declared he would confine his attention to state matters; but then, being irked by some criticism from Republicans he went further and said he was "going after the Republican party.' The veteran said he had been accused of not being regular. Well, what is a

Senator Borah regular?" he asked: A regular is a man with no ideas, who waits for someone to tell him what to do. My idea of being regular is in doing what you believe to be right in the interests of the people you represent.

"Let this be understood-I'm telling all parties, Republican, Democratic, Union-I'm going to advocate the things I believe in whether they cross party lines or not.

#### Pessimism Prevails at Last League Session

**PESSIMISM** and discontent marked the final session of the League of Nations assembly, the leaders admitting that little had. been accomplished. Carlos Saavedra Lamas of Argentina, president

of the assembly, even asked if he might not raise the question whether "civilization is on the verge of a final breakup. The question of reforming the

league covenant provoked a bitter controversy on whether nonmember states should be consulted. Russia was understood to be anxious particularly to bar German influence and achieved a minor triumph since no definite action to solicit nonmember co-operation was taken. A com mittee of twenty-eight was named to study reform proposals.

The assembly approved reports of its economic and disarmament committees. The economic report carried a British proposal to create a comission to study accessibility of raw materials. The United States and other nonmembers would be invited to participate. The report of the disarmament committee approved the reconvening of the world disarmament conference at an early date.

PRIMARY TOPIC-Why Paul Was Not

Afraid. JUNIOR TOPIC—Courage in the Night. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC What Christian Love Is and Does. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC -Love, the Law of Life.

By way of Athens the apostle Paul and his co-workers came to Corinth, one of the great commercial and social centers of Greece. It was a city known for its magnificent architecture and its patronage of the fine arts, but even more widely known for its abandonment to vice and wickedness. Here Paul, the apostle of faith, demonstrated that his faith was rooted in love, and it was to the Christians who were dwelling in this infamous spot of corruption that he addressed his supremely pure and beautiful discourse on love.

The first portion of our lesson finds Paul at Corinth, and provides an introduction to the study of the love chapter from I Corinthians by showing from his experience that I. Love Is a Fact, Not a Theory (Acts 18:1-4).


The man whom we now recognize as perhaps the greatest preacher and teacher of Christian truth who ever followed the Lord Jesus Christ 'came to Corinth." That great and busy city in all probability knew nothing of his arrival and cared nothing for his message. No one met the distinguished messenger of God and received him into a home

of comfort and honor. But God had not forgotten him. For we read that Paul "found a certain Jew"-a convert to Christ, and his noble wife, and "abode with them." Persecution had sent Aquila to Corinth, and he was there for Paul to find.

And the humility of loving service expresses itself further in the fact that the one who was to bring Corinth the glorious message of the gospel did so at his own cost. He labored with his hands at the trade which he, as every Jewish boy, had been taught by his father. Christianity does not ask, "What will ye give me?" but "How much can I give?"

In his first letter to the church which grew up at Corinth we find the enexhaustibly rich chapter in which Paul so fittingly describes true Christian love. It is impossible in any short discussion of this passage to make a complete study of it, but we note





### John L. Lewis States Labor Peace Terms



#### Russia Angrily Warns Fascist Nations

HELP given the Spanish insurgents by Fascist countries so enraged soviet Russia that she gave notice that, unless it ceased she would free herself from any obligations to the agreement for neutrality. The representatives of the 27 nations on the international committee of non-intervention in the Spanish war were about to meet in London, and Moscow's challenge caused a real sensation. Moiseyvich Kagan, soviet delegate on the committee, specifically named Portugal. Italy and Germany as the offenders and called for an investigation. It believed that if Russia is not satisfied in this matter she will send airplanes and other war material to the Spanish government.

The committee refused to take any action on the Russian complaint, averring that the charges were not specific enough.

Spanish Fascists pushed their lines so closely around Madrid that they called on the government to surrender the capital immediately and thus save it from a destructive bombardment. An airplane fleet showered the city with circulars telling the citizens that further resistance was useless. One of the most threatening of General Franco's advances was directed at Aranjuez, whose capture would cut off Madrid's food supply from the Medmany weapons, and that a year iterranean.

4. Love is supreme (v. 13). Even over those other graces which with love will abide, namely, faith and hope, love stands supreme. It is the fundamental of all fundamentals. Without it all else is empty and futile. And let us remember, this is not pious theory; it is fact and to be translated into

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#### FARMERS' CHAMPION

O F ALL the leaders of third party movements, probably no one has caused the two major parties more concern than did Gen. James B. Weaver of Iowa. For he was the nominee of two new parties which, at two different periods in our history, capitalized on the unrest of the farm vote and in one case he definitely contributed to the overthrow of the party in pow-

Weaver was first the standardbearer for the Greenbackers, a party which came into existence in 1868 because of the dissatisfaction of the farmers with the financial policies of Grant's administration. They were inflationists who demanded that a large amount of paper money be issued without regard to specie payment. They received their name from the lact that legal-tender notes were printed in green and called greenbacks. In the campaign of 1876 they nominated Peter Cooper, the New York philanthropist, but he polled only 80,000 popular votes and did not receive a single electoral vote. In the congressional elections of 1878 the Greenbackers cast a mil-

lion votes and the Republicans in power looked apprehensively to the presidential campaign of 1880. especially when the Greenbackers nominated a man from the agricultural West. But their fears were groundless, for the Greenbackers could muster only a little more than 300,000 votes and, although Garfield won over Hancock by less than 10,000 popular votes, he got 214 electoral votes to his opponent's 155.

Twelve years later the Republicans had much more to worry over when Weaver bobbed up again, this time as the nominee of the Populist or People's party which declared for free silver, public ownership of monopolies, postal savings banks and an income tax. In the state and congressional elections of 1890 they carried the legislatures of Kansas and Nebraska. elected nine members of congress and forced 34 others, Democrats and Republicans, to pledge themselves to carry out Populist ideas. In the presidential campaign of 1892 Weaver polled more than 1,000,000 votes in the West and South and corralled 22 electoral votes. The Populists also carried several state legislatures and sent five senators to Washington.







He was Green Clay Smith, a native of Kentucky, a veteran of the Mexican and Civil wars, rising to the rank of brigadier-general in the Union army before resigning to take his seat in congress to which he had been elected while in the field. Re-elected to congress, he resigned to become the second territorial governor of Montana. After three years of service in the West he resigned to enter the ministry of the Baptist church in Washington. Soon afterwards he was chosen as the first presidential nominee of the modern Prohibition party.

Just as this "dry" Smith failed to win in 1876, so did a "wet" Smith fail to win half a century later. For Alfred E. Smith, the Democratic candidate in 1928, suffered the fate of all his predecessorsdefeat.

Famous Belgian Cathedral Malines has much to interest visilors but the Cathedral of St. Rombold is the outstanding attraction of the city. It was commenced in the early Twelfth century and took 200 years to complete, and is one of the finest Gothics in Belgium. It has a solitary western tower, 324 feet in height and out of proportion with the rest of the building. Its clock face is enormous-more than forty feet across and nearly twice as large as Big Ben on the houses of parliament in London.

has solved her own problem. Since I first knew her, some forty years ago, when we were both girls in school, Anna has been unequal to the demands of the moment, but perfectly sure that if she had a little help she would be a great success.

At fifteen Anna said that if she only had some rich friend who could send her to New York to study dramatics she could be an actress. She wasn't going to take any job in an office or shop; she didn't propose to find herself middle-aged some day, working for a drug firm at twenty-five dollars a month!

That was forty years ago. Ever since then I have watched her floundering more and more helplessly in the mesh of life that is never going to be unravelled for her now. Tangles that the Twenties don't solve have no way of miraculously smoothing out in the Fifties. Anna has never gotten so far as to get up in the mornings and get breakfast on time; she has never liked housework-she says it is servants' business. Anna's beds are never made; her husband died a broken and disappointed man after twenty years of discomfort and inefficiency. Anna's daughter and son are now following in her footsteps. The daughter, widowed, has come home with a baby daughter; the son, unhappily married, is also living at home again as a single man.

None of them has any money. None can get work. Refined and idle and eloquent, they are professional beggars. They have a large pretentious house well plastered with mortgages; a house that is falling into ruin for the want of paint and plaster. Everyone in town is sorry for them, and everyone gives them a wide berth.

she is completely unfit to fill it. NNA is a woman who never Sometimes that discovery takes weeks, sometimes months, but with Anna it always arrives, and she is sent back to idle at home among the dropping plastered walls, the broken plumbing, the dingy woodwork and rotting furniture again.

Never having solved the very first problems of her little girlhood she naturally isn't going to change now. Even today she has a profitable source of income close at hand. In this college town one-third of the plainer homes take in boarders during the term, and make good money from it. School boys and girls are not critical tenants. Simple, good, hot food and plenty of it, and a bedside light for study hours constitute their main needs. There are scores of women in this neighborhood who support themselves by keeping boarders. Some of these women have to pay for help, or take part of their board-money in help. Anna has two assistants in her family. The idle son might find a very profitable job in washing dishes for his mother, cranking the ice-cream freezer, raking the dooryard and painting the fences. The daughter might forget her abiding and bitter discontent if she put on a waitress' apron and cap and made herself useful for the first time in her twenty-five years.

Ten dollars a week apiece from ten boarders is money. Even spending ten dollars a day on food and laundry Anna couldn't but But she would have to work, save. and the fundamental difficulty with her, and with so many like her, is that they hate work. Anna has shuddered away from the very idea of it all her life.

Right in the same block are the Swensens; small busy blonde moth-er, crippled father, four children. The two oldest boys sell magazines, deliver newspapers, work on Saturvery elegant about it, and with sensibilities easily hurt, have "bor-yards; wherever their activities can find a few hours pay labor. They keep twenty per cent of what they make and are buying an old car. Mr. Swensen carves little wooden birds and brackets and oddities generally for one of the local cabinet makers. Mrs. Swensen cooks for a good part of the day on an old gas-stove with a loose piece of zinc reinforcing the oven. She sells soups, rolls, pies, cookies, macaroni, jams to private customers, and tow-headed Inga and Kurt deliver the cooked food in the coaster, after school. Mrs. Swensen, shy, fair, hardworking, foreign-born, has solved her problem. She tells no story of bad times and unemployment; she is not looking for a rich stranger to finance her idleness for the rest of her days. One knows that even in her small girlhood back in Sweden little Linda Ardersen did what her mother told her to do; small, vigorous, earnest, one sees her herding geese, plumping feather beds, sweeping a flagged old kitchen floor as if Davy Jones were after her! One knows that when George Swensen was brought home to her helpless and crushed, five years ago. she faced his tragedy, faced her own, puzzled and wept and prayed out the solution. And the moral of all this is that almost every woman has a problem, now, today, this minute. And that there is no use dreaming of larger problems, planning for more congenial duties, until these present ones are completely solved. Until your scheme runs like clockwork, despite any difficulties, under any handicaps, it is mere waste of time to think that you would be equal to the demand if the demand were changed. If you can be a success in middle-age, you are one. If any possible combination of circumstances can make you a failure. an idle discontented parasite, then no possible combination of circumstances could make you anything I say "in middle-age," because youth often has a time-may even have years-of doubt and despair, changing and failing. It is a part of youth to be defeated; it should be a part of youth to expect and defeat defeat. But when you hear from any woman over thirty-five a sad, philosophical tale of the bad fortune that has dogged her, the mischances that have baffled her, the cruel injustices that fortune has dealt her-look out!
