CPISD Band Concert on Thursday, Dec. 14th







Robert Pritz will assume West Central District regional program leader duties Jan. 1st

SAN ANGELO - The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service has named Robert Pritz as the new agriculture and natural resources regional program leader for the agency's West Region.

Pritz, currently the AgriLife Extension agent in Taylor County, will be headquartered at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center at San Angelo. He will assume his new duties Jan. 1, following the retirement of his predecessor, Marvin Ensor, who retires Dec. 31 with 37 years of service. Dr. Susan Ballabina, AgriLife Extension executive associate director, College Station, said Pritz will oversee the program planning effort in the West Central District's 23 counties and the Far West District's 23 counties. He will also coordinate with others in similar positions across the state.

"I am extremely excited to have Robert in this position," Ballabina said. "The West Region has outstanding county agents, specialists and programs. I know Robert will continue to look at ways the West Region can build on their programmatic efforts and enhance their partnerships in support of the agency's mission. He will be a valuable member of the agency's central leadership team."

Ballabina said Pritz will also continue to bring strong programmatic leadership to the region. "Over the years Robert has demonstrated his effectiveness in program development and has implemented highly effective programs in ag and natural resources," she said. "He will provide leadership to regional program development, will work with agents to develop high-impact programs, and will work closely with commodity groups and other partners to advance agency programs."

Pritz earned a master's degree in range science from Texas Tech University, Lubbock, and a bachelor's degree in animal science from Angelo State

University, San Angelo. He has served in his Taylor County role since 2008 and was name the agency's county coordinator in 2013.

Pritz began his AgriLife Extension career as an assistant county agent in Wise County, where he served from 1995-1997. He then transferred to the agriculture and natural resources post in Callahan County before accepting the Taylor County assignment.

Pritz said he is excited to have the opportunity to lead AgriLife Extension programming efforts in the West Region. "I am eager to learn about the great county efforts across the region as well as build relationships with agriculture and AgriLife Extension stakeholders," he

Pritz has received many awards and recognitions throughout his career. Some of these include honors bestowed through the National Agricultural County Agents Association and the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association. Within these two groups he has garnered distinguished service and achievement awards. He also earned the Grassroot Award from the Texas Section of the Society for Range Management and the Texas Wheat County Agent Award.


FINE FALL FISHING

I fall for fall. There's a feeling about it that demands being out in Nature. It's our best season, and this fall has been terrific. So has the fishing. While northern anglers are scouring their garages for ice augers or snow shovels in anticipation of that White Christmas we only see on TV, folks who know anything about fishing are limiting out. Some of the best fishing of the

year occurs in the fall. every part of Texas are telling of generous catches of bass, crappie, catfish, and one friend even hauled in a 41-pound smallmouth buffalo while crappie fishing. Flor East Texas friends, let me say he was fishing Minnows and shad also produce for "white perch." Having grown strikes. Two friends reported up at the edge of the Big Thicket, catching 89 largemouths and I thought for years that this crappie I had only read about was a separate species from our beloved white perch. They're one and the same. Call them what you will.

Regardless, people are catching them throughout Texas in lakes, rivers, creeks, and even ponds. After all the flooding East Texas has had, it wouldn't surprise me if one or more would come from neighborhood goldfish ponds. The best baits are minnows, shad and very small jigs - about 1/16th ounce or smaller.

Black crappie are darker than white crappie due to black speckles on their sides. White crappie get darker during the spring spawn. Right now, they usually have broken, dark, vertical bars on their sides. At one time, it was said that black crappie were found only in clear lakes in East Texas, but I've also caught them in Central Texas. White crappie are considered more of a statewide fish. This time of year, both white and black are usually in water 12 feet

brush piles. Most consider both crappie the best eating freshwater fish in Texas!

All bass species are also biting like mosquitoes right now, too largemouths, smallmouths, Reports from practically Guadalupes in the Hill Country, white (sand) bass and stripers. That's what fall fishing is like. Most bass are caught on lures both topwater baits and worms or other plastics - anything that resembles a crawfish. Guadalupes one morning in late November on Lake Travis. All were released.

> It's a beautiful time to be out. Oh, it'll get cold this week,

deep or more, and often around but it will pass, and then the weather will be conducive to being outside, again. This is a good time to just drive through the countryside and admire the colors. Texas doesn't have the striking fall colors New England has, but driving through East and North Texas, you'll see some hardwoods changing colors. We drove through the Hill Country last weekend and it looked like the Spanish oaks were about a week away from

Cross Plains' 2017 retail sales up 12% from 2016

percent city sales tax payments in 2017 are just over twelve percent higher than 2016, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Glenn Hegar reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, December oth.

Cross Plains' 2017 sales tax payments for the year totaled \$254,442.67, which is 12.53 percent higher than the \$226,108.24 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2016.

The payment to the city for December 2017 was \$21,614.99, which is 9.46 percent higher than the \$19,746.73 payment made to the city in December 2016.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today, Wednesday, December 6th, he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$695.2 million in local sales tax allocations for December, 10.8 percent more than in December 2016. These allocations are based on sales made in October by businesses that report tax monthly.

Hegar sent Texas cities \$443.5 million in December 2017, which is higher by 8.7 percent compared to December 2016 and higher by 3.5 percent yearto-date.

He reported \$41.7 million in December 2017 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 14.6 percent compared to December 2016 and higher by 6.6 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$161.2 million in December 2017 sales tax allocations, which is 12.4 percent higher than December 2016 and higher by 3.6 percent year-to-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$48.7 million in December 2017 allocations, which is 23.0 percent higher than December 2016 and higher by 12.8 percent year-to-date.

Total sales tax allocations were \$692.5 million in December 2017, which is 10.8 percent higher than December 2016 and higher by 4.3 percent yearto-date.

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in October by businesses that report tax

His mother died in 1851; and as a result, his distraught father moved him and of impending starvation, dishis younger brother to Texas to start over. Eventually, the family settled in the Bastrop area, and the two brothers both attended the Bastrop Military Institute.

When the Civil War erupted, he and his brother both enlisted in the Confederate army. As it turned out, Sayers would to preferred customers, insisting become one of the last Civil War veterans to serve as Texas governor. He served in the 5th Texas Cavalry and was noted for his bravery in actions in New Mexico and Louisiana. The war put his life in danger often, but he pressed on in the face of steadily advancing Union armies. He was twice wounded in combat and rose to the rank of major before the Confederate surrender in 1865.

After returning to Bastrop, Sayers decided not to live a life of bitterness and regret but instead chose to give back to the community and build a future. Though Sayers never attended college himself, he nevertheless continued his own education and worked to bring opportunities to others. He opened a school in Bastrop and began studying law at night. Within a year, he gained admission to the state bar and began practicing law.

In 1872, Sayers was elected to the state senate and steadily moved up the political ladder. He would go on to serve as chairman of the State Democratic Committee; and in 1878, he was elected lieutenant governor. He was elected to the first of seven terms in Congress in 1884, eventually rising to chair the House Appropriations Committee for


Adversity, it is said, is the truest the 1893-1894 term, one of from anti-trust laws as they

flowed its banks, causing many people to flee for their lives. Sayers stepped forward immediately to make sure state authorities helped those in danger and later Joseph Draper Sayers was helped those rebuild. In 1900, deadliest hurricane in American History when more than 6,000 people died. Sayers immediately dispatched food, medicine, and state personnel to the devastated city to help survivors in the face ease, and riots. Impressed with his response to these disasters and management of the state, voters re-elected Sayers in 1900. He advocated a number of

The famed Spindletop well was upward of a million barrels of oil in its first two weeks. This was the first successful oil well in the state, and the oil boom it ushered in quickly transformed the economy of the state, making Texas a major center for energy. In 1903, with his second term at an end, Sayers quietly stepped down and resumed his law practice in Bastrop. He remained committed to serving the public in his later years. He served on the board of regents for the University of Texas as well as a number of other state boards. He met the many challenges of his times, helping the state overcome deadly disasters and bringing the state into a new age. Sayers died quietly in 1929. ###

Texas Map Turtle


The Concho Valley is home to eight species of aquatic turtles, and in my opinion none of these are as endearing as the diminutive representative of the map turtle family, the Texas Map Turtle.

Texas Map Turtles (Graptemys versa) are one of five map turtle varieties that occur in Texas, and one of two species that is found in this state and in this state alone. Their distribution is strictly limited to the Colorado, Concho, and Llano river systems of the Hill Country and Edwards Plateau. They can also be found in the lakes and tributaries associated with said rivers. It rarely, if ever is encountered on land.

Like other members in the map turtle family, this species can be quite colorful and attractive. The carapace, or top shell, is bright green in younger animals, fading to an olive color as the animal matures. There is an intricate pattern of yellow, or more typically, orange markings on each scale of the carapace, and just like the background coloration, these lines fade as the animal ages. The scutes along the vertebral area of the carapace are raised into a keel, and this is more prominent in the yellowish and unpatterned save that connect the plastron scales together. The neck and head are large, orange "J" shaped pattern that runs vertically behind each eye, and this is one of the diagother species of aquatic turtles. similar to the neck and head.

Saturday, December the 9th at 1:56 p.m. an emergency 911 call came into Callahan County Dispatch concerning an out of control grass fire at 6151 County Road 254. Clyde Volunteer Fire Department was immediately paged out. Baird and Eula Volunteer Fire Departments were also paged out. The House of Yahweh also sent out volunteers and equipment. Callahan County Deputy Chris Levens was first on the scene. As I was approaching the area I could see a huge white cloud of billowing smoke in the sky south of Clyde.

The thick grass was very dry and the wind was from the north. The fire traveled very rapidly moving south. A house, in the path of the fire, was saved due to the rapid response of the volunteer firemen. 
