Farm Night School Will Start Jan. 8th

Instruction Will Be Given to Adult Farmers Twice a Week in Livestock and Poultry Diseases.

A definite course of instruction for adult farmers of this territory will be made available next month in the form of a Farm Night School, beginning Jan. 8, according to W. M. Gourley, vocational teacher, who will have charge of the sessions. Diseases of livestock and poultry will be the only program studied. Two meetings each week will be held at the agricultural building of the high school, and every farmer interested in receiving valuable information on the prevention and remedies for diseases of livestock and poultry is invited to attend any or all of the discussions. The hours for meeting and the most convenient nights for the majority to be present will be decided upon by the school after its first session and organization is effected. The building will be well lighted and heated, making it comfortable regardless of the weather.

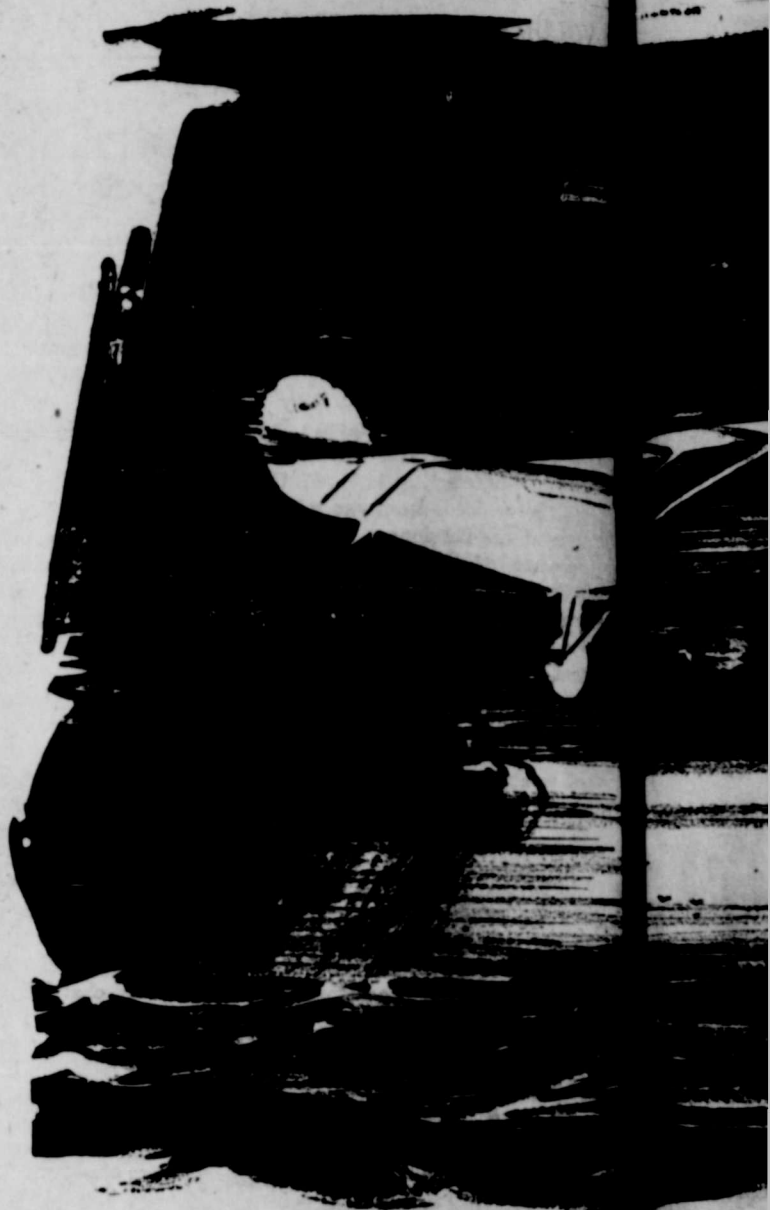
