Significant Community Recreation Program Initiated By Lions

Silverton

H. McClure, who accidentally and killed himself last month hunting between Alpine and was a former resident of Silverton and the founder of the Silverton Star, predecessor of the Briscoe County News. He is well remembered as the owner and operator of Silverton's first newspaper.

McClure was assistant manager of the Oil Fields Lumber company of Odessa when the fatal accident occurred. He was conscious when he was able to relate how he was shot. He had fallen, discharging his gun with the load taking effect on his arm. Loss of blood is said to have resulted in his death.

An inspection of one of the old cases in the office of the News reveals the name of R. H. McClure etched on the frame, with Tulia designated as the shipping point. Considerable changes have been made in the mechanical equipment of the press such as new type, power press and a type-setting machine since the early days, and perhaps the type is the only remaining relic of the founder that may be identified as belonging to the printing shop which was used in the newspaper field of this county.

It is an unusual thing for tentmen to be generally mourned as they pass from the stage of life, but throughout the circuit of Merry Madcaps' annual tours are several expressions of regret at the passing of Ernest Stewart, manager of the Merry Madcaps at Silverton.

The great dramatist states in a recent play of keen insight. "All the world's a stage, and men and women merely players; each has his part to perform." and Stewart was a sad actor. While showing at Crane City, a gang of hoodlums fired his tent causing a complete loss of property. And a year ago his wife killed her during a stage-play.

The life of the traveling showman and beyond comprehension. Stewart received the hard contact of being people without himself being severe and coarse; yielded to the neat trimmings which towns accustomed to deal his profession about himself turning grafter; was backed in a countless number of ways but refused to become a hi-jack and met rebuffs with the gentleness of a woman.

The public calls the traveling showman a "hard customer." and it is this attitude that is responsible to a great extent for the roughness seen, and nature of the vocation squeezes the other remaining human quality. But such men as Ernest Stewart and as is Harley Sadler put to shame who are unable to retain innate gentility in the rubbing of shoulders in our own comparative peaceful occupations among home and friends every day in the week.

There is a tempestuous life but kindness is their chief characteristic. Friends can tell of Sadler giving \$200 to a sick stranger for his operation; Stewart giving \$100 for a road leading to a small town; of one purchasing the local theatre man for a season while the road-show was in town; of countless generousities and dealing that have built a name for their shows that will continue long after the managers have gone.

Widowhood has lost a great character in Ernest Stewart, and man has lost a friend.

Farm Night School Will Begin Soon

Agriculture Teacher Will Hold School On Diseases of Livestock and Poultry.

The education of the youth of this community is not the only responsibility of the public school system. The Department of Vocational Agricultural proposes to offer definite courses of instruction this winter for the adult farmers in the Silverton trade territory.

W. M. Gourley met with the local School Board this fall and went over the plans for conducting two night schools to begin the first of the year.

These schools will be held at night and cover a period of several weeks. After discussion of the matter with several farmers and in view of the large number of calls for help from the livestock and poultry raisers, it has been decided that a definite school of instruction dealing with one of the major farm problems in this community is needed; that is diseases of poultry and livestock in this community and methods of control.

The course will be outlined in full at an early date, and all farmers of the county are invited to become enrolled in either one or both schools. It has been found that through a program of education many farmers can handle most of their problems. The investment in both livestock and poultry in this section amounts to a large sum. The production from our livestock and poultry has been a great asset to the county in financial way.

It is of great importance that the producers know how to protect the health of stock and flocks and follow out modern methods of treatment for the sick animals and fowls. By attending this school and carrying back home the information brought out each night, any livestock or poultry owner can not help but save himself some financial losses.

Dates for the opening of these schools will be announced at an early date. It is probable, however, that they will be held during month of January.

A true chord of progress was struck in the symphonic notes of service at the Lions club Tuesday luncheon when O. R. Tipps proposed to a receptive membership that a recreation club or community recreation organization be formed in Silverton for the purpose of promoting

healthful activities and providing grounds for recreative periods for the entire citizenship.

The club has always been interested in athletic activities. A baseball team was organized in the summer, and this fall a football team was ready to take the field but no opponent could be found. During the past few weeks members have been turning out for basketball practice several times a week, and a challenge has been issued to any Lions club in the district for a match or series of games.

The movement proposed by Judge Tipps is of a more extensive nature and if carried to fruition will affect the health of everybody by touching his or her hours of play or recreation. In the tentative outline are included a city park, tennis courts in different section of town, additions to the inadequate school equipment for physical training, and any other feature tending toward healthful activities.

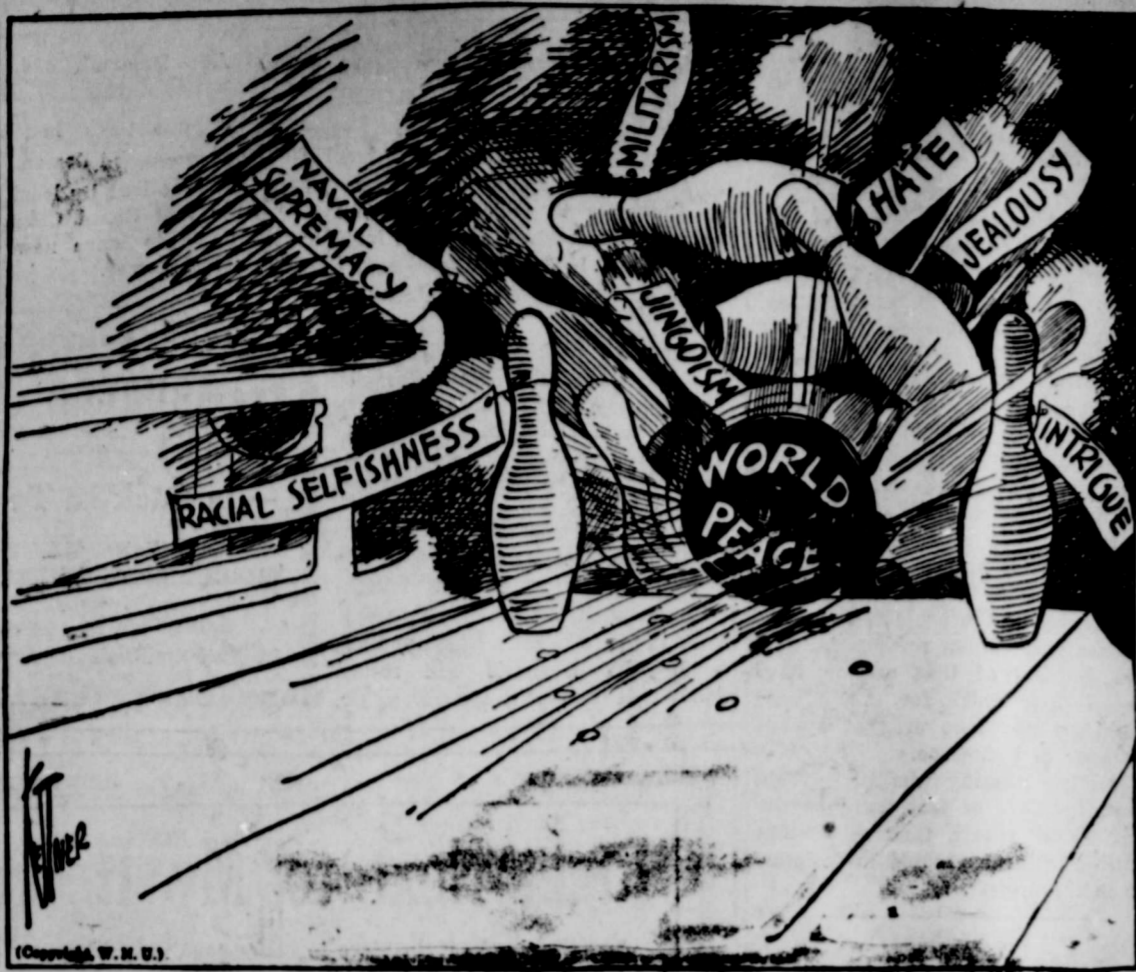

DISTRICT MANAGER VISITS QUITAQUE TUESDAY AFTERNOON—SAYS QUITAQUE AND SILVERTON IN LINE FOR IMPROVEMENTS SOON.

QUITAQUE, TEXAS, Dec. 3.—That the systems of the State Telephone Co. in both Silvertown and Quitaque are "on the books" to be rebuilt, was the statement made here on Tuesday afternoon of this week by W. A. Cooper of Matador, district manager of the company.

SOME PERTINENT FACTS ABOUT SELECTING MALE IN POULTRY FLOCK TO AID EGG PRODUCTION

(BY W. M. GOURLEY)

Increase in egg production is the aim of all poultry owners, and the selection of breeding males for the farm flock is of great importance to secure this end.

When a breeder tells you that he has fine male birds because they won at certain poultry shows, he has only given you parts of the facts. A good exhibition bird is desirable for any flock provided he has production records behind him.

No poultry breeder can say however that exhibition qualities will give high production. High egg production is inherited. It comes from the male of the flock; that is, if you are heading for high egg production, you must head the flocks with males out of high producing dams.

If the exhibition male at the shows is from such a hen, then he is valuable to have in the flock. If there is no production record through trapping official testing, then you may or may not have a good male. In fact, it has been proved by many experiment stations that combination exhibition and production qualities in poultry are rare. The most outstanding producing flocks as a rule make

poor show birds. Many times 300-egg hens, with trapnest records, have been put in state and national shows, and to the disappointment of the owners, 100-hen producers have placed over them.

Now then, if you are buying a good male bird, be sure to find out the egg production of his dam and not how many ribbons he has won. The best information you need is his dam and granddam egg records. Last week I suggested that you pen up your best producing hens during the winter months for your breeding pens. The male chicks from these hens should be the ones for your breeding pens of the following year. This will give you a definite course of procedure in reaching high production, wherein the profit is largely made from poultry.

Besides checking up the egg record of the male's predecessors, you should observe breeding characteristics. He should be well-developed and have all weight requirements of the breed. For instance, a young Barred Rock male under one year old should weigh 8 pounds; the old male 9 1-2. Single Comb White Leghorns, 4 1-2 and 5 1-2 respectively. The size is very important. Another factor is the age. The best fertility comes from the young males, and the highest from April and May hatched cockerels.

The last factor is to select males free from all diseases of inherited nature. Next week there will be an article dealing with the care and mating of poultry breeding pens.

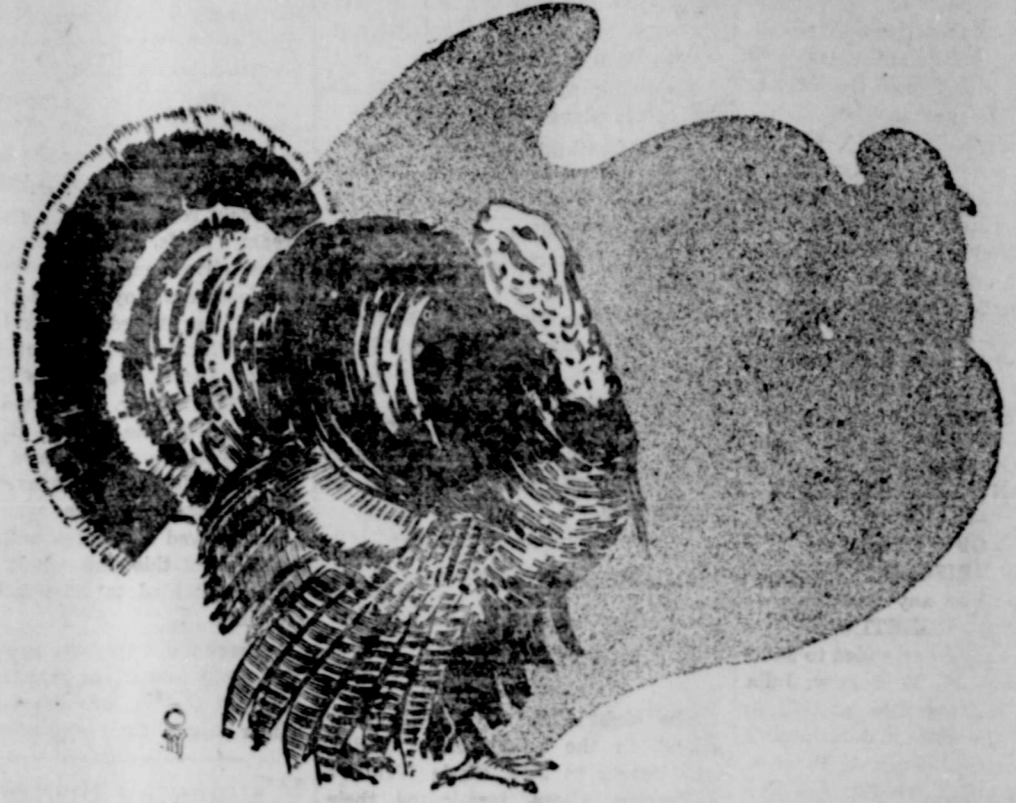
