



(AUSTIN) — Whether you're in need of book bags, blackboard chalk or bell-bottom pants, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar is reminding shoppers they can save money on those and certain other items during the state's sales tax holiday. This year, the sales tax holiday is scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 10th-12th.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced below \$100 from sales tax, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend

"As Texas families begin the process of replacing their beach bags with book bags, Texas' sales tax holiday is the perfect opportunity to save some money on the supplies families need before the school bell rings," Hegar said. "As a dad to three young children, I know how these expenses can add up.'

### The Cottonwood Musical Letter to the Editor

A movie could be made show-casing the Cottonwood Musical in Cottonwood, Texas. Or else footage from the event would fit convincingly into a compilation of "never before seen" or the "lost footage" scenes of James Szalapski's "Heartworn Highways" (except that the music played there is less outlaw country and more traditional folk and gospel). Nonetheless, a road trip to this idyllic small town, and a listen to the celebration of Americana music played there, is like taking a trip to the past through a hidden portal along some scifi ley line - a ripe setting for a romantic feature film, indeed.

From Coleman, if you drive through Cross Plains via 206, then hang a left on 880, you'll eventually get to a place where "two roads" diverge. And if you take the one (1079) that is (presumably) "less traveled by," well, surely we all know what Mr. Robert Frost has to say about that...

Stay left.

One of the first things to catch a visitor's attention when entering the (seeming) ghost town of Cottonwood, Tx is its proud little post office beside a sentinel American flag waving high. Travel another block west and glance right, and on the 4th Friday of every month, you'll catch a noticeable number of vehicles in one spot and it will be sufficient evidence that you've found the Cottonwood Musical at the old Cottonwood Schoolhouse.

An interview on Friday, June 22, 2018, with Cookie Robinson - the contact/organizer for this ongoing event - revealed more details about this tradition.

With the exceptions of Novembers and Decembers, the Cottonwood Musical takes place the 4th Friday of every month and begins at 5:30pm with 6-10 acts slated to play 30-45 minutes each. It's an alcohol-free event, and the No. 1 rule is "have fun."

It was noted by Mrs. Robinson that a regular to the musical once complained of the absence of the event during November and December. When she suggested that "those months are a time for family," the regular's sincere response was, "but this is my family."

There has long been a musical tradition in this tiny town of (currently) no more than 60-80 people (including children). The people of Cottonwood used to gather at each other's houses in the 1950s to play music. They even used to set their phones off the hook to share the music played in their homes with others in town - taking advantage of a "party line."

**Action taken by Commissioners is** a misappropriation of County Road & Bridge Funds To the taxpayers of Callahan

County:

I, Tom Windham, Commissioner Precinct 3, has been asked by some concerned citizens why Precinct 3 only received 21% of the Road & Bridge Funds for the 2018-

I maintain the second largest area of the four precincts. As to miles of road maintained: Precinct 4 has the most to maintain at 146 miles, Precincts 2 & 3 have about the same at 132 miles and 130 miles, and Precinct 1 has only 76 miles to maintain.

The Callahan County Auditor was asked to examine the factors that affect maintaining county roads and calculate percentages that were fair to each precinct. Her decision was based on the number of road miles, area in square miles, and population of each precinct. The recommendation that she made were as follows: Precinct 1-17%, Precinct 2-25.5%, Precinct 3-26.6%, and Precinct 4-30.9% The County Auditor's recommendations were completely ignored.

The Commissioner of Precinct 2 made a motion that was seconded by the Commissioner of Precinct 4 to change the percentages as follows: Precinct 1-21%, Precinct 2-28%, Precinct 3-21%, and Precinct 4-30%. This cut Precinct 3 down 6% and increased Precinct 1 & 2.

The County Auditor asked in herpresentationthatanychange from her recommendation be explained in detail. Their reason was that I kept Precinct 3 roads in good shape and should lose money because of the well maintained roads. I will lose about \$107,000 with this cut at the present tax rate.

I disagree with being penalized for working to keep the roads that Precinct 3 maintain in good shape for our citizens that travel them. Callahan County is a small county with a small tax

base. The Commissioners need to work hard to keep cost down and manage their taxpayers' money to replace equipment.


If the other commissioners do not want to work to save money in their precincts and prefer to hire work done that is their choice, but they have no right to penalize Precinct 3. I know it was not done on facts, but by personnel vendetta and spiteful jealousy because I have worked hard to take care of and maintain the roads of my

I feel like the action taken is a misappropriation of County Road & Bridge Funds. Concerned citizens can call the State Attorney General's Office at 1-800-252-8011 to ask their office to investigate the division of the Road & Bridge Funds in Callahan County. If enough people voice their concerns by calling them maybe something can be done. I truly believe that the division of the Road & Bridge Funds were discussed and decided on before the meeting of July 9th by some of the Commissioners' Court

I would like to be able to keep the roads that I maintain in good shape, and to manage the taxpayers' money and equipment in Precinct 3. We have tried sharing equipment in the past, but that did not work due to some of the precincts not taking care of shared equipment. By being responsible for the money and equipment in Precinct 3, I can plan ahead for larger projects and know that the equipment in my Precinct is maintained well. Thank you for any support

### Actor Eli Wallach graduated from UT

"I never dreamed I would do hospital administrator. Wallach with helping him with his role in westerns," commented the onetime Texan and legendary actor the rank of captain in 1945. Eli Wallach. In his career, he appeared in dozens of westerns, including some of the most wellknown westerns of the 1960s. The native New Yorker had some of his most important early lessons in acting and life in the west as a young man in Texas and would go on to appear in nearly one hundred films.

Eli Herschel Wallach was born in Brooklyn, New York, in December 1915. His parents, both Polish immigrants, came to become business owners. His parents had one other son to the future actor. While each of his siblings became teachers, Wallach gravitated to acting. "I act," he later recalled.

After graduating high school in 1932, Wallach enrolled at the University of Texas. Austin was about as far from his New York upbringing as possible, but Wallach quickly fit in.

It was also in Texas where Wallach said he learned to ride a horse, which became an important part of some of his most famous roles. He graduated from UT

When he returned to New York, he worked to refine his skills through local theater groups. He landed his first Broadway role not long after he arrived in 1945. His skills were quickly noted as he earned a prestigious Tony Award for his role in "The Rose Tattoo" in 1951. He found time for family, marrying actress Anne Jackson in 1948; and the two remained together for the rest of their years.

In 1956, Wallach appeared in his first film role, Baby Doll, a tale of revenge set in a small and two daughters in addition Mississippi town and co-starring Karl Malden. In his dozens of screen appearances, Wallach appeared with some of the most always wanted to tell stories and noted actors of the time. He costarred with Edward G. Robinson in Seven Thieves in 1960 and appeared as the notorious bandit Calvera in the popular western The Magnificent Seven the same year with Charles Bronson, Steve McQueen, and Yul Brynner. James Stewart. At the age of 51 in 1966, when many people are starting to wind down their careers, Wallach's career was only speeding up. He co-starred with Clint Eastwood in the classic The Good, The Bad, and The Ugly, the last of the "Man With No Name" spaghetti westerns starring Eastwood. Wallach played Eastwood's greedy sometime partner and sometime antagonist. Though originally worked as a medic but he was an accomplished actor by this point, he credited Eastwood

the film, a note of graciousness that Wallach's co-stars often noted. As Wallach himself once said in an interview, "The big secret in acting is listening to people."

In 1967, he played the villain "Mr. Freeze" on the Batman TV series that starred Adam West as the Caped Crusader. Out of the many roles for which he was known, an amused Wallach noted that he received the most fan mail for that one particular role. Into the 1970s, he played a mix of roles in mostly dramas and westerns. In 1980, he appeared in The Hunter with Steve McQueen, his last film role.

In 1986, he played an aging assassin in the comedy Tough Guys with Kirk Douglas and Burt Lancaster. He appeared in two major films in 1990, the detective drama The Two Jakes with Jack Nicholson, and as an elderly mafia don in The Godfather Part III with Al Pacino. Wallach continued to appear on film and television well into his eighties and nineties, regularly receiving high praise for his work.

Nearing 90, he released an autobiography, The Good, the Bad, and Me, retelling his stories of Old Hollywood. He received an honorary Academy Award for Lifetime Achievement in 2007, but he kept working. Though he had slowed down, he continued to appear in small roles up until the end, always finding ways to do the work he always loved. He passed away quietly at the age of 98 at his home in New York City in June 2014.






