Field. When "Houston's Own" 111th Squadron moved west to smoother runways at the newly-built Houston Municipal Airport in 1927 (known today as Houston Hobby), Ellington Field became obsolete. Prairie grass grew so tall over Ellington's runways that the War Department resorted to leasing the land to cattle grazers for revenue.

But the rise of the Second World War created new demand for pilots, navigators, and bombardiers - and required top-notch training facilities to get them ready for battle fast. Once again Houston's favorable flight conditions, and the desire to protect the area's oil refineries that fueled war efforts, brought the War Department's focus back to Ellington Field. The government still owned the abandoned base, and Houston's rapid growth had accessible by highway and rail.

Once again, Ellington Field became a premiere flight training facility, home to the U.S. Army Air Corps' Bombardment Academy of the Air. Its well-trained pilots again returned home victorious and were so essential to the war effort that they led the United States to establish an independent U.S. Air Force.

As a reflection of the U.S. commitment to the Air Force, Ellington Field became Ellington Air Force Base. Its buildings and runways were renovated for a fleet of larger and heavier aircraft, and it became the new home to the Civil Air Patrol, a public service unit centered on emergency service missions such as search and rescue and disaster relief.

Soon, the U.S. was ready for a new type of flight. In the early 1960s, NASA officials

locations to house their new astronaut training complex, and they came to the same conclusion the War Department did 45 years earlier: the Houston climate was perfect for flight training. That, along with Houston's infrastructure, access to deep-water ports, and its first-class universities, led them to choose Houston as their new headquarters, and Ellington Air Force Base as their new astronaut flight training facility. It's where Neil Armstrong trained to maneuver in low-gravity zones, withstand G-forces, and even plant an American flag before he became the first man to land on the moon in 1969. And it's now supporting NASA's next great mission: landing a human on Mars.

Today, on Ellington Field's 100th anniversary, it is one of the few World War I installations still in use. It just became made Ellington Field more one of only ten FAA licensed commercial spaceports in the United States. It accommodates NASA, supports civilian airports, and the Ellington Joint Reserve Base boasts the unique distinction of serving all five branches of the U.S. military -Air Force, Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard.

For a century, Ellington Field has been a second home to those leading U.S. aviation and space exploration, defending democracy across the globe, and providing hope and support to Americans after natural disasters. I am proud to commend its 100 years of meaningful service.

Dijon mustard, divided * 3 tablespoons honey


* 2 tablespoons butter
