District Court Meets Monday For Winter Term

GRAND JURY CONVENES MONDAY MORNING FOR INSTRUCTION FROM JUDGE KENNETH BAIN; PETIT JURY WILL ASSEMBLE TUESDAY.

The winter term of district court, judicial district No. 110, convenes in Silvertown next Monday, Jan. 6. Judge Kenneth Bain, State's Attorney Jack Folley, Court Reporter H. B. Sams, and District Clerk R. E. Douglas will be on hand for dispatch of business that has been put on the docket the past few months. A few cases were carried over from previous sessions.

Sixteen grand jurors, selected by the jury commissioners at the end of the fall term, will be impaneled and organized Monday by Judge Bain and will look into law violations.

A list of 36 petit jurors has been subpoenaed to appear Tuesday morning at ten o'clock for duty on jury cases that may be ready for trial.

Two Students Get Christmas Checks

Improved Grain Sorghum Seed Show Increase of From Seven to Ten Bushels An Acre.

Two of the students of vocational agriculture of the high school, R. D. Wheelock and J. C. Turner, received during the holidays a nice Christmas check for the grain sorghums shipped to the John Tarleton College, Stephenville, several weeks ago.

This material is being used by the agronomy department in the study of the type and breed characteristics of the crops of milo and kafir. The A. & M. College at College Station has also a supply of grain sorghums grown by students of vocational agriculture in this school district and trade territory.

Selection of these specimens from local students is taken as evidence of the college officials' confidence in the boys' having pure seed. Thousands of pounds of planting seed have been sold to local farmers during the past four years that were produced by these students in Briscoe county. Through the use of improved seed, the increase in yield over common grade seed has amounted approximately to from seven to ten bushels an acre.

Methodist Services In New Church Sun.

Sunday will be a happy day for local Methodism when its first public assembly will gather in the new brick church at ten o'clock in the morning for the Sunday-school lessons, followed by preaching services at eleven o'clock by the pastor, Rev. Marvin Brotherton.

Much Improvement In Silvertown During 1929

Many Homes and Business Houses Go Up; and Valuable Utilities Added in Industrial Field.

Silvertown is rounding out another year of large growth and fair prosperity; likewise all of Briscoe county, according to building figures and other indexes of progress.

There have been individual losses and individual gains, but as a whole the community has stepped forward in a marked degree. New residences have been constructed by the scores, and these are of the substantial type, a contrast to the preceding boom which brought out cheaper builds, inconvenient structures, and hastily erected quarters. A similar mark of civic uplift can be noted also in the rural sections where better homes have been built and improved shelter provided for the livestock, poultry, feed and machinery.

In the business section several new brick store buildings have been put up, and with all that only two vacancies exist.

However, one of the greatest endowments accrued during the year which is just passing out, lies in the industrial and utility field. The city officials broadened and expanded the water system, giving all plenty of water and providing a fine fire protection system. Not content with this, a modern sewer system was installed, municipally owned, solving the sanitary situation.

After months of hard work on the part of the mayor, the West Texas Gas company and the South Plains Pipe Line Company were induced to bring in natural gas, arriving just ahead of cold winter. Not only have the homes been made comfortable but a cheap fuel for any and all industrial uses await the enterprising investors who may see in Silvertown a good industrial location.

This brief summary of progress cannot be complete before the \$100,000 high school plant has been named. The school board has looked into the future in buying four blocks of land and building an educational house that may well deserve to become the cultural center of a big part of the county.

The progress within the souls of the community's men and women cannot be gauged, but there can be found the real forward movement, and not within building figures, land values, and market totals. A better spirit of cooperation can be detected, less of the living unto one's self, and a more solid integrity in the relation of one neighbor to another.

The local quintet proved to be able basket ringers and passers, and the advertised tight game was a poor prediction.

Marked Trend Noted To Beef Feeding

Results of Cecil Vaughn and Warner Grabbe Have Stimulated Home Finish for Beeves.

In compiling the data for the press from the financial report of the vocational students for the past year, the records of Warner Grabbe and Cecil Vaughn, who fed out baby beeves to a full finish, were unintentionally omitted.

Cecil Vaughn fed two Hereford calves that were shipped to Ft. Worth packers, making the remarkable record according to commission buyers, of losing only five pounds each in transit. This small shrinkage showed how well they were finished before being sold. They were classed as prime baby beeves and were the first every shipped from Briscoe county, and they topped the market the day they were marketed.

Warner Grabbe's three calves were marketed locally, and according to the dealers, Garvin & Stephens, they made an average dressing percentage of 77 1-2. No official record was made of this, but the weights were taken by the men who butchered the calves.

These five calves, all under one year of age, brought a total of \$469.05. These two boys were the only ones completing such projects. Warner is feeding out two more baby beeves this year that will, no doubt make a greater profit to him than those of the previous year. He will enter them in the general baby beef show to be held in Amarillo the first week in March.

The record that these two boys made in feeding native grain to cattle has probably stimulated the feeding-out of beeves by citizens of Briscoe county. There are at present more farmers in the county feeding cattle than ever before. Briscoe has as fine beef cattle in Texas, and the same can be said of its grain sorghum. When the two are utilized together, the result is a profitable enterprise, as indicated by the youthful projects.

E. Tibbett's Brother In Auto Accident

Judge Tibbetts received word Thursday that his brother, J. A. Tibbetts and his wife of Brownwood had been in a serious auto accident along the paved highway between Fort Worth and Wichita Falls. Mr. Tibbetts had a deep gash in his head which required seven stitches when he was taken to the Wichita hospital. The wife escaped injury except for slight bruises. J. A. Tibbetts will be remembered by all Silvertown for his impressive baccalaureate sermon given here last spring, as well as for his impressive personality.

Farmers Night School Is Ready To Open Wed.

INSTRUCTION ONLY ON DISEASES OF LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY IS MAPPED OUT; SHOULD AID MUCH IN REDUCING THE COUNTY'S HEAVY LOSSES.

The Farmers' Night School will be opened on Wednesday night, Jan. 8th at 7:30 P. M. at the Silvertown high school building. Every owner of livestock or poultry who has his money invested in these two farm enterprises, will find it to be to his interest financially to attend the meetings. There will be approximately 12 in number and at each meeting some specific problems concerning poultry and livestock diseases and parasites, will be dealt with.

Each year there is an estimated loss of \$15,000.00 to the livestock and poultry owners of this county, due to common farm animal diseases and parasites that are almost wholly uncontrollable. If the farmers really understood these troubles and knew how to prevent them, or knew how to be able to treat cases arising on their farms, this great annual loss would be greatly reduced.

Since this County has no farm agent, has no veterinarian, and has only limited individual service from the vocational agriculture teacher, it becomes necessary for the livestock and poultry owner to know how to handle such problems.

Since it is impractical and physically impossible for the agriculture instructor to give personal service to all who desire it in an individual manner, a school of instruction is provided.

The diseases and parasites that will be studied and discussed at each meeting will be only those that are doing the most damage here, and the ones which the farmers have had to combat right here in Briscoe county. Each lesson will deal with four important phases of the diseases brought up.

These four steps will be causes, symptoms, prevention, and treatment. It is very important that a farmer know what causes milk fever, for instance, it is important that he know the symptoms of a cow that is infected with this trouble. He should know how to prevent a recurrence of this disease. And he should know definitely all the things to be considered in treating a sick animal. Any farmer can learn this much by coming to these meetings. It is not intended to take up a lot of animal diseases but just the worst ones, and they will be discussed in a simple manner that can be well understood by any one.

The time of the meetings will be set by the school. It is expected that the hour of meeting will be 7:30 p. m. closing promptly at 8:45 by the electric bell. There won't be any long drawn out meetings. A round table discussion will always be in order and the conductor of the school, W. M. Gourley, says he hopes to do the least talking.

The farmers are urged to come together and pool all their information on the subject and perhaps they may be able to pick up some ideas from the school of agriculture that will be helpful.

This is a free school, no tuition. Just come and bring your neighbor, and spend 12 meeting night together that will probably mean financial benefits in the future when flocks of fine chickens develop diseases or that fine jersey gets sick and down. It is an old saying, that you never get too old to learn something new and beneficial. Here's your chance, a warm building, well lighted and comfortable seats. Be on hand the first night, and enroll for the school. A list of lessons will be announced at the opening meeting.

A special feature of the school will be two moving picture shows that will give valuable information on the subject of intestinal worms in hogs, and of certain poultry diseases.
