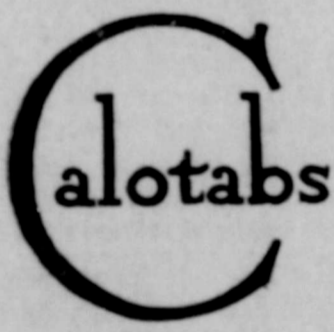

ONE-DISH DINNERS.

For the maidless home or the busy day there is nothing that quite takes the place of the one-meal dish. This may be cooked in one dish or served from the kitchen all on one plate.



Mutton and Vegetables.—Brown in sweet fat in a hot frying pan a pound, more or less, of mutton. When the mutton is well cooked, add a cupful or more of diced carrots, and if the onion flavor is liked, one small onion; boiling water to cover, and let simmer on the back part of the stove for two or three hours. The meat sauce may be thickened slightly and served with boiled potatoes, all arranged on a hot dinner plate.

Baked Pork Chops.—Chops or steak may be used for this dish. Slice sufficient potatoes to serve the family, season with salt and pepper and cover with the pork steak, well seasoned on both sides. Use a large, shallow baking pan to give plenty of surface to the heat, and bake in a moderate oven for two hours or until the potatoes are soft. A sliced onion improves this dish, if the family has been properly educated to appreciate this wholesome vegetable.

Spanish Meat Dish.—Arrange a layer of sliced raw potatoes in a baking dish, add a finely shredded onion, a cupful of beef gravy and slices of the meat to cover the top. Pour over a cupful or more of tomatoes and bake in a moderate oven until the potatoes are tender. Before serving sprinkle the top of the dish with a few cooked peas for a garnish and serve from a dish.

American Chop Suey.—Take one-half pound of round steak, cut in dice, and brown in hot suet fat, add one small sausage link, two large onions, one-third of a box of spaghetti and one-third of a quart of strained tomato. Boil the spaghetti, and after cooking the other ingredients for two hours serve with the hot spaghetti. Season well with salt, pepper, paprika and a sprinkling of sugar.

No price is set on the lavish summer; June may be had by the poorest comer. Eat onions in May, and all the year after physicians may play. —Lowell.

SEASONABLE GOOD THINGS.

The number of people who are cutting down on sweets from a standpoint of health is on the increase. Where acid fruits are also tabooed the prune will have its chance to be developed. The prune is a very wholesome foundation for any number of delectable dishes from breakfast to dinner.

Sliced Pressed Beef.—Take a shln of beef and two pounds of the round. Crack the bone, put the meat into a kettle, cover with cold water and bring to a boil. Add salt and pepper, two tablespoonfuls of vinegar, a large onion sliced and cook all together until the meat falls from the bones. Skim out the meat and bone and reduce the liquor by boiling; when one-half the quantity, strain through a coarse muslin. Pick the meat into small bits, removing all bones. To the meat liquor add a pinch of powdered mace, cloves, allspice, a dash of cayenne and one-half teaspoonful of mustard and the same of celery salt. Boil the liquor and put back the meat, mixing thoroughly. When well heated through, turn into an earthen bowl or mold rinsed in cold water; cover and weight the cover and set away to cool. Serve cut in thin slices.

Simple Dessert.—Butter slices of bread and place in a baking dish, cover with canned blueberries, place another layer of buttered bread and pour over more blueberries. Cover and wait for an hour or two, then bake until well heated through. Serve with cream and sugar. Other berries, such as blackberries, strawberries or any juicy fruit may be used in place of the blueberries.

Lemon Sherbet.—Take a one-pint can of condensed milk, extract the juice from three large lemons, add one and one-half cupfuls of sugar, stir until the sugar is dissolved, add the milk and fold in the whites of three eggs beaten stiff. Freeze.

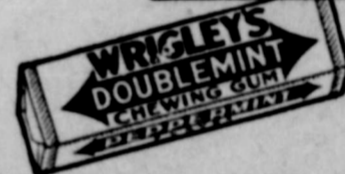

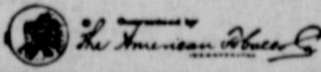

ALL HIT BY WAGE REDUCTION

Skilled and Unskilled Employees of the Norfolk and Western Railroad to Be Treated Alike.

Sweeping reductions in wages for more than 25,000 Norfolk and Western employees, including members of all railway organizations, both skilled and unskilled labor, have been brought to light.

A meeting between representatives of trainmen and conductors and Norfolk and Western officials held at Roanoke a short time ago, at which time a proposed reduction was discussed, resulted in a request by the trainmen that a reply to the road's proposals be deferred.

Railway telegraphers on the Norfolk and Western system, the shop crafts, the clerks' organization, clerks, engineers, firemen, trainmen, conductors and maintenance of way employees have had the wage-reduction proposals made to them.

OTHER LABOR NOTES

Tug and dredge men at the head of the lakes resumed work after accepting a reduction of \$15 in wages.

Responsible employees of the Kay-nee company of Cleveland, O., participate in the profits of the company as a reward for their faithfulness.

Chesapeake and Ohio tugboat engineers struck at Newport News, Va., in sympathy with the seamen, refusing to move either American or foreign ships.

The molders' strike at the Chicago Hardware foundry in North Chicago, Ill., in progress since February 3, was called off. The workmen accepted a 20 per cent wage cut.

In New York the International Jewelry Workers' union is resisting the effort of the employers to replace the 44-hour week with the 48-hour and re-establish other prewar conditions.

Coal mine operators in New South Wales intimate that they must close down at the expiration of government control, claiming that to continue under present conditions would mean bankruptcy.

The Flint (Mich.) plant of the Chevrolet Motor company began increasing its force at a rate that will add from 1,200 to 1,500 men within the next two weeks, with all departments operating on full time.

The port of Boston was idle, following a walkout of union tugboat engineers. The engineers struck when an attempt was made by owners to substitute non-union firemen for union men on strike.

The executive committee of the Philadelphia Pressmen's union ordered a strike which affects 4,000 commercial pressmen. Press feeders already had joined the compositors in their strike for a 44-hour week.

Governor Channing Cox of Massachusetts signed the Voluntary Association bill, under which labor unions can be sued in court. Labor leaders have termed the bill the "most vicious blow against labor ever made."

New York "wet wash" laundry wagon drivers now draw down an average of \$100 to \$115 weekly. The only artisans ahead of them are rabbit skinner and window cleaners, who are said to sometimes make more than \$200 a week.

Quelling a riot of 400 striking building trades laborers and sympathizers, several policemen of Rochester, N. Y., were severely bruised, two rioters seriously shot and fifty others, both men and women, stunned and mutilated by riot sticks.

Admiral W. S. Benson, chairman of the United States shipping board, announced that six government ships have been taken from the United States Transport company because the company signed an agreement with striking marine workers maintaining the old wage rate. The vessels had been allocated to the company.

By a vote of 17 to 5, the Illinois house of representatives industrial affairs committee reported favorably the bill to establish a commission to investigate and fix a minimum wage scale for women workers. This is the bill personally indorsed for three months by Miss Jeanette Rankin, former member of congress. The vote is considered a distinct victory for the measure.

At Bridgeport, Ohio, the Aetna-Standard plant of the American Sheet and Tin Plate company resumed operations in full. The plant will operate three days a week. The Wheeling Steel corporation tin plate plant at Yorkville is working twelve mills. Early resumption of the Laughlin plant of the American Sheet and Tin Plate company in Martins Ferry, idle two weeks, is anticipated.

The wage scale that will be put into effect by the Building Employers' association of Holyoke, Mass., under open-shop conditions was announced. It provides 80 cents an hour or less for general building mechanics, 65 cents or less for mason tenders, 50 cents or less for bricklayers, masons and plasterers. The association provides that none of its members shall make an agreement with any union in the Building Trades council during 1921.

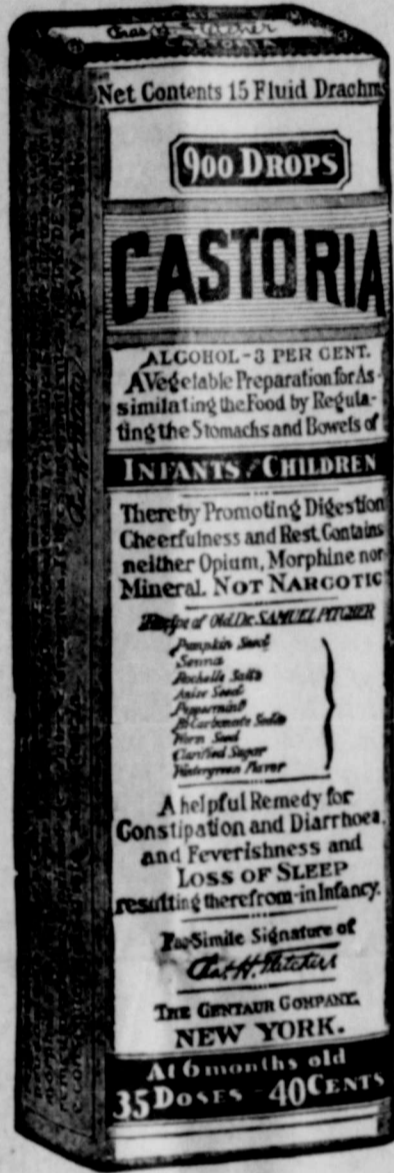

WASHINGTON SIDELIGHTS

Greatest Profiteers in the Country?



WASHINGTON.—The national live stock exchange has declared war on the retail meat dealers. Everett C. Brown of Chicago, president of the exchange, appearing before the house agriculture committee in opposition to packer legislation, characterized the meat retailers as "the greatest profiteers this country has ever known." He urged the committee to desist trying to regulate the packers and to concentrate efforts on breaking up the profiteering by the retail dealer.

Mr. Brown furnished the committee with a resume of a survey which he made recently of retail prices in Chicago. These prices, he declared, often

showed a jump of 100 per cent from the wholesaler to the consumer.

"I read nothing in the proposed legislation that tries to control those everybody in this room knows to be the greatest profiteers—not only during the war but at the present time—that this country has ever known," said Mr. Brown. "Why does not congress try to control those people who by their retail butchers' associations in the large distributing cities have a closer organization than any of the big trade union organizations in America?"

"A recent survey of wholesale and retail meat prices in Chicago disclosed startling comparisons.

"Meat obtained from the same packer was being sold in one shop at from 10 to 18 cents a pound more than the same brand and cuts were bringing across the street.

"I was offered a pound of a well known brand at exactly two and one-half times the price that brand was wholesaling for on that day. Bacon costing wholesale 30 to 35 cents was offered at 55 to 65 cents a pound."

Haiti Peeved With Our Leathernecks

DEMANDING withdrawal of the American forces occupying the island, three delegates of the Patriotic union of Haiti have presented to President Harding, the State department and congress a report in which the American marines and Haitian gendarmes are accused of committing numerous atrocities not investigated by the Daniels' court of inquiry.

The report calls the American occupation the "most terrible regime of military autocracy ever carried on in the great American democracy." The three delegates are H. Paulus Sannon, former Haitian secretary of foreign affairs and former minister to the United States; Stenio Vincent, former president of the Haitian senate, and H. Perceval Thoby, former charge d'affaires of the Haitian legation in Washington.

The Haitian people, according to the report, in addition to reparations for the wrongs and injuries done them, desire:

Immediate abolition of martial law and courts martial.

Immediate reorganization of the Haitian police and military forces, and

SPLINTER MARKS FAR NORTH

Little Peninsula Extending Into Lake of the Woods in Canada is American Territory.



Many Americans have worried about a stubby little peninsula which extends from Canada into the Lake of the Woods north of the forty-ninth parallel, which marks the established boundary between Canada and the United States from the Lake of the Woods to Puget sound.

This small area, chopped off from Canada and surrounded on three sides by the waters of the Lake of the Woods, belongs to the United States. Disregarding Alaska, it is the northernmost land of the American republic.

No map shows any town or village in the remote and isolated region. It appears merely as a trackless forest wilderness.

Now it is indicated that there is a village in this forgotten enclave, for a post office has been established at Peninsula, and a weekly mail service is maintained. During the winter the service will be by horse and sleigh across the ice of the lake.

In the summer a motorboat will be used.

Principal Could Hardly Have Chosen More Inopportune Moment to Make His Entry.

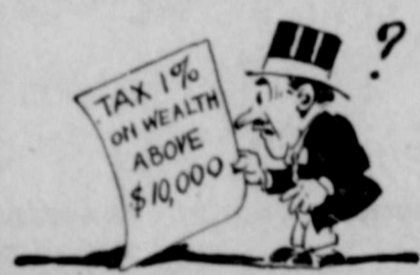

What Is Your Worth as an Individual?



A TAX of one per cent on the net worth of individuals is suggested by Representative Bacharach of New Jersey, a Republican member of the house ways and means committee, as a possible substitute for present objectionable taxes.

Mr. Bacharach, who is an advocate of a general sales or turnover tax, said that he contemplated introducing such a bill as an alternative for the sales tax in case that fails to receive the approval of the ways and means committee. He said that he believed that a one per cent tax on the net worth of at individual would raise at least

\$1,000,000,000 a year. Under his plan there would be an exemption of \$10,000 allowed for each person.

"Personally, I am still of the opinion that the adoption of the sales tax plan would be the simplest and easiest method of raising additional revenue and at the same time bring a reduction in the cost of living and a return of business prosperity," said Mr. Bacharach.

"However, as an alternative proposition I am considering the presentation of a bill which will levy a tax of one per cent on the net worth of the individual to take the place of those taxes which I feel very strongly should be eliminated. Under the most unfavorable conditions, such a tax should bring in more than a billion dollars in revenue."

Advantage of a one per cent turnover sales tax to the government, the merchant, and the small taxpayers were claimed by its advocates at the opening hearing on revenue legislation before the senate finance committee.

HAS the time arrived for Colorado, 60 years old as a territory and 45 years old as a state, to select a distinguished citizen for a place in the national statuary hall in the national capitol? Senator Nicholson thinks so and proposes William Gilpin, first territorial governor, as one of sufficient historic renown to make him worthy of being the state's first representative in the hall of fame.


Each state in the union is entitled to two statues. More than half of the states now have representation, some with one and others with two. Just whose statue shall go to statuary hall is a matter for the legislature of each state to determine.

"I think that Colorado is now old enough as a state to determine on at least one of its early illustrious citizens as worthy of a place in this national hall of fame," said Senator Nicholson. "My first choice is Governor Gilpin, who did big things for the whole West, as well as for Colorado. He was one of the pioneers who helped to give the country an appreciation of



the great West, and who early recognized Colorado as a great state. He was named by Abraham Lincoln as Colorado's first territorial governor. Before he became governor he had served in the Mexican war and had led expeditions against hostile Indians of the West. Indeed, it was Gilpin who influenced congress to name our state Colorado. He defeated a proposal, made by secessionists, to name the state Jefferson. He went to Colorado in a wagon drawn by oxen. He served as our territorial governor in 1861 and 1862. He kept the state on the side of the union, taking a position against secession.

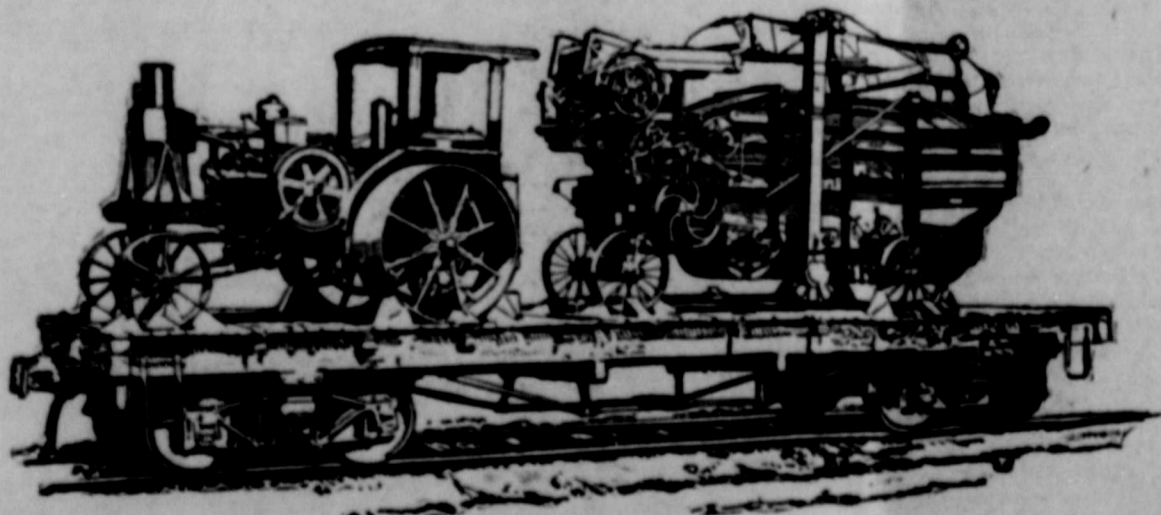
