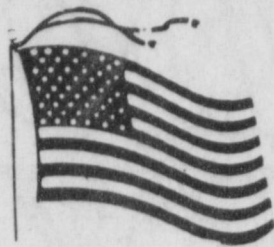

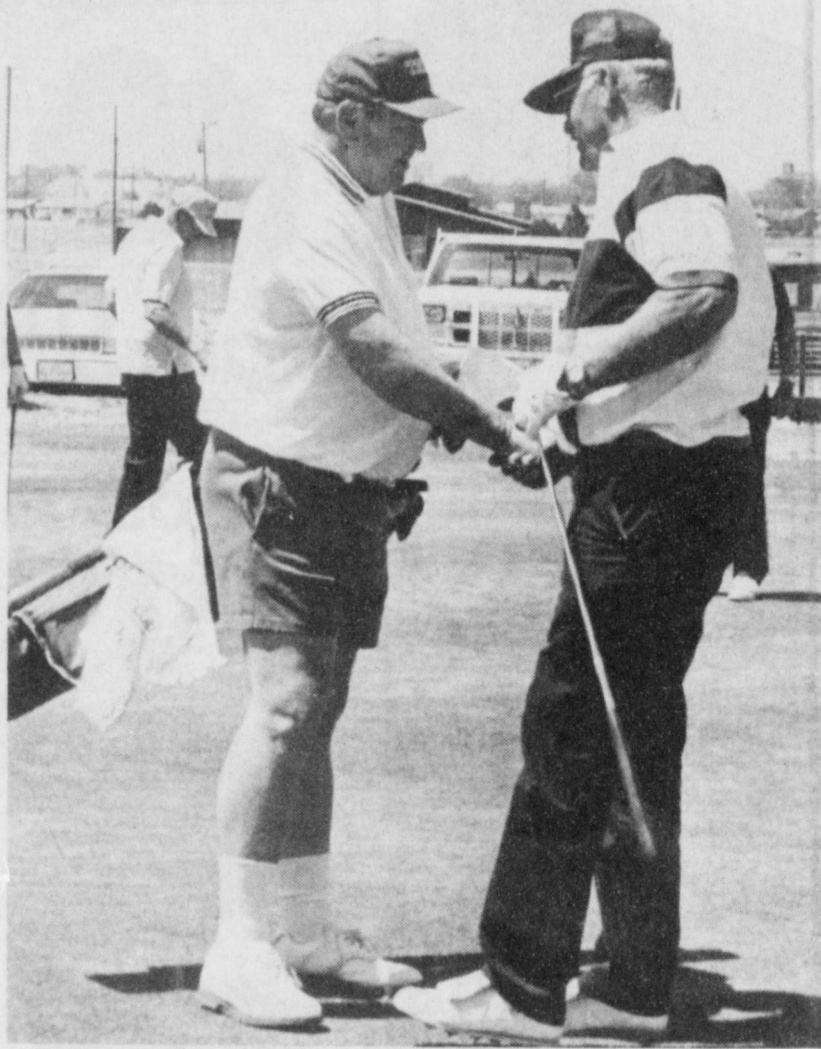

## TWC Water Rules Shift Toward Conservation

The Texas Water Commission has adopted new water conservation regulations designed to reduce per capita municipal water use by 10 percent over the next five years and by 15 percent by the year 2020.

"These new rules make Texas a national leader in water conservation," said TWC Chairman John Hall. "They will save Texans water conservation is quickly gaining acceptance as the best way of extending the limited water resources of Texas. The growing scarcity of water resources requires a shift in planning from water development to water management.

Expanding water resources with reservoir construction is about three times more expensive than water obtained through observation methods. The new rules could save an estimated one billion dollars by preventing the need for six additional reservoirs in Texas over the next 50 years.

The current per capita municipal water use in Texas is about 175 gallons per day. Achievement of

the TWC conservation goal would lower that one to 158 gallons by 1998. That would save 400,000 acre-feet per year, or roughly the annual amount used by the City of Dallas Water Utilities System.

There are multiple benefits from water conservation. In addition to extending available water supplies, conservation can also help extend water and wastewater utility capacity, reduce energy consumption, and reduce sources of water pollution.

The rules were developed over a two-year period. There was an extended public comment period last year, and in January additional comments were received at a public hearing. In all, twenty different groups from the private and public sectors suggested changes, some of which were incorporated in the new rules.

While previous regulations dating back to 1985 require municipal water users to submit conservation plans, the new rules establish specific minimum requirements, including: Goals for per capita water use, Public education programs, Drought management plans, A universal metering program, Leak detection and repair programs, Rate structures that discourage excessive water use, Coordinated reservoir management within common water-sheds, and Enforcement programs.

The new rules are expected to be published in the Texas Register next week. They will take effect twenty days after publication.

## Bailey County Water Level Shows Decline

Bailey County ground water levels declined an average of 0.32 of a foot in 1992, in the measured wells of the network of 80 privately-owned wells maintained by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in its 351,050 acre service area within the county. This decline

represents a decrease of 16,850 acre-feet of water from storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in the portion of Bailey County within the Water District boundaries.

Ground water levels within the Water District's Bailey County service area declined 0.31 of a foot during the 10-year period from

1983 to 1993. A decline of 0.53 of a foot was recorded during the five-year period from 1988 to 1993.

Ground water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer within the 6.4 million acre Water District service area had an average rise of 0.14 of a foot from January 1992 to January 1993. This is a net increase of about 135,103 acre-feet of ground water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the Water District service area.

A zero average annual change in ground water levels was recorded for the first time in the Water District's history in 1985. Depth-to-water measurements revealed an average ground water level rise of 0.50 of a foot in 1986; an average rise of 0.90 of a foot in 1987; an average decline of 0.51 of a foot in 1988; an average decline of one foot in 1989; an average decline of 1.06 feet in 1990 and an average decline of 0.73 of a foot in 1991.

A network of 1,076 privately-owned observation water wells is used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the High Plains Water District. The depth-to-water measurements are taken in January and February of each year in order to allow water levels to stabilize from the pumping during the previous growing season.

By comparing the current depth-to-water measurements with those taken the previous year, Water District Technical Division staff members can determine what changes have occurred in the ground water levels.

Of the 15 counties or portions of counties making up the High Plains Water District, eight recorded average rises in depth-to-water levels in 1992. These Cont. Page 6, Col. 4

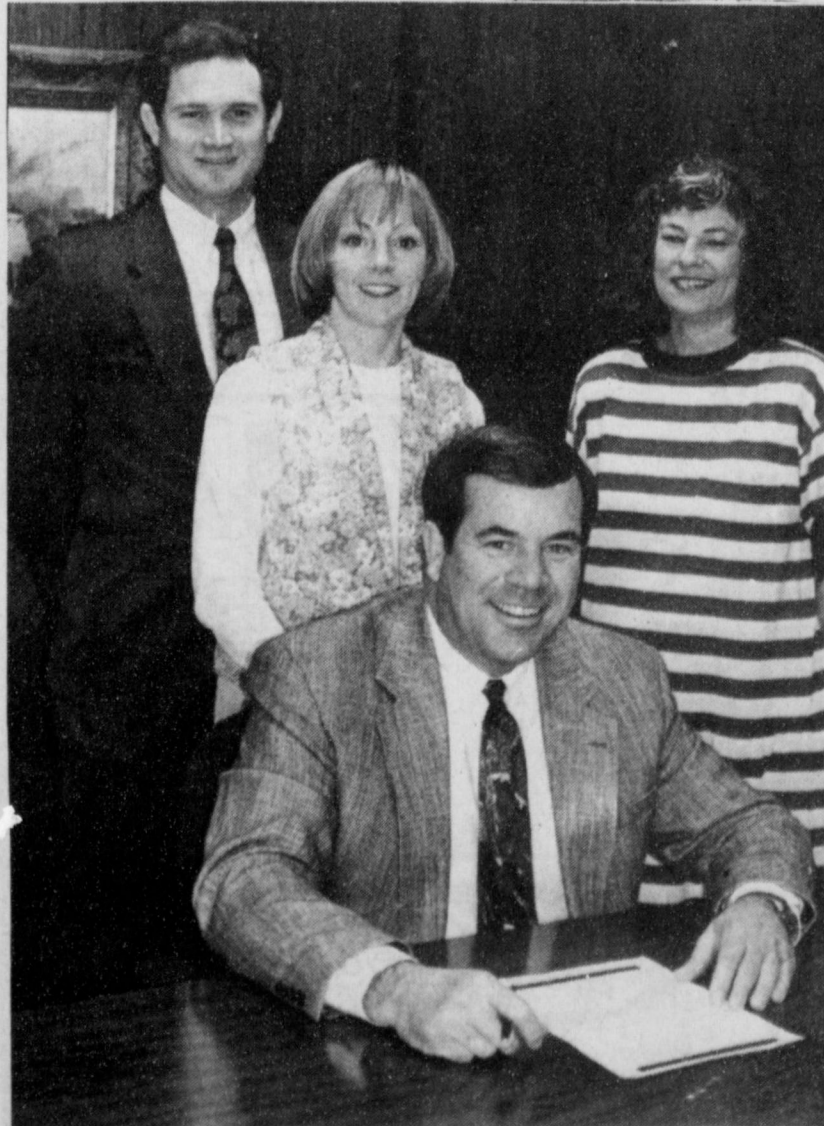
## Christian Center Church To Hold Conference

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### News From Congressman Larry Combest

Once every decade, for the past 200 years, people moving from one part of the country to the other are counted and represented within areas designated as congressional districts. The number of congressmen allotted each state in the 435-member U.S. House of Representatives is based on population proportions. For instance, more people are now in Texas compared with other states in the northeast. As a result, Texas gained three additional seats in the House to become one of the largest delegations with 30 Members of Congress who represent the Lone Star State in Washington, D.C.

The shift counted by the U.S. Census Bureau already tells us who the richest, largest and most heavily-populated congressional districts are in the nation. Comparisons have only recently been completed.

Our 19th Congressional District of Texas now covers 20 counties that run from the top of the Panhandle through the South Plains and into the Permian Basin; 400 miles in length. The boundaries of each congressional district within a state must be redrawn so that it holds the same number of people. In Texas, that number was 566,217 people. The 19th District covers one of the largest geographic areas by ranking 31st among 435 congressional districts, but we are also one of the least densely-populated, ranking 405th because of the ratio of people to wide-open West Texas spaces.

Across the nation in congressional districts, household incomes average \$30,715. In Texas, the household incomes vary from \$17,866 in the Rio Grande Valley up to \$45,232 in the more affluent areas of Dallas. Households in our congressional district average \$27,267--ranking 13th of 30 Texas congressional districts. Our 19th District also ranks about midway among the list of household incomes in congressional districts nationwide. The richest is New Jersey's Essex County at \$57,219; the poorest households are found in the congressional district of Shreveport, Louisiana making \$14,515 on average each year.

Although these congressional district lines are often arbitrary and

sometimes questionably drawn, they starkly illustrate the diversity of the American people. From the richest to the poorest households, income may vary by more than \$42,000. However, each congressional district has roughly equal populations representing approximately 600,000 constituents. Every Member of Congress has an equal vote on legislation--an equal vote representing the equal voice of every adult and child. The House of Representatives has always been known as "The Peoples' House" for good reason.

Our form of representative government has endured since the Constitution of the United States was signed in 1787. For more than two centuries the size and wealth of our nation has grown beyond what the original signers could have predicted. Yet, the protection of our rights to equal representation prevailed. The more we have changed, the more our nation's Constitution has remained the same.

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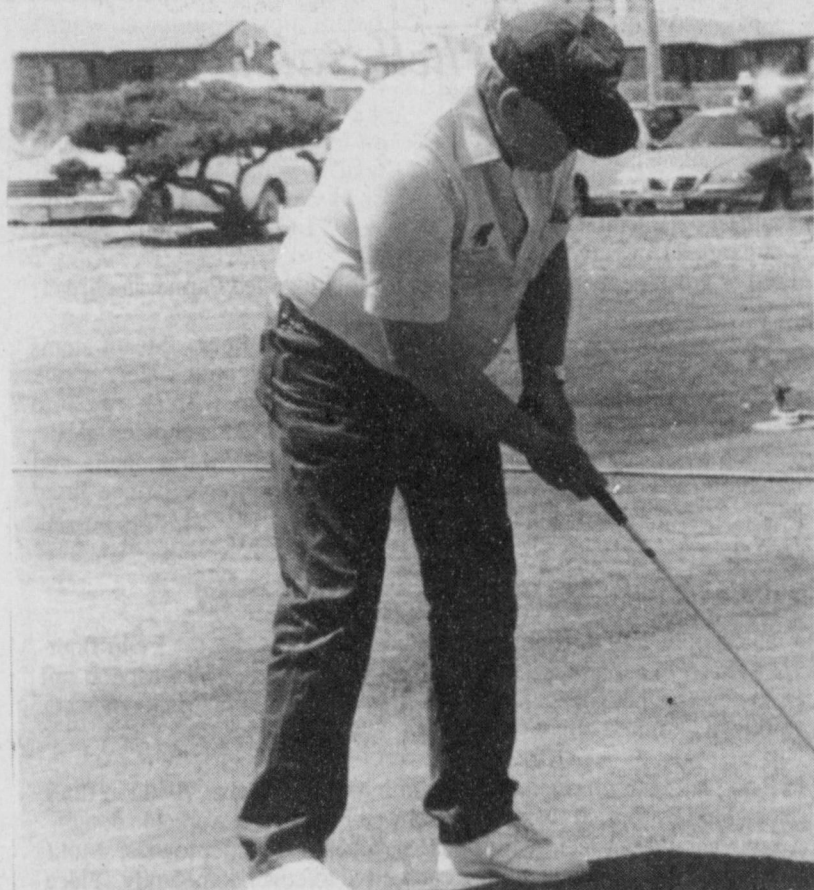

The Hungarian Virtuosi Orchestra was founded in 1988 by graduates of the world-famous Liszt Ferenc Academy of Music. As a result of their highly successful debut concert in Hungary, the ensemble received invitations for debut concert tours in Austria, France, and Italy. Hungarian Television showed the orchestra in a monthly music program and their first record was released by Hungaroton in 1989. The orchestra makes its debut North American tour in the 1993-94 season, with Israeli pianist Ory Shihor as guest soloist.

The artistic director of the orchestra is Miklos Szenthelyi, a violinist whose international career has taken him throughout Europe, and to Japan, Brazil, Austria, Canada and the United States. ## Eye Corrections Essential For Some Children

A lifetime of potential vision and learning problems can be avoided if parents will simply look their children squarely in the eyes according to a pediatric ophthalmologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

An eye disorder characterized by misaligned eyes, called strabismus, affects about four percent of all children and can lead to a variety of vision problems.

"Many newborns take several months before they can focus their eyes and use them together," said Dr. Jane Edmond, an assistant professor of ophthalmology at Baylor. "occasional crossed eyes are not considered a problem in the newborn until about six months of age.

Parents should watch to see how infants and toddlers focus on objects. Squinting or not recognizing objects at a distance may signal near-sightedness. Crossed eyes could mean far-sightedness. Both should be checked by an ophthalmologist.

"School age children may begin to fall behind other children in school because they do not realize their vision is poor," said Dr. Edmond.

Using a series of tests, an ophthalmologist can assess vision, examine eye alignment and determine what sort of correction is needed. The type of correction could be glasses, or if strabismus is present, surgery may be required.

"Evaluation for treatment of strabismus is a complicated process because there are six muscles which move the eye," said Edmond.

Depending on the amount of direction of deviation from the normal position, the ophthalmologist will make small cuts in the eye tissue and reposition the muscle or muscles necessary to align the eyes properly.

The procedure is done under general anesthesia, and many children resume their normal activities the next day.

It is important to treat strabismus as early as possible because as the eye develops it can become more difficult to correct.

Contact is a Christian based ministry of listening presence. Trained volunteers integrate their faith response with the principles of crisis intervention, active listening, problem solving, and psycho-therapy.

Contact can also help locate information and referral resources in the local area.

Teenagers who are 15 and in the tenth grade may also participate in Contact's program. Teen graduates are certified to work on Teenline answering calls daily from 6 to 10 p.m. often, teens prefer to talk to another teen about personal problems or concerns. Teenline has received more than 10,000 calls since opening its lines in 1985. Teenline can be reached by calling the same "800" number listed above and simply ask for the teen listener.

Contact Lubbock Hotline is operated by Christians dedicated to "Being" there for others. Your concerns will be taken seriously in a non judgmental manner. Listeners are skilled in crisis intervention and problem solving. Contact is available to you any time of the day or night. When and if you need someone to talk to Contact is there for you.

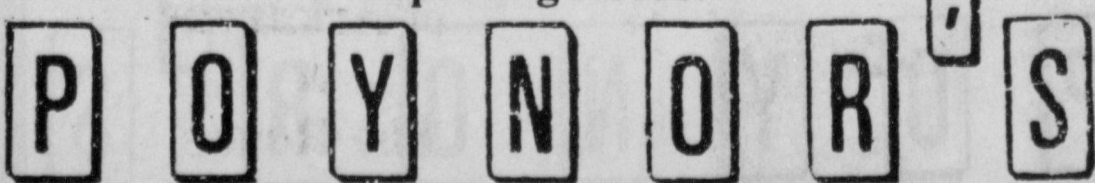

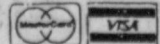

You never know when you answer the phone who's waiting on the other end. It could be some nut with an obscene message or someone else who gets his kicks harassing people. You're pretty much a sitting duck each time you answer the phone.

That's why I sponsored in the Senate a bill that would legalize Caller ID services in Texas. In case you've never heard of Caller ID, it's a service that, with the help of a device attached to your phone, allows you to see the name and number of the person calling. If you don't recognize the number and don't want to be disturbed, you don't answer the phone. You can also pick out those calls from people you want to talk to.

I like to compare this service to a peephole on a front door. You have the right to see who's standing on your porch before you open the door--just as you have the right to know who's on the line before you answer your phone.

As the Senate considered this bill, I was approached by groups with privacy concerns. They said a wife in a battered-woman's shelter should be able to call home and

check on things without tipping off her husband to her whereabouts. Others said police officers and doctors require confidentiality at times. And then there are people who want to call a business without worrying about return calls with sales pitches.

They wanted me to include a provision in my bill allowing per-call blocking and per-line blocking. If you want to make a call and don't want your name and number displayed on the other end, you punch "\*67." This is per-call blocking. It blocks your identity from showing up on the other party's Caller ID device. But it's only good for that call. Per-line blocking allows you to automatically conceal your identity on any call from your line.

Since politics is the art of compromise, I agreed to include per-call and per-line blocking options in my bill. Consequently,

the Caller ID bill easily passed the Senate and is awaiting action in the House of Representatives.

But now I'm receiving inquiries from people asking, "don't per-line and per-call blocking essentially render Caller ID useless?" After all, wouldn't most obscene phone callers have enough sense to "block" their name and number before calling you? Maybe or maybe not. But the answer is that other services will be available to protect yourself from people like that or anyone else you don't want to talk to. They can be used in conjunction with Caller ID, which was never meant to solve all problems alone.

For example, your phone can be programmed to reject any calls from a blocked phone. If a caller doesn't want to identify himself to you, your phone won't accept the call. You can block the blocker.

Or if an unwelcome call gets through and you want to prevent further intrusions, you can block the last number you received from calling you again. You don't even have to know the person's number. Or you can pick out specific numbers, and block them from future calls.

**Liberating America's Schools**

The 1983 report, "A Nation at Risk," warned Americans of a rising tide of mediocrity in our public schools. The decade since then has seen many attempts at reform but none that overhauled our failing educational system. Today, a growing number of citizens are rallying behind one response that does: School Choice, which empowers parents to select those schools best suited to their children's needs — schools given the freedom to innovate and the responsibility to perform.

Clarence E. Page, Pulitzer Prize-winning syndicated columnist for the *Chicago Tribune*, examines this controversial grassroots movement and the debate surrounding it in *Liberating America's Schools*. Says Page, "Choice advocates say they want to encourage competition among schools — public and private, not to tear the public schools down, but to shake them up and, ultimately, make them better or force them out of business."

The program profiles successful choice programs in Minnesota, New York City, and Milwaukee. Interviews with parents, teachers, students, administrators, activists, and scholars provide personal perspectives on the movement's grassroots origins and real-life accomplishments.

Milwaukee, Wisconsin's private school voucher program offers an alternative to dysfunctional public schools and challenges them to improve. State-funded vouchers (currently \$2,745 per student) are provided to about 1,000 low-income families whose children move from the public school system into participating inner-city private schools.

One state trying new ideas is Minnesota, where students and their families may choose among various types of public schools and alternative programs. Up to 100,000 students enroll yearly, and over 10,000 former drop-outs have re-enrolled since the choice programs started. Options include state-wide Open Enrollment, which lets students apply to districts outside their own; Area Learning Centers, which provide varied services for at-risk students; Contract Schools, run by non-profit agencies like the Urban League under contract to local districts; and the Post-Secondary Option program, which lets juniors and seniors finish high school at colleges and universities.

Another idea being tried in Minnesota is the Charter School, where many regulations are waived and public funding is tied directly to student performance. Chartered jointly by local school districts and the state board of education, these non-profit, public entities embody the strategy of using market-type competition to improve the public schools. As Joe Nathan, director of the Center for School Change of the University of Minnesota explains, "The key idea of charter schools is to test the notion: will schools improve, will students learn more, if the continued existence of the school depends on what happens to students." The charter school concept is being adopted or proposed in other states, including California, Tennessee, Michigan, Florida, and Arizona.
