far off. Germany admits willingness to side with Japan in a fight against bolshevism. Practical Stalin, man of few words, tells Japan what he thinks of her pact with Germany by refusing to renew a treaty that permits Japan to fish in Russian waters off the coast of eastern Siberia.

That fishing privilege is vitally important to the feeding of Japan's surplus millions, increasing at the rate of one million new Japanese every year.

Langdon Post, New York's commissioner of housing, tells the American Federation of Labor that a great national shortage of houses exists, because there has been no building. New York City, especially, is in a bad way, according to Mr. Post; there the shortage in housing "may have tragic consequences."

That is good news for the building trades, and temporarily good news for landlords; they will not overbuild. As usual, politicians will seize the opportunity to raise taxes, and presently money lenders will be once more selling real estate under foreclosures.

Trade Leaders Ask That Work Relief Be Ended

THAT work relief as administered by the federal government be gradually discontinued is the recommendation of the board of

United States Chamber of Commerce. The board adopted a report of a committee headed by John W. O'Leary of Chicago which held that the work relief "proves in operation to fall far short of its purposes and to create new problems.'

J. W. O'Leary

"The committee," said the report, "does not propose sudden and instantaneous stoppage. Those gradual steps should be taken which are always essential when adjustments have to be made upon a

considerable scale. "There is at present danger that, ceasing to have work for unemployed persons as its function, this activity will undertake to replace some of the functions of private enterprise in advancing recovery. There can be no substitute for private enterprise in the development of improved economic conditions."

These five general conclusions from its study were set forth by the committee: Experience has demonstrated the

difficulty of attempting to obtain accurate figures on unemployment through census methods. Estimates of unemployment on national basis are necessarily inac-

curate and lend themselves to exag-Projects of work relief should not be allowed to take the place in any degree of established agencies for

performance of government func-Projects of work relief should not be permitted to compete in any degree with private enterprise for workers, skilled or unskilled, and should be so conducted as to en-

employment. It is evident that further advance in business activities will require the services in private enterprise of persons now on work relief at public expense.

Divided Court Upholds

Work Insurance Law

YORK'S state's unemployment insurance law was upheld by an equally divided United States Supreme court, Justice Harlan Fiske Stone being absent on account of illness and taking no part in consideration of the case. There was no formal opinion and no announcement of the lineup of the court.

In the opinion of legal experts the court's action has wide implications affecting not only state employment insurance and other social legislation, but also the administration's social security program.

C. I. O. Unions to Remain

BY A vote of 21,679 to 2,043 the convention of the American Federation of Labor approved the action of the executive council in suspending the ten union that are with John L. Lewis in his Committee for Industrial Organization movement. However the convention accepted the advice of President Green and voted to renew the council's offer to talk peace with the rebel unions and to give the council power to call a special federation convention and expel the rebels if

for La Follette Inquiry WHILE it was figuring what to do in the matter of the suspended C. I. O. unions, the American Federation of Labor in convention at Tampa dealt with a number of other topics. Among these was the adoption of a report of the committee on legislation demanding of congress additional appropriations for the special senatorial sub-committee investigating violations of civil liberties. This group, headed by La Follette of Wisconsin, has confined its investigations almost wholly to activities of employers in combating unions or in protecting their plants against mob violence during strikes. A large part of the testimony taken has concerned agencies which furnish professional strikebreakers or which sell arms and tear gas to industrial corpora-

The report said: "Millions of dollars will be available to defeat the La Follette investigation. If our reports are as accurate as we believe them to be, then the greatest and most adroit lobby that has ever operated in Washington is being organized to kill this astounding expose of the raising, financing and

directing of private armies." Officials of detective agencies that supply guards for industrial plants assert the real purpose of the La Follette investigation is to make con- tes.

ditions easier for John L. Lewis' committee on industrial organization to promote unionization of steel. coal, and textile workers according to the industrial union plan. They said Lewis delivered several million votes to Franklin D. Roosevelt last November 3 and is in a position to seek a pay off.

In Washington, John J. Abt, counsel for the La Follette subcommittee, announced the dispatch of questionnaires to 700 detective agencies in all parts of the country.

J. E. Davies Appointed Ambassador to Russia

JOSEPH E. DAVIES, wealthy lawyer of Washington, has served the Democratic party in various ways for many years and has contributed liberally

to its campaign funds, and now he has been rewarded. President Roosevelt has appointed him American ambassador to Soviet Russia, succeed William Bullitt, who was transferred to the Paris embassy. Mr. Davies, whose

wife is the former J. E. Davies Mrs. Marjorie Post Hutton, heiress of the big Post cereal fortune, is a native of Wisconsin and practiced law in that state until 1913, when he went to Washington. He was chairman of the federal trade commission under President Wilson in 1915-'16, and was taken along by Wilson as an economic adviser to the Versailles conference. Before that he had served as western manager of Wilson's campaign and as secretary of the Democratic national committee and he was offered in 1918 the ambassadorship to Russia, to Italy and the governorship of the Philippines. He declined, however, so he could run for the United States senate from Wisconsin. He was defeated. He was active during the recent campaign, serving on the advisory

ters in New York. President Roosevelt signed the Davies commission before he left on his South American cruise, but the announcement was withheld until word was received from the soviet government that Davies was persona grata at Moscow.

MUSSOLINI and Hitler threw Europe into spasms of alarm by suddenly calling into session the ministerial councils of Italy and causing them to rec-

Gen. Franco surgent chieftain, had been in Rome and probably informed Il Duce that the general whose attacks on Madrid were meeting with unexpected resistance. might lose the war unless he were given active support by the nations that sympathized with his cause. Mussolini and Hitler did not immediately announce that they would quit the international agreement for in-

tervention in Spain. Great Britain and Russia were stunned by the action of the two dictators and cabinet meetings were hurriedly called. The British are determined not to be drawn into the Communist-Fascist conflict but they believe that Italy and Germany, especially the former, have designs in the Mediterranean that would peril Britain's seaway to the Orient and are preparing to meet any such threat. Russia's reaction was awaited breathlessly, and the soviet government was being provoked still further by the fact that General Franco declared a blockade of the port of Barcelona, capital of the almost independent province of Catalonia. This move certainly was made to stop the landing of munitions and food from Russia destined for the Spanish loyalist forces. England, France and other nations were greatly concerned over the blockade, for the port is largely used by their shipping. The Spanish rebels have created a strongly fortified port at Palma on the island of Mallorca that can be used as a base for bombardment of Barcelona from the sea.

Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told the house of commons that British ships on the high seas would be protected against interference by either side in the Spanish war.

According to the loyalist government, submarines, "either Italian or German," attacked Spanish government warships at the entrance to the Cartagena harbor and torpedoed the cruiser Miguel de Cervan-

The apostle Paul was an example in many things, and not the least important of these is the manner in which he was constantly on the lookout for young men who by the call and blessing of God would take up the gospel ministry. He realized that there was much to be done and that if the Lord tarried he and his co-workers would pass on, and the work must needs be carried forward by younger men.

Not only did he seek out such young men but he "followed through," giving them encouragement, instruction, and opportunities for service. How shortsighted is the church that fails God at this point, or which, for the sake of local and present usefulness, hinders young men and women from obtaining the needed training for Christian service. The fields are white unto harvest but the laborers are still few. Let us pray them out and help them on their way.

Our lesson centers around the counsels of Paul to his young friend, Timothy. Written near the end of his life, the letters are filled with all the sweet earnestness of his great soul. They present four important truths which merit the careful attention of every Christian, and even more particularly of the Christian worker.

I. The Gain of Godliness (I Tim.

In a world which knows little but the urge to gain material riches we need to emphasize the fact that it is still true that a man is not profited if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul.

The great gain of godliness is that inner fellowship with God which brings true contentment of spirit.

II. The Snare of Riches (I Tim. 6:9-11).

The pages of human history are full of the names of those who have fallen into this trap of Satan. Sad to say, not a few of them have been Christian leaders.

Notice that it is not the money itself, or the amount of it that constitutes the danger. It is the desire or the "mind to be rich." and "the love of money" that "is a root of all evil." Hence Paul's admonition comes to each one of us to "flee these things and follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness." What a sermon in a dozen words!

III. The Fight of Faith (vv. 12-16) Christianity is not only an inward grace which reflects in "godliness with contentment" and in fleeing the snare of riches, but it is a daily fighting of the good fight of faith. It is imperative that there be "a good confession" (v. 12), coupled with a keeping of God's "commandment without spot, without reproach, until the appearing of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The servant of Christ, in view of the coming of the One who is "the King of Kings and Lord of Lords," is to live a consistent, clean, and irreproachable life.

IV. A Divine Deliverance (II Tim.

"All forsook me," says Paul. How tragic! How weak and undependable is the arm of flesh! "But the Lord stood by me." How glorious! How mighty and gracious is our God!

The follower of Christ may find himself without a human friend or supporter. Those who stood by in younger and more successful days may have disappeared. But let us remember that our trust is in God who has never failed any one of his children. "He abideth faithful, he cannot deny himself." (II Tim.





But there is another kind of poison, more dreadful in its effects. that thousands of women keep on tap and take regularly. It is the poison called jealousy. And jealousy and insanity are first cousins.

One woman I knew was not particularly fond of her husband until another woman wanted him. Then she writhed, whispered, foamed with all the symptoms of a disordered mind. She set traps for him. she tried to bribe his office nurse to spy on him, she bored every one she knew with hysterical outbursts of rage. When the other woman was mentioned she became actually sinister; she knew it for a fact that Marian cheated at cards, she knew it for a fact that Marian wasn't straight, she knew everything disagreeable that could be imagined about Marian. Some one happened to speak of Marian's child.

"Ha, she's defective, you know!" said the discarded wife, with a laugh. "The poor little thing'll never be normal!" The husband was mentioned. "I hear John's wearing corsets and having his face lifted,' the jealous wife screamed rather than said, with peals of laughter.

And this was a quiet, apparently pleasant woman, who never before had shown any signs of the volcano that was ready to burst forth at the first touch of jealousy.

In the old days, when home and church influences took care of children's morals, girls-and jealousy is rather a feminine characteristic. -girls grew up conscious that it was a pitfall, and determined to

"Look out, my girls," writes the father in "Little Women," from a Civil War camp, "I want each one of you to fight her bosom enemy." It's an old-fashioned phrase; our children wouldn't know what we were talking about if we reminded them to fight their bosom enemies; no one ever has told them that within each one of us lie the powers in the old light. that can destroy our very souls.

Sex jealousy is perhaps the most poignantly painful and destructive of all; it is the only sort of jealousy men ever seem to feel. It is the tragedy of its agonies that it destroys in those who give away to it all natural attractiveness.

It is curable. A jealous woman may emerge from this fiery trial all the stronger and finer for it, but very few mothers seriously analyze their children's characters in these days, and try to strengthen what is good in them, and weed out what is bad, so that many wives come to the test completely unfitted for what is a real spiritual crisis.

Ruth, for example, is thirty-three. She was married nine years ago and has two boys, both in school. She was always a trifle heavy, and she has settled now into something like stockiness; she was always somewhat unimaginative, and she is managing this affair with a complete lack of imagination.

Walter has fallen in love with the woman in his office, Jane Deane. Jane is twenty-eight, divorced, and extremely plain at first view. But hers is one of those faces that presently seem almost beautiful, in spite of a homely big mouth, prominent teeth, straight dark hair, sallow skin. Jane has magnificent gray black-lashed eyes, a lovely

voice, and a delightful disposition. Ruth discovered the affair six months ago; she immediately collapsed. She put up no fight. She lay for days weeping on her bed; her face grew dark with anger and swollen with tears; she would not come to meals. To her little boys she said between sobs that Daddy didn't love them any more; he was in love with Mrs. Deane; he was going away to leave them. Once an extremely pretty woman, Ruth lost all semblance of good looks; she stopped golf; she went nowhere; she put on seventeen

Whatever the woman does under the circumstances, she loses. This is one of the times when she can't win. If she holds him he is restless and resentful. If she lets him go her life is too often ruined by the bitterness, the disillusionment, the loneliness, the general disturbance of the whole current of her days. Our social scheme today permits the man to feel himself acting quite honorably when he leaves the woman of whom he is tired and goes to the new love; and his discarded wife is only setting herself against

the current when she protests. But all the same she doesn't have to let him go if she doesn't want to. Nine times out of ten the smarter thing, the thing that makes for happiness in the end, is NOT to let Ruth may know in her heart that Walter is making a fool of himself: that what he feels for Jane won't last; that Jane couldn't make him a good wife, or any man a good wife.

Ruth's course, if she wants to handle the whole thing intelligently, is to make home pleasanter than ever; to be always serene and patient; to bide her time. Her course is to make herself charming; not for Walter, for he won't see her at all for awhile, but on general principles. Her course is to keep herself busy, find work inside the house and out that interests her, that lifts her a little bit above the narrow circle of home. Ruth attracted Walter once against all comers; the most sacred hours of life are those associated with her; whether he marries Jane or doesn't the hour is going to come when he sees Ruth

And then in a few years the very ordinary spectacle of a husband pretending that his passion for Jane was just warm friendship, forgetting completely that he asked Ruth to set him free, restored to the home circle and to his wife's affections.

But the wife has to get rid of the last shred of jealousy before she can succeed in this sort of campaign. She has to see the other woman's viewpoint to realize that all of us, all our lives long, are getting humiliating jolts and shocks; to say to herself that what happens to so many other women may well happen to her. She has to abandon all hope of recriminations and reproaches until the heat of the affair has long died away, and treat it as she would a fever. Such a wife can be reasonably sure of a successful ending; and what else matters? And when the skies are clear again she will have to refrain from triumph; this defection in her husband is no more serious than her own defects as a wife; if he has failed her signally in one way, she has failed him in a score of others. She has kept his life dull when it might have been exciting; she has slumped into disorder and inefficiency when the other woman has been always fresh and attractive.

Not that it is always Ruth's fault; this trial comes to even the most efficient, capable and loving of wives. Propinquity or chance will drag a man's affections from their legitimate anchor as long as men are men, as long as the other woman is the other woman. The law that sends a fatal germ into one mouth and spares a thousand others, that takes away one woman's only child while leaving another woman a safe and happy nursery of half a dozen children, that gives one little sister curly hair and another a talent for the violin, that burns one house and leaves its fellow standing, operates in this matter, too. husband may be one of the men who simply isn't going to be faithful; that may be your slice of the trouble of life.

Don't try to dodge it when it comes. Face it as you would sickness, poverty, war, with spirit and courage. Remember in the matter of your husband's affection, no woman takes anything away from you. You lost it before she found it. Only honesty and sweetness and sheer fineness of character can get
