My name is Janna Hoehn, the Education Center. I started I am a 28 year resident of Maui, Hawaii... 8 years ago my husband and I made our first trip to Washington DC. Because many people read the Maui Vietnam was the war that was News online. Even though time they ran a story, I would I never knew anyone killed in receive another photo or two. Vietnam, I wanted an rubbing of one of the names. I approached the Wall and choose a name ... Gregory John Crossman... an MIA. When I returned home I decided to research Gregory and try to find his family, in the event they were never able to go to the Wall, I would send them the etching, hoping they would share a photo with me of Gregory. Off and on for 6 months I researched every way possible and never found any family. I was quite disappointed however I had one more possibility ... my cousin, our family historian... 6 weeks later she found a college photo of Gregory. 2 years later I saw a story on our local news about the "Faces Never Forgotten" for the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund. The goal, to put a face with every name that is etched on the Wall. I immediately sent in the photo I had of Gregory Crossman. 5 days later I received an email from Jan Scruggs, the Founder and President of the Vietnam Wall. He thanked me for sending the photo, it was the first for this Hero and asked me if I could help him find the photos for the 42 Maui County Fallen that were killed in Vietnam. I replied, it would be an honor. I have always hoped I could to do something for the Vietnam Veterans as the way they were treated when they returned, it was disgraceful. Here was my chance. What I thought would be a very easy project with Maui being so small... was anything but easy. I started by combing the phone books calling every like name of each soldier, I found about 10 of them this way, then off to archived yearbooks for every high school on Maui, I found a few more... then to the library to look for changes the whole dynamic obituaries... found 3 more ... then I went to the Maui News. they printed a beautiful front page article about the Vietnam stories and sacrifice will never Veterans Memorial Fund and

My plea is this: If anyone is related, a friend or a classmate to any of the young men on the list I would very much appreciate hearing from you. We need to obtain a photo of every single Fallen Hero whose names are etched on The Wall, all 58,315 of them. To date





Once I finished finding all the Maui County photos I moved on to my hometown in California and found the 5 Soldiers from my childhood home, Hemet, California.

I have been very involved in trying to locate photos of the Native American Soldiers which brought me to begin searching for ALL Soldiers in California, over 500 newspapers have run the story throughout Hawaii, California, Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Nevada, Colorado, North Carolina, Alaska, Utah, Montana, Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Louisiana, Arizona, Kentucky, Arkansas and Ohio. The response has been amazing, have collected over 6000 photos since 2011. With your help it will be more. lam taking one state at a time, moving West to East. I have helped complete the states of Montana, Oregon, Idaho, Nevada, Washington, Utah, Colorado, South Dakota, Alaska, Idaho, Kansas and Hawaii, very close on several others.

All of these photos will be submitted to the "Wall of Faces" online memorial with the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund website, as well as in the future Education Center that will be adjacent to the Vietnam Wall in Washington DC.

Putting a face with a name of the Wall, it keeps our Fallen Heroes memories alive and will honor them, our heroes be forgotten.

He failed. He returned to Oklahoma and picked up a job singing on a Tulsa radio station. By the next year, Columbia Records signed him to a contract. Autry recorded 640 songs and wrote more than 300. (Iltimately, more than 100 million copies of his albums were sold. He appeared in his first movie, In Old Santa Fe, in 1934. He would appear in more than ninety films, usually portraying a light-hearted singing cowboy. From 1936 to 1942, he was the top western actor in the country. Autry co-wrote "Back in the Saddle Again" with Ray Whitley in 1939. It immediately became a hit, and Autry performed it for the rest of his career. This followed with a popular radio program, Gene Autry's Melody Ranch, which ran from 1940 to 1943 and from 1945 to 1956. He was nominated for an Academy Award in 1942 for Best Original Song for the 1941 melody "Ridin' on a Rainbow" from the film of the same name. In 1941, the small community of Berwyn, Oklahoma, renamed itself Gene Autry in honor of the star who had spent some of his formative years in nearby com-



#### SPRING SPAWN of the WHITES

I pulled my biggest catch ever out of the Sabine River one sunny March afternoon. It weighed well over a hundred pounds. Combined with a twoday limit of white bass, it was arguably the best fishing trip

imaginable.

We stayed at River Ridge near Carthage and fished the Sabine above Toledo Bend Reservoir. Houston Chronicle outdoor writer, Shannon Tompkins, had told me about the Sabine's threepound whites. Fishing there with him convinced me he was right. We didn't catch any threes, but we caught a lot that came quite close.

I fish for whites every spring, and several times after they return to the lakes. Primarily an open water fish, they vacate the big lakes each spring to seek running water for spawning in the rivers and creeks feeding the reservoirs. They're probably staging right now in deep holes in the upper ends of the lakes, preparing to head upstream.

It happens all over the state. Lake Ray Roberts, north of Denton, is a North Texas hotspot, where the whites fin their way up the Elm Fork of the Trinity. Lake Whitney, on the Brazos, west of Waco. sends hundreds of thousands up the river. Bedias Creek provides running water above Lake Livingston, northeast of Huntsville, and hosts a favorite memory of a foggy morning, and another limit of whites. West of Austin, the Pedernales River is a classic white bass Mecca for the fish moving up from Lake Travis. The Nueces, above Lake Corpus Christi, is still another. And South Texans also limit on the three rivers at Three Rivers.

The list goes on. So many choices -- but so little time. On sunny days in late January and early February, as the water temperature edges toward 60 degrees, reports begin coming in of good catches. It's primarily a February-March thing, but occasionally extends into April. Get ready for it.

The menu of baits is almost as long as the list of streams. Their favorite food in the lakes is shad; in the streams, it's minnows. Live minnows consequently
