A small residence on the J. L. Graham farm adjoining the northeast corner of the city, was totally destroyed by fire Monday night between 12 and 1 o'clock. The cause of the fire is not definitely deter- George Thomas 4th. mined, though it is thought that a kerosene lamp, which had been left HoHdges 4th. lighted, exploded and ignited the interior of the house.

The Morgan family, which was occupying the house had been sitting up with their sick baby, who has been seriously ill, and about 11 o'clock they had gone to the home of J. L. Graham, only a few steps away, leaving a lamp burning. Shortly before midnight Mr. Morgan returned to his house and found flames shooting through the roof and the interior white with flame. The first alarm was given by the locomotive whistle near the depot, and then the city fire alarm was sounded, bringing out the local fire John Deere Implement volunteers who made a fast run in the motor fire truck to the scene of the fire. Reduction In **Pumping Rate**

Cent Granted on Municipal Power Reading.

The Texas Utilities Company has entered into a new contract with the power pumping rate, effective now, states Mayor T. M. Nichols.

A reduction of twenty-five per cent from the old rate has been secured. This is in line with the utility company's general policy, as similar reductions have been voluntarily made throughout the Panhandle at points where operating franchises are held.

Petersburg, April 10 .- The light and power plant here has been sold to the Texas Utilities Company and a fifty-year franchise and twentyyear pumping contract has been let to the purchasers. The local system will be tied into the high-line at an early date.






The figure for this year will exceed that of 1928 by approximately 100 children, it is thought, as the census for that year showed only 504 children of school age residing in the district.





A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous

session of that Court,-BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG. ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Sections 2 and of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to bereafter read as follows:

"Article 5. Section2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute , quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United fact as may be necessary to the prop-States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified vottion, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall reprovided by law. In case of a vaancy in the office of Chief Justice if the Supreme Court, the Goverfor shall fill the vacancy until the ext general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this aof their term of office under the present Constitution, and until effect, the Governor shall imall terminate."

The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of er exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of busi ness at such times as may be designated by the Court.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor; providing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compenstaion for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, this amendment shall not become ef-January, 1931."

Sec. 2 The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted for H. B. Sams, court reporter for to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those Grady Wimberly. voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: . "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing Merrell, Jim Brooks. the salary of the Governor."

Sec. 3 The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same publishfor amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.






