## MRS. JEFFERSON DAVIS.

Mrs. Varina Howell Davis, or as she has signed her name since the 1889, Mrs, Varina Jefferson Davis was the second wife of the Confed erate President. She is not, as many suppose, a daughter of President Zachary Taylor. The story of
Jefferson Davis's two marriages, as told by his widow in her biography, explains why his main career was that of a statesman instead of a sold-
Mr. Davis was a graduate of West Point and was early assighed to service under Colonel Kachary Taylor in the Black Hawk war and at the frontier posts on the Upper Mississippi. It was here that he became enanored of Colonel Taylor's daugh Old Rough and Ready sternly forbade the match. He may not have liked the young West Pointer any too well, but his opposition was placed upon other grounds.
Having had plenty of experience of the hardships anq isolation of an army otticer's frontier life as it was in those days, he maintained that an army man had no right to marry one with his consent, Lieutenant Davis seems to have accepted Colonel Taylor's view. In 1835, at the
age of 27 , he resigned from the army to take up the life of a cotton planter on a place his brother Joseph predid not propitiate Colonel Taylor He still withbeld consent to the marriage.
But Miss Taylorwas loyal. Finding her parent obdurate after two years of filial duty, she left the par ental home at the army post up the
river and came by steamboat to St . Louis. Here she was met by Mr. Davis, nów lieutenant no longer and they were married at the home
of her aunt in Kentucky. It was no elopement. Shee left her father's fome with his full knowledge, bu 2
was in June, 1837. After two or three months on the tricken with malarial fever and the young wife died. The husband bare y escaped death and went away to Cuba for the winter. Returning to Briarfield he devoted the next ten and his books. It was his crop of study that made Mr. Davis one of the best informed men in the country and fitted him for the political caree upon which he entered at their close. About this time his brother, Joseph Davis, and wife were concluding that be longer alone and, it appears plain ly enough in the narative, went into a scheme of matcamaking in his be half, the party of the second in thei plan being Miss Varnie Howell relative of Mrs. Josepn Davis.
Both the widower and girl were easy victims. The marriag was celebrated sixty years ago. Mr. Davis's journey to Washington for his first term in the House of Repre senati
trip.
The aged widow of the Confederate President has suffered many bereave ments, the latest and perhaps the keenest being in the death of her daughter, Winnie, the Daughter of cutive Mansion at Richmond during the Civil War. Her later life has for which her gifts are admirably shown in the story of her husband's iniscences and anecdotes of public men in Washington and Richmond, t. Louis Republic.
