MISD proposed tax rate shows small increase

By Larry Thornton Managing Editor

The Muleshoe Independent School District's board of trustees set a proposed tax rate of \$1.39 for the 2010-11 school year during news about the I&S Monday's meeting.

The proposed rate, which reflects a one cent increase from the current year's rate, includes a maintenance and operation rate of \$1.04, and an interest and sinking fund rate of rate at 35 cents would be 35 cents.


'Cake ace' to visit Muleshoe next week







But as is the case with many birds they prefer to stay there and let the older ones bring feed to them.
