ANCIENT TIFLIS, SCENE OF RED "CONGRESS" SESSION WHILE-TROTSKY IS IN EXILE, AT SUKHUM, NEARBY

Georgia, is the scene of the Seviet "Congress," or delegation of the Central Committees from Moscow. Its history goes back to the beginning of the Christian era. In mythelogy Georgia was the eradle of the Aryan race, and the fabled repository of the Golden Fleece, to secure which Jason and his Argonauts braved the waters of the Black Sea and the lofty slopes of the Caucastis Mountains, the extremity of the known world of the ancients.

More recently the city of Tiflis became the capital of the independent Republic of Georgia, now "sovietized" by the Government of Moscow. To middle Europe and Russia, Tiflis is the "Hot Springs" of the Caucasus. Its private and public sulphur baths attract tens of thousands to its salubrious climate between September and May. The curative waters of Georgia are not restricted to the capital. Throughout the State are hundreds of health giving springs and along the Black Sea coast of Georgia are resorts comparable to the best in Europe.

Where Trotsky is in Exile Sukhum, 200 miles from Tiflis, is the retreat of Trotsky, where the deposed dictator is in exile, writing his memoirs, it is said.




