Sportsmen for Public Shooting Grounds



CENATE bill 1452, introduced by Senator Harry S. New of Indiana, and house bill 5823, introduced by Congressman Dan R. Anthony, Jr., of Kansas, are commonly known as the Public Shooting Ground-Game Refuge

This measure provides that every gunner who hunts migratory birds shall first take out a federal hunting license costing \$1 per year. Every cent of the money received from the sale of such licenses is to go into a special fund ceive protection. known as the "Migratory Bird Protection Fund." Breeding, feeding and resting places for our migratory birds are necessary. No matter in what section of the country a man shoots, he is dependent upon the protection of the birds during their entire migration -in every section of the country they

Moreover, drainage is as hard on the waterfowl as lack of protection. At the present rate at which suitable ducking territory is being drained, immediate action is necessary. This bill will permanently set aside lakes and marshes where the birds may be hunted by the public, and also areas as refuges where the birds will re-





ONE PIECE DISHES.

A few dishes which may be prepared, baked and served from the

baking dish will be greatly appreciated these spring days when extra work is crowding. Potatoes

Bacon, Country Style.-Slice po-

tatoes lengthwise and very thin. Put a layer of potatoes in a baking dish or casserole, add a sliced onion, sait and pepper, then a layer of thinly sliced bacon. Repeat the layers, having the bacon on top. Do not add any liquid, and see that the bacon is well spread so that the fat will season the dish well. Cover tightly and bake one hour in a moderate oven. Baked Stew .- Take one and one-

half pounds of lean boiling beef, onefourth pound of suet, six medium sized potatoes, three small onions and six small carrots, with a small bag of mixed spices. Wipe and cut the ment and vegetables as for stew. Fry the suct till all is rendered. Pour off the fat and add the meat and onion, fry until brown, remove and add the potatoes, fry them and add the carrots. Put all into a casserole, add a generous sprinkling of flour, and salt with the bag of spice, bake two hours in a moderate oven. Remove the spice and serve from the casserole.

Baked Hamburger and Spaghetti .-Macaroni may be used in place of spaghetti in almost all dishes. Take a package of spaghetti, cook in boiling salted water, drain, add one can of tomatoes, five or six medium sized onions, chopped, one and one-half pounds of hamburger, fried in two tablespoonfuls of sweet fat. Stir and season all until well mixed, then bake for half an hour in a moderate oven.

Roast Beef With Yorkshire Pudding.—Reast the beef as usual, basting often. Mix two cupfuls of flour, onehalf teaspoonful of salt, two cupfuls of milk and three well-beaten eggs; beat well and turn into well-greased pans, filling half full and basting with the gravy from the roast, after the pudding has finished rising. around the roast as a garnish.

Apricot Dainty. - Take one-half pound of dried apricots, cook until tender. Mash and add enough sugar to sweeten. Add one cupful of minced marshmallows and let them' melt. Put into sherbet glasses and top with coconut, or chopped nuts.

> Banana Float .- Take one pint of milk, two eggs, one tablespoonful of cornstarch, one-half cupful of sugar, salt, vinegar, two bananas and whipped cream. Mix the cornstarch with a little of the cold milk, scald the remaining portion, add the cornstarch mixture and cook over hot water for ten minutes. Beat the eggs slightly, add sugar, salt, to the egg mixture. Stir the milk into the egg and return the custard to a double boiler and cook until thick and smooth. Cool, flavor and pour over two large ripe bananas cut in slices. Chill, and just tefore serving decorate with tiny floating islands of whipped cream and banana silces.



MELLON PRESENTS A NEW TAX PLAN

WILL MAKE PROFIT LEVY RE TROACTIVE-REPEAL WOULD BE EFFECTIVE LAST JAN. 1.

ESTIMATES ARE REDUCED

\$4,000,000,000 to Run Government in Fiscal Year If Economy is Put In Effect.

Washington - Internal revenue axes during the next fiscal year must produce \$3,200,000,000, according to Secretary of the Treasury Mellon

This amount, coupled with \$800, 600,000 to be derived from the tariff, will meet the Government's bills, Mellon told the Senate Finance Committee Thursday.

The committee has under consideration the tax bill, passed by the House.

The original estimates for the next fiscal year, Mellon informed the committee, were for \$4,554,000 000, it was decided, he said to reduce this amount to \$4,000,000,000 in round numbers.

"If promised governmental economies are made effective, the sum mentioned will be sufficient to meet the Government's needs," said Mel-

He added that he expected the administration to carry out the economies it had outlined.

Mellon made these recommendations: Repeal of the excess profits tax

for this year, making it retroactive to Jan. 1, 1921. Repeal of the capital stock tax pay-

able in 1922. A limitation of 25 per cent in the personal income surtax instead of 32

per cent as provided by the House. In the place of these two taxes, Secretary Mellon recommended an additional corporation income tax of 5 per cent, making the rate 15 per cent as of last January 1.

The conference with Secretary Mellon marked the close of the hearings on the bill. The committee will now tegin its revision, and will make an effort to have it in shape for immediate presentation to Congress wher it reconvenes.

How many times, as his pleasures began to pull upon him, must Faust have regretted his bargain!

If there is any justification of the exploitation of the idea of a bargain with the devil, either in the opera of Faust or in a novel or in the movies, it is the plain lesson at the end that the sort of bargain which the devil offers does not pay.

But there is one mistake which men often make with regard to this matter, which is in supposing that this is the real way in which the thing is done.
