### Marital Happiness Better in County

Marital happiness in homes of Briscoe county has a favorable showing in comparison to the whole State of Texas, according to figures furnished R. E. Douglas, county clerk, by the department of commerce at Washington. Also, a review of the records of divorces for the past two years reveals improved conditions in the county, a progress of 5 per cent in satisfied homes.

In Texas last year there were 76,-340 marirages and 18,073 divorces, a 23 1-2 per cent in dissolution of homes. In Briscoe county in 1928 eighty-eight couples married and only seven were divorced, only 8 per cent going on the rocks of disagreement. Sixty-nine per cent of all Texas manufacturers is found in six counties-Jefferson, Harris, Dallas, Tarrant, Bexar and El Paso. The 4.065 plants listed in the 1927 Census Bureau report, employed 116,783 persons and produced \$1,206,79,962 worth of goods.

During 1928 the United States built 29.252 miles of improved highways. Texas led with 2.356 miles

Limestone County leads Texas in the number of farms, the Census Bureau showing 6,755 in 1'25. Texas leads the nation with 466.395 farms.






