The 6.27% top that was paid on Thursday was the highest August price since 1888 and a full dollar higher than a year ago. The advance for the week wos 10% to 15% with the bulk of the heavy, mixed and medium hogs closing at 5:85 to 6.20, light hogs at 5.50 to 6.10 and distrable pigs at 4.50 5.45.

The mortality or death rate among young cattle that take blackleg is quite high. Proably more than four out of every five that contract blackleg die from this disease.
