

MISD Trustees Take Oath Of Office

Cindy Purdy, president of the MISD board of trustees, called the school board meeting to order Tuesday night. The invocation was given by Curtis Shelburne.

Visitors and school officials attending the meeting were recognized and the results from the May 1 election was canvassed.

District Judge Jack Young administered the oath of office to Cindy Purdy, District 2, Frank Saldana, District 3 and Sam Harlan, District 5.

Following taking the oath of office, the board reorganized and elected officers. Ms. Purdy was reelected as president; Sam Harlan. vice president; and Curtis Shelburne, secretary.

Ms. Purdy stated that she felt the board made a great team and that had come a long way.

The staff development waiver for 1993-94 was discussed and approved. They are asking for the same days district wide.

Superintendent of Operations Adrian Meador told about being invited to Morton to see a new program the Morton school system had entered into. He also showed a slide presentation.

"We would like to get all of the kids to grade level reading by the third grade." Meador said. "All students must learn to read before they do anything else. We must teach how to read to begin with. Chapter 1 must shift to emphasize reading also. Chapter 1 has not been as effective as it should be. We need to cut down on the students in Chapter programs.

"Schools that have the John Hopkins program have a lower rate of retention and Chapter programs."

Ms. Helen Grigsby reported on what they will be doing at Dillman Elementary. She stated that every teacher will be doing the same thing and that all students will be reassessed each eight weeks.

School And Hospital Incumbents Re-elected

Despite the unseasonably cool weather Saturday, voters in Bailey County went to the polls, electing two councilmen Dr. Tom Bonds, and Rex Harris, three school board trustees, Incumbent Cindy Purdy, Incumbent Frank Saldana and Incumbent Sam Harlan, and two members of the hospital district, Tim Campbell and Robert Finney. Also on the ballet were three Constitutional Amendments and a senatorial election.

In the City Council District 3 race, Arturo Garica, Jr. received eight votes, James Roy Jones, 7, and Write In Candidate Dr. Tom Bonds received 100 votes. Jones moved from Muleshoe after the ballots were printed and his name remained eventhough he was ineligible to hold the office.

In City Council District 4, Rex Harris received 131 votes and Alberto G. Daniel received two

There was only one contested precinct in the school trustee election. In Precinct five, Incumbent Sam Harlan received 49 votes and Lupe Olivarez received 0 votes. Incumbent Cindy Purdy received 110 votes in Precinct 2 and Frank Saldana received 24 votes in Precinct 3.

In the hospital election, Incumbents Tim Campbell and Robert Finney were unopposed. Campbell received a total of 106 votes and Finney received 74 votes.

In the Senatorial Election, Kay Hutchison (R) carried Bailey County by a fairly large margin. Hutchison received a total of 283 votes, Barter (R) received 195; Fields (R), 132; Fisher, (D) 34; Gutierrez (D) 55; and Krueger (D) 194.

Hutchison will face U.S. Senator Bob Krueger in a runoff election for the Senate Krueger and Hutchison ran neck-and-neck statewide, each getting about 29 percent of the votes.

agreed on a plan to pursue.

Thursday, May 6, Dillman Elementary will pre-register students who are eligible for kindergarten or pre-kindergarten for the 1993-94 school year. Registration will be held in the Dillman Gym from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

To be eligible for kindergaten, children must be five years old by September 1, 1993. To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, children must be four years old by September 1, 1993 and must also meet one of the following requirements: (1) have a limited knowledge of and comprehension of the English language, or (2) are from a family who is eligible to receive free or reduced price lunches. Pre-kindergarten students who are already attending school do not need to register for kindergarten.

The pre-kindergarten classes will operate on a half-day basis only, with classes being from 8 to 11 a.m. or from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. Kindergarten will operate on a fullday basis.

Parents are asked to take the child's birth certificate, immunization records, and the child's social security number when enrolling. All children who enroll for kindergarten or pre-kindergarten on May 6 will be screened for speech and language that day. Parents are therefore urged to take their children with them.

Current Kindergarten classes continue as usual Thursday, May 6. Please contact Mrs. Helen

Why Fish Is For Kids

Think back to your childhood. How often did your family have seafood? Perhaps it was fish on Fridays. Or maybe just an occasional tuna sandwich. That's still the scenario for many American families. So, how can parents--who want to turn the dietary tide for their kids--raise them to be fish eaters?

As most well-intentioned parents have learned, the admonition, "Eat it--it's good for you" doesn't go very far in getting a child to eat according to parent's wishes. But, there is mounting evidence that seafood is good for children and adults alike.

Fish and shellfish contain highquality protein--essential for growing youngsters of all ages. Just a two-ounce portion of most types of fish will provide well over

half the daily protein recommendation for a small child.

Some seafood can also be important sources of calcium and iron, two nutrients likely to be in short supply in children's diets. Although heart disease is usually thought of as a "grown up's problem," many experts now agree that childhood eating habits play an important preventative role.

When it comes to heart-healthy foods, seafood can't be beat. Most types of fish and shellfish are low in total fat and saturated fat. Nearly all seafood and shellfish makes them low in calories as well when compared with fattier protein foods. Since surveys suggest that one out of four schoolage American children are overweight, calories count for many youngsters.

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Walking To Improve Your Health

Amid the numerous reports about the benefits of exercise, experts agree on the positive impact of the simplest of activities--walking. The new mileage at any pace can improve your health, and walking quickly can provide as much fitness as jogging. With the weather turning warmer, now is the perfect time to begin a walking regimen.

"Walking is just about the perfect exercise. It uses almost all of the body's 206 bones and 660 muscles," said Cheryl Benoit, wellness coordinator at Methodist Hospital's LifeStyle Centre. "Walking at any pace can provide some benefits, but to achieve optimal fitness levels, have more energy, and burn off significantly more calories, follow the general guidelines set by the American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM).

To achieve fitness, the ACSM recommends exercising-including walking-at a brisk pace for 20 to 60 minutes, three to five times per week, at a heart rate of 50 to 80 percent of your predicted maximum rate. (Be sure to check with your physician first)

If you decide to pace off a new physique by walking, watch the clock and listen to your body, Benoit advises. Distance is irrelevant. What is important is the amount of time spent moving and intensity of your stride.

"Walk at a pace that elevates your heartbeat, and do it regularly, said Benoit. "Begin each walk with 5 to 10 minutes of simple warm-up exercises and stretches and follow the walk with a similar cool-down period of 10 to 15 minutes."

Tricks Of The Trade


* Try the "one bite" method. That is, the child has to try one bite of each different food on his plate. Let the child remove the bite if he doesn't like it and praise the child for trying the food.

* If you're serving a new food, try to include another food that is the child's favorite at the same meal.

* Let kids help you prepare the new food. Children are more apt to try something that they have helped to

* Gradually make the switch to eating more of a new food.

* Substitute the new food in place of another similar food in your family's favorite recipes.

Keep An Eye On Kids' Sugar Intake

There is a place for sugar in children's diets, but it should be kept to a moderate level.

Children who learn to prefer sweet-tasting foods may face problems down the line, said Janice Stuff, a nutritionist at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. The problems can include dental problems and unwanted weight

To reduce sugar in children's diets, Stuff recommends:

* Drinking unsweetened fruit juices instead of soft drinks or items labeled "punch", "fruit drinks" and 10% juice".

* Preparing homemade frozen fruit bars by freezing juice.

* Flavoring pancakes, waffles, muffins, and hot cereals with cinnamon and nutmeg or with

* Using one-third to one-fourth less

sugar than called for in recipes. Limiting candy bars to once of twice a week.

How To Treat Nose Bleeds

Nosebleeds are an annoying problem, but they can usually be treated with simple first aid.

Dr. John K. Jones, an otorhinolarynogolist at Baylor College Of Medicine in Houston recommends:

* Applying pressure to the soft part of the nose for several minutes. Do not apply pressure to the hard bony portion.

* Soaking a piece of cotton in nasal drops such as Neosinephron. Pack the cotton in the nose.

* Placing a humidifier in the room, especially during winter when heaters can dry the air. Dry nasal passages are more likely to bleed.

* Discouraging children from placing their fingers in their noses. This is the leading cause of nosebleeds in children.

Smoking Affects Mother's Milk

Cigarette smoking can affect the amount of milk a breast-feeding woman produces. It can also affect the milk's fat content.

Smokers produce almost as much milk in the first two weeks as nonsmokers, but at four weeks the smokers were producing 43 percent less milk and at six weeks 46 percent, said Dr. Judy Hopkinson of the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of MEdicine in Houston.

A study conducted by Hopkinson found the fat content of smokers' milk to be 20 percent lower than that of non-smokers'.

On average, the breast-fed infant of a smoker may receive 10 percent fewer calories per ounce of milk than the breast-fed infant of a nonsmoker, Hopkinson said.

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Make "Baby's First Gift" A Memorable And Healthy One

An estimated 50,000 drug-exposed infants are born in Texas every year and the state spends more than \$400 million annually on health care for these babies according to the Texas Commission in Alcohol and Drug Abuse.

Today the Texas Prevention Partnership and the National Organization on Fetal Alcohol Syndrome kicked off a month-long campaign to help Texans have healthier babies.

Baby's First Gift is an awareness and incentive project to encourage women and girls to seek adequate prenatal care and stay alcohol and drug-free during pregnancy.

Baby's First Gift promotes the essage that the first gift a pregnant woman can give her baby is a substance-free pregnancy and good prenatal care. Posters with the slogans "Help your baby, help yourself" and "When a pregnant woman uses drugs, we all get wasted" have toll free numbers (1-800-367-2229 and 1-800-832-9623) for information.

• For incentive, a canvas baby bag with informational brochures is offered to women after their first prenatal visit at Texas Department of Health clinics as well as other participating health care providers. Local coalitions and retailers can also sponsor Baby's First Gift baby showers to collect items to go into the bags for both mothers and Dabies.

Baby's First Gift is a nontraditional approach to a serious public health problem, but Harvy Weiss, project director, cited one example of how the effort pays off. "Last year a 16 year old heroin addict saw the BFG poster in a shopping mall, came in for treatment and delivered a healthy erug-free baby girl, seven months later," Weiss said that research indicates that prevention programs

save about \$3 for every dollar

invested.
Johnson and Johnson, as well as other major corporations, is supporting the campaign. J&J donated a 30 second public service announcement, and A.G. "The heart-rending stories of babies born to women who have used illegal drugs during pregnancy have captured the attention of the nation. "When a pregnant woman drinks alcohol, her baby does, too and there is not proof that even small amounts of alcohol are safe," Munter said.

Dr. Peggy Smith, director of the Baylor Teen Health Clinic in Houston, said, "It is critical that prevention efforts be targeted at the middle and high school populations and to acknowledge that many young girls live in families or have relationships with men who are using or dealing drugs and are heavy drinkers."

The Texas Prevention Partnership is a public/private effort to promote public health perspectives about drug and alcohol abuse through mass media and comprehensive community mobilization programs. TPP was initiated and is funded in part by the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse.

* Keeping the car radio at a level that enables conversation to be easily heard.



Callers To Be Instructed On Two Area Code Changes

On November 1, 1992, the 512 area code split into two area codes--512 and 210. Austin, Corpus Christi and surrounding areas remained in the 512 area code, while San Antonio and surrounding areas acquired the new 210 area code.

Beginning May 2, recorded messages reminded those who dialed the incorrect area code that they must use the new 210 area code when placing calls to that number. Callers no longer were automatically switched to the correct number as they have been since November. The reminder recording will remain in place until November 1993, when callers will be expected to use the correct area codes for 512 and 210 area code

The new area code was established due to an almostexhausted supply of phone numbers available in the 512 area code.

Everyone in both the 512 and new 210 area codes kept the same seven-digit telephone number that they had prior to the area code split. The change hasn't affected longdistance rates, although there were some changes in long-distance dialing.

The following GTE exchanges are in the 210 area code: Blanco, Boerne, Floresville, Fredericksburg, Gillett, Gonzales, Johnson City, Kosciusko, Lavernia, Marble Falls, Nixon, Poth, Round Mountain, Smilley, Stonewall, Sutherland Springs, Weslaco and Willow City.

proposal that would have authorized the shifting of some property tax money from wealthier to poorer

Regional property tax revenuesharing currently takes place under a 1991 effort by lawmakers to meet the court's order for equalized school funding. But the Supreme Court's order said last year that the system violated the constitution because it created a state property tax and lacked voter approval.

One of the options could be local elections to authorize the continued regional redistribution of some property tax money.

Richards said that Saturday's lopsided vote showed that Texans don't like that approach. That means \$350 million that had been shifted from wealthier school districts no longer is available to the system, noted Ms. Linebarger, D-Manchaca.

Voters sent the lawmakers the message that they don't want such revenue-sharing, that they want excellence in their schools, and they don't want any taxes raised to for it," Governor Ann Richards said...

Saturday Named Annual Migratory Bird Day

Saturday, May 8 has been designated as the first annual international Migratory Bird Day and is the 75th anniversary of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act.

Migratory Bird Day initiated by Partners in Flight, a neotropical migratory conservation program sponsored by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Partners in Flight is encouraging participation in activities dedicated to the conservation of all migratory birdssongbirds, shorebirds, raptors, and waterfowl.

More than 330 species of birds embark on annual migrations across the Americas, breeding in the north and wintering in south, traveling during the spring and fall. However in recent years both their numbers and their habitat have

decreased. Populations of forest dwelling migratory birds in eastern North America have declined at a rate as high as three percent over a ten year period preceding 1987.

During 1985 the total breeding population of ducks was estimated at 30,833,000, the lowest ever recorded.

The decline of migrator birds is primarily due to the destruction and degradation of wildlife throughout the Americas.


