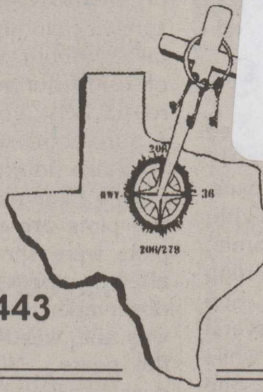

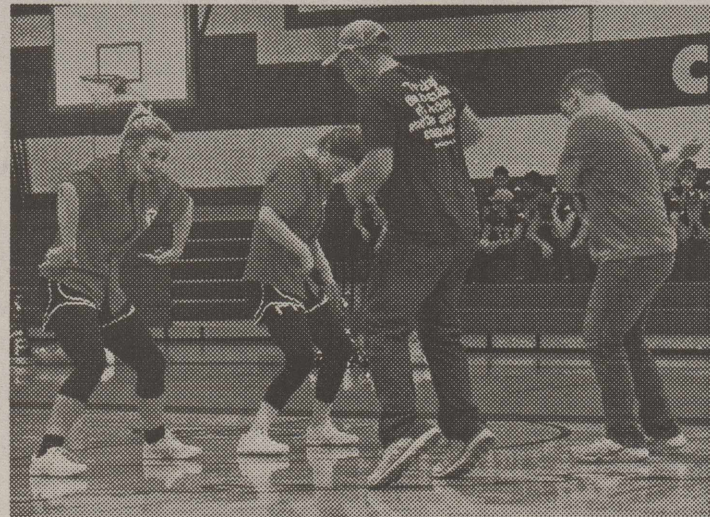
Two quilts are being raffled again this year. One, a

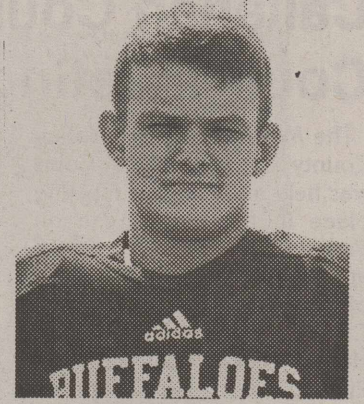


Creed Goode Named to Big Country Top 10

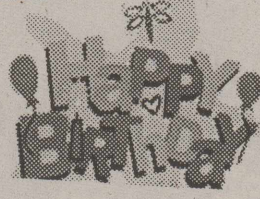
The Abilene Reporter News goes on to state that Goode "also chalked up 10 tackles (three for loss) and two quarterback hurries from his linebacker spot."

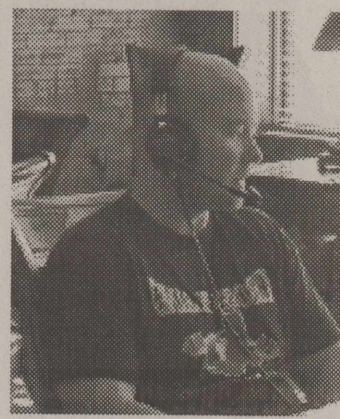
KWBY to Air Coach Purvis' Radio Show Thursday Mornings and Football Games on Friday Nights

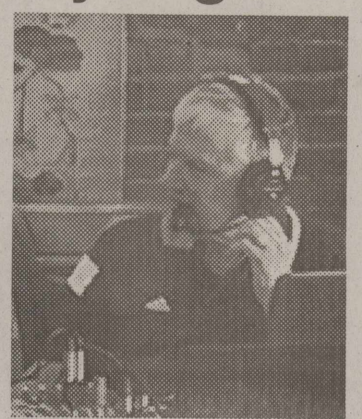
Buffaloes Head Coach Daniel Purvis radio show can be heard every Thursday morning during football season. The show features Coach Purvis with Mike Corley.

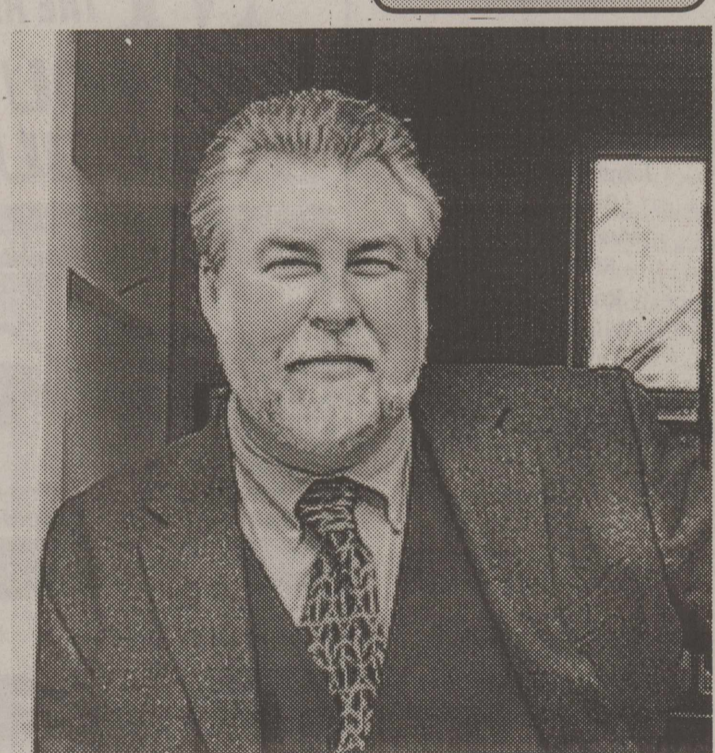

DR. STEVE HARDIN

The Alamo: What's it About

Dr. Steve Hardin will present a program about the Alamo on Thursday, October 26, 2017 at the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains, Texas.

Dr. Hardin is a Texan historian and author. He attended Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos, Texas receiving both a BA and MA in History. Later, he attended Texas Christian University in Ft. Worth, Texas, where he received a PHD specializing in Texas History.

Currently, he teaches at McMurry University in Abilene, Texas. Although he is an American, Dr. Hardin prefers to assert that his nationality is Texan, on the grounds that Texas was once an independent nation.

He is considered a leading expert in Texas military and social history and is widely cited with regards to the Battle of the Alamo. Dr. Hardin has appeared on the History Channel in "The

Alamo Documentary: A True Story of Courage" and he was, also, a historic advisor to John Lee Hancock's 2004 movie, The Alamo, starring Billy Bob Thornton. He has been a consultant on many documentaries and projects. In 1993, he was on screen commentator for "The Texas Rangers" segment of The Real West documentary series on the Arts and Entertainment Network. He was Host and on screen commentator for "Spanish Texas," part of The Birth of Texas series aired on Houston PBS, March 2013. One of his books, Texas Iliad: A Military History of the Texas Revolution was listed among the "Ten Best Texas Books by The Austin Chronicle in February, 1996.

Dr. Hardin was born in 1953 and is married to Deborah Bloys Hardin. They have two children, Walker and Savannah Hardin.

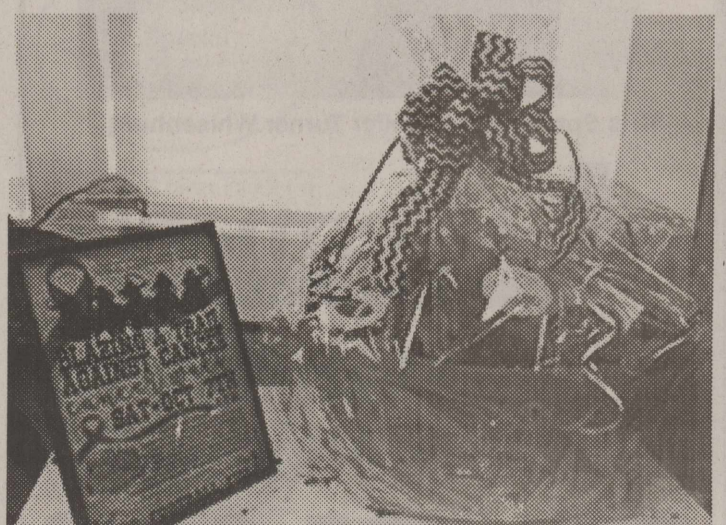

Buffaloes Play Eldorado Friday Night After One Point Loss to San Saba 33-32



Cross Plains Falls 33-32 to San Saba

The Cross Plains High School football team lost a heartbreaker Friday night.

Elijah Salinas dashed 52 yards for a touchdown with 2:40 remaining to give San Saba a come-from-behind 33-32 victory over the Buffaloes in a non-district game at Cross Plains. Both teams are now 2-2 on the season.

Creed Goode, who ran for 247 yards and five touchdowns on 23 carries, gave Cross Plains an early 20-0 lead. He had TD runs of 8 and 80 yards in first quarter and then scored on a 17-yard run with 6:11 to go in the second quarter to put the Buffaloes in front 20-0.

San Saba answered with a 60-yard touchdown pass from Sean O'Keefe to Cole Tupin, but Cross Plains came right back to score on Goode's 8-yard run, increasing the Buffaloes' lead to 25-7 with 3:39 remaining.

The Armadillos, however, scored a pair of touchdowns in the final 97 seconds of the first half to trim Cross Plains' lead to 25-20. Klay Prew caught a 5-yard TD pass from O'Keefe with 1:37 remaining before intermission. San Saba then recovered a Cross Plains turnover and struck quickly with a 55-yard touchdown pass from O'Keefe to Ruben Para with 1:04 left.

Cross Plains increased its lead to 32-20 early in the third quarter on Goode's 47-yard touchdown run, but the Buffaloes failed to score again. San Saba scored a pair of touchdowns in the fourth quarter on O'Keefe's 14-yard keeper with 10:22 left and then Salinas' game-winning 52-yard scamper.

The Buffaloes had 362 yards rushing and picked up 15 first downs to just nine for San Saba. Three missed extra points, however, proved to be the difference for Cross Plains.

O'Keefe completed 11 passes for 193 yards and

three touchdowns to pace the Armadillos' offense.

Cross Plains will be at home this Friday to play host to Eldorado in another non-district game.

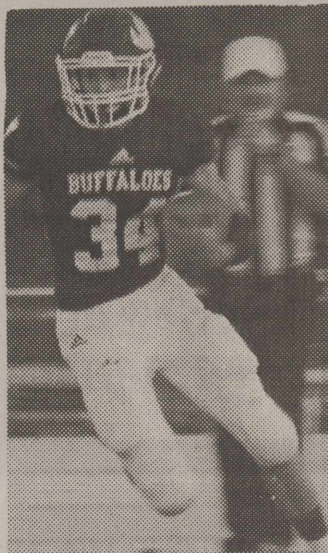

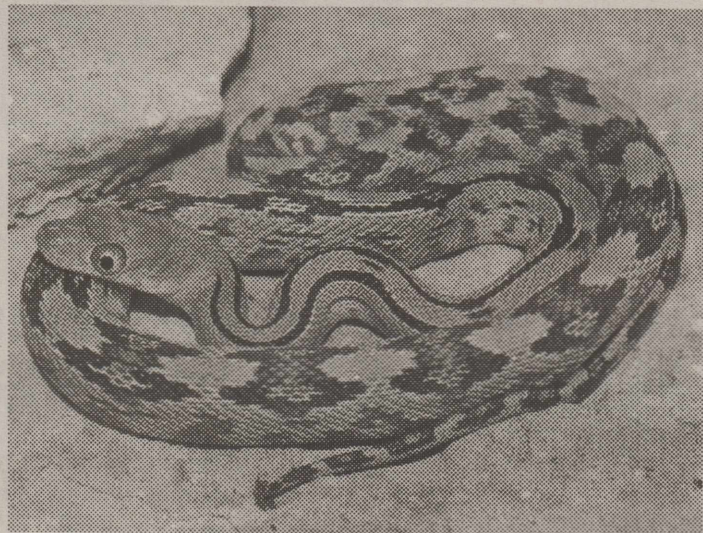

Trans-Pecos Ratsnake

Almost every time I select a topic to write about for this column, I go back and fondly recollect something about that topic from my childhood. Invariably, I recall seeing pictures or reading about a subject in a book, and one particular chapter in one particular book still gets me energized, even to this day. That chapter was devoted to a species of nocturnal ratsnake that is found throughout the Trans-Pecos region, and that species is the Trans-Pecos Ratsnake.



Trans-Pecos Ratsnake (Bogertophis subocularis)

The Trans-Pecos Ratsnake (Bogertophis subocularis) is a distinctly marked serpent of medium size that occurs from western Texas and southeastern New Mexico southward into the Mexican state of Durango. In Texas, it is relegated to the Chihuahuan Desert in Trans-Pecos region (hence the common name), primarily west of the Pecos River. It prefers to utilize the rocky canyons and hillsides as home, although occasional specimens may be found wandering in the lower elevation flats.

Although it is technically classified as a ratsnake, this particular species actually belongs to a genus of snakes that only has 2 members; the other being native to the desert regions of Baja California. Both species are unique among North American serpents in the fact that they both possess 40 pairs of chromosomes; all other snake species in this area possess either 36 or 38.

There are 2 very distinctive traits that this unique species displays in both pattern and body structure that can be used to distinguish it from other native species. The first is the presence of 25 to 40 dark cross-bands along the back that, coupled with 2 thick, dorsolateral lines give the appearance of an "H-shaped" pattern. The background coloration typically varies by population: those found in the Stockton Plateau regions (where the habitat is typical light limestone) are generally a light tan whereas those specimens found in the darker igneous

rock formations of the sky island mountains of far western Texas display a bright yellow or orange background.

The second diagnostic characteristic is the presence of a small row of scales separating the large rounded eyes from the upper lip scales. These scales give the snake an almost appealing "bug-eyed" appearance.

Most adult Trans-Pecos Ratsnakes are between 24 and 48 inches in total length, although older specimens may attain lengths of up to 66 inches.

The Trans-Pecos Ratsnake, as the namesake implies, feeds primarily on the numerous species of rodents that it encounters while on its exclusively nocturnal forays, although other vertebrate creatures such as lizards and even bats are consumed with enthusiasm.

As with almost all other reptiles that reside in temperate climates, they undergo a period of inactivity during the coldest months of the year, allowing sexually mature adults to generate the sperm and eggs necessary for successful reproduction in the summer. Like most other harmless snakes found in Texas, Trans-Pecos Ratsnakes are egg-laying creatures. Mating occurs later

than with most temperate species, taking place primarily during the latter portion of June with egg deposition happening in late July or early August. Egg clutches vary in size from 4 to 12, depending on the size and age of the female. The eggs are elongated and of larger size, sometimes just under 3 inches in length. The soft, permeable eggs are buried deep beneath debris to hold the humidity levels at a premium to avoid desiccation. The neonates hatch from the eggs roughly two months after deposition and are roughly a foot in length at hatching. After hatching, the delicate young are carbon copies of the adults in appearance except often paler. And like other snake species, they require no assistance from the parents as they are capable of fending for themselves at birth.

At one time, this species was thought to be quite rare. In fact, they were placed on the protected species list for the state of Texas. But after field research, the population dynamics of this species has shown that it is actually quite common in the right habitat, and as such, it was subsequently removed from the states protected species list.

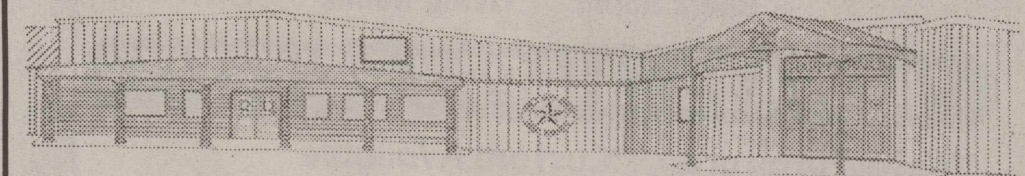

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Sheriff's Corner by Sheriff Terry Joy

Be Alert, Scams on the rise

Since I have been the Sheriff of Callahan County I have, on several occasions, written articles for this paper cautioning you against scams of all kinds, they seem to increase in numbers which means that they are working. The scams usually originate from a foreign country and out of reach of local law enforcement. Once they get your money it is almost impossible to get it back.

The latest scam has already been successful in scamming 3 Callahan County Citizens. I know of this because they called the Sheriff's Office after they realized they had been scammed. I heard that many others were scammed, but did not call it into the Sheriff's office. The latest scam works something like this, a scammer may call and claim to be a representative of AT&T. They will say that your account has been hacked into and they need the last 4 digits of your social security number to fix the problem. Just hang up. Never give any of you Social Security number over the phone, especially to a stranger, and any legitimate business person would never ask you for it.

Never give anyone any of your social security number over the telephone. The best policy is to just hang up. Even if you realize it's a scam while talking to the caller, they could be recording you. The best policy is to just hang up if you

don't recognize the number. If the caller is legitimate they can leave a message and you can call the person later. I received a call from Ft. Lauderdale, Florida and I didn't answer it because I didn't recognize the number of the caller. I just hung up. The caller left a message and it turned out to be my health nurse who wanted to talk to me concerning my pace maker. I explained to her when I called her back why I did not answer, and from now on I will recognize her number when she calls. Scammers don't leave call back numbers.

Saturday, September 23rd, at midnight a scammer called a resident of Callahan County on his cell phone and told him that his AT&T account had been compromised and in order to fix the problem he (the caller) needed the last 4 digits of his social security number. The Callahan county resident gave the caller the numbers. All of his business transactions that require the last 4 digits of his social security are being notified to prevent any theft. It would have been much simpler to have just hung up!

The Callahan County Sheriff's Department wants to get this information out to all the citizens of Callahan County. This information has been put out on facebook. However, not everyone reads this newspaper or looks at facebook so please tell everyone you see to be aware of this latest scam.

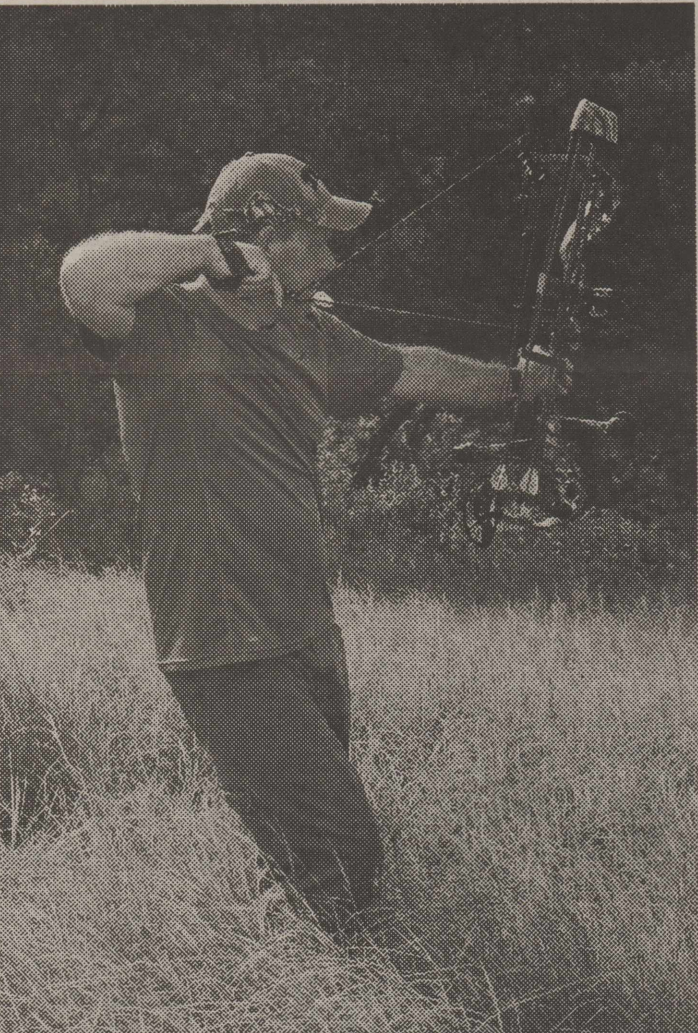
An Internet image this week reminded me that with the south dove zone season opening Friday, Sept. 22, the entire state will be open. The image read: "After the flood, God sent Noah a message, using a dove. In Texas, He used a hummingbird. He knew a dove would end up wrapped in bacon with a slice of jalapeno inside."

The bow season for whitetails, mule deer and Rio Grande turkeys opens September 30 - November 3. That's a hunting opportunity many neglect through lack of interest or experience with archery equipment. Some prefer knowing their rifle can dispatch game at 100 yards or more.

Alan McGraw hunts with both. The former mayor of Round Rock has particularly distinguished himself with a bow. As a kid, he got interested in bow hunting while watching Tarzan movies and films of Howard Hill. McGraw bought his first bow and arrow at the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation store near Livingston. By age 15, he had purchased a Fred Bear Whitetail Hunter bow for \$89.99 at Wal-Mart in Jasper. A saga was about to begin.

He bought a "Bow and Arrow" magazine, sneaked it into church and read it. We're not told whether he kept it inside the hymnal when they stood to sing. That was probably the catalyst for his bow hunting career. Since then, he has taken 18 North American game species with a bow, and by year's end will have shot 24 of the continent's 29 game animals with a bow or rifle. He intends to drop all 29. Most notable bow kills have been an Alaskan brown bear and a desert bighorn ram, the first ram ever taken with a bow on Texas public land.

McGraw, who has hunted whitetails for years, says the most important things about hunting deer with a bow are preparation of self, equipment and hunting area. He trains physically for hunts, hiking up hills toting a backpack. He also practices shooting at 90-yard ranges, although he doesn't expect to risk a shot at that excessive distance. He quickly

points out that newcomers should stay within 20-25 yards. He practices on does and hogs when possible.

Preparing his equipment includes tuning his bow to the arrows and broadheads he will shoot. That probably includes consulting an expert at an archery shop.

Preparing where he hunts includes scouting the area, determining stand placement and shooting lanes, trimming branches and considering wind direction. He sets his blinds well in advance of hunts so deer will become accustomed to them.

Ideally, he will have two stands: one for north-wind days, and one for southeast winds.

Shot placement is more critical with a bow than a rifle. Avoid head or neck shots and shoot for heart and lungs on deer slightly quartering away to avoid hitting the shoulder bone. After shots that seem successful, he waits 15 - 20 minutes before trailing the deer. If it was a questionable shot, he'll go back to camp for lunch before trailing.

Finally, he says study the species you are hunting.

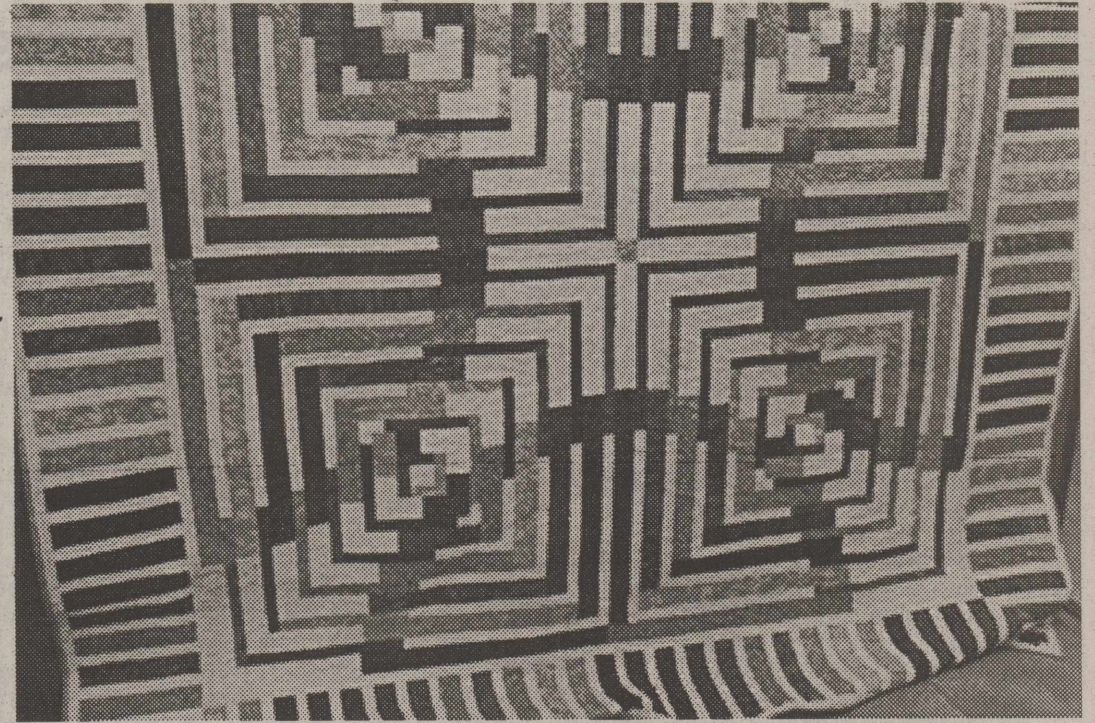

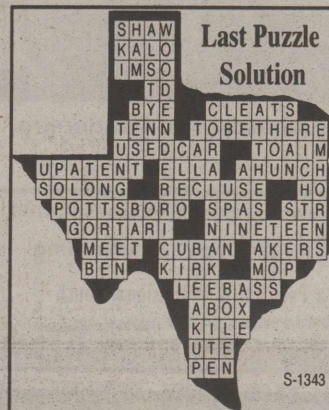
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Callahan County USDA Farm Service Agency Temporarily Changes Office Hours

"To ensure business is conducted timely during this temporary timeframe, I highly suggest contacting FSA in advance to schedule an appointment," said Frost.

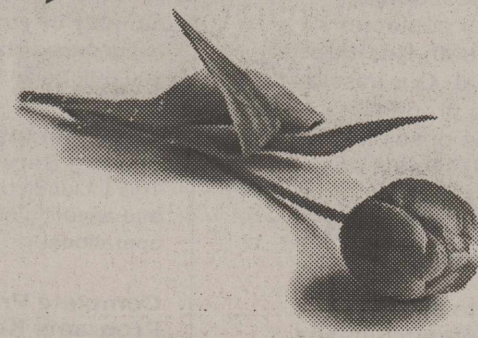

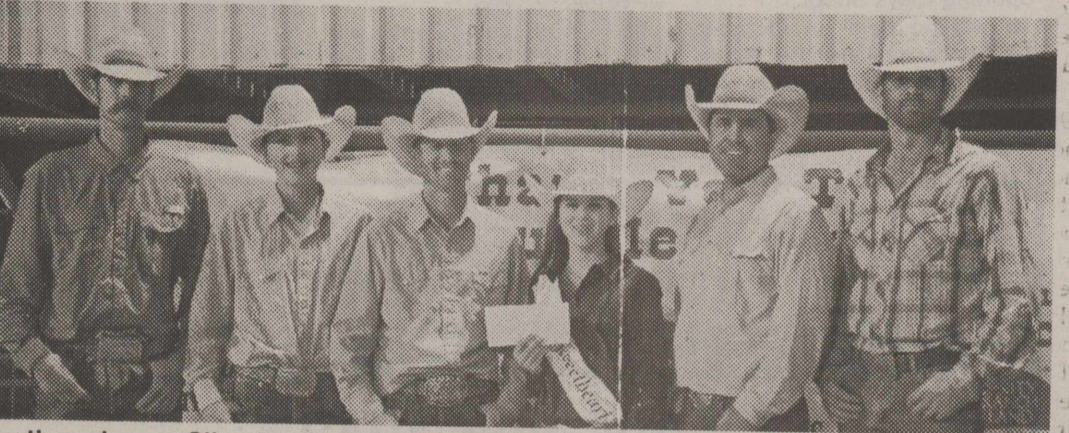

The Texas History Minute

Watergate Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski

"Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall set you free," is the Bible verse adorning the main building at the University of Texas and living in the hearts of millions. In those words are the most important concepts in law: truth. In a free society, truth is the basis of law, and law is the foundation of justice. Texas attorney Leon Jaworski was called upon to defend truth and law in the most challenging political periods America has faced, the Watergate Scandal.

Leonidas Jaworski was born in Waco in 1905. His parents were immigrants, and his father was a minister. Known to his friends as "Leon," he proved a bright and hard-working student, often studying by candlelight. He graduated from Waco High School, where he excelled at debate, and enrolled at Baylor University.

In 1925, he completed his law degree and became the youngest lawyer in state history, not quite 20 years old. He later received a masters degree at George Washington University Law School.

He moved to Houston in 1930. His skills soon attracted the attention of some of the most powerful lawyers in the city. In 1931, Jaworski joined the growing firm of Rufus Fulbright, and within a few years, he became a partner in the firm, which became the largest and most influential firm in Houston.

During World War II, Jaworski served as a lawyer for the U. S. Army. At the end of the war, the Allies began putting Nazi officials on trial for crimes against humanity, Jaworski directed the prosecutions of war criminals. He ensured that those who slaughtered so many civilians and soldiers would face justice.

One case that he prosecuted personally stemmed from the 1944 Russelsheim Massacre, in which eleven German civilians murdered six American prisoners whose plane had been shot down nearby. Jaworski passionately argued that in spite of whatever orders the Nazis gave or however they incited the population, each individual was responsible for his own actions and must answer for those actions. Ten of the eleven defendants were convicted.

After the war, Jaworski returned to Houston. He served on numerous civic boards. In 1960, he was elected president of the Houston Chamber of Commerce. In 1961 and 1962, he was president of the American College of Trial Lawyers. He then served as president of the Texas Bar Association for the 1962-1963 term. Starting in late 1963, President Lyndon Johnson appointed him to sev-

eral presidential commissions to study such issues as violent crime and investment law. In 1971, fellow lawyers honored Jaworski by electing him president of the American Bar Association. In the meantime, President Richard Nixon had embroiled himself in a scandal during his 1972 re-election campaign. Nixon had ordered his employees to break into private offices to steal information or plant wiretaps and paid their silence with a secret slush fund of corporate donations. The most notorious break-in was the Democratic National Committee headquarters at the Watergate office complex. While Jaworski had become a respected member of the legal community, the Watergate scandal would make him a household name.

In May 1973, former Solicitor General Archibald Cox was named special prosecutor to investigate the case. Nixon grew increasingly paranoid as Cox moved closer to the evidence, zeroing in on conversations that Nixon had taped in the Oval Office. Nixon aides admitted these tapes existed, and Cox demanded they be submitted as evidence. Nixon refused. On October 20, 1973, Nixon fired Cox in what became known as the "Saturday Night Massacre," where which Nixon also forced the resignations of the attorney general and the assistant attorney general in order to dismiss Cox.

Reluctantly, Nixon appointed a

new special prosecutor, tapping Jaworski. Though Jaworski had been a Democrat, he had voted for Nixon in 1968 and 1972. Jaworski had not worked as a prosecutor in decades, he gave the appointment his full effort and left no legal stone unturned. Jaworski quickly demanded that Nixon hand over the tapes. Nixon insisted that the tapes were privileged while Jaworski insisted that Nixon could not impede a criminal investigation. Jaworski took the case to the Supreme Court in July 1974, arguing that Nixon must cooperate. The Supreme Court agreed unanimously, and ordered Nixon to hand over the tapes. As it turned out, the tapes ultimately showed Nixon plotting to obstruct a criminal investigation and became his political downfall. He resigned in disgrace on August 9. In the end, Jaworski showed that everyone is subject to the law.

He wrote several books on his experiences. In 1961, he published *Fifteen Years After*, detailing his work with the war crimes trials. In 1976, he wrote *The Right and The Power*, reflecting on his Watergate experiences. His work ensured that honor and justice would remain at the heart of American law. Jaworski died at his ranch just outside Austin in December 1982.

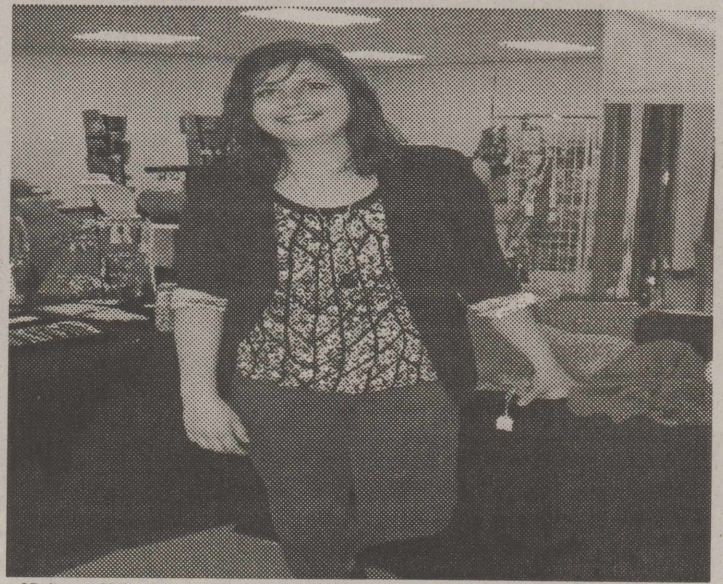
The Market at Clyde presents Meet Our Vendors: Krissy Whyatt of D.I.Y Hunnies

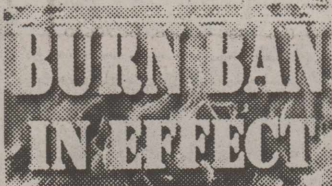
