Word received this afternoon is to the effect that the game two weeks ago with Estelline has been forfeited by Silverton. After finding that Huber Tillery was ineligible, Silverton voluntarily forfeited the game. . . . This puts the local team on the bottom of the heap and tied with Flomot with a standing of .000.

Last the only conference game they have played, and were defeated by the Turkey Turks, 25-0. District 3-B, this year is made up of Turkey, Flomot, Estelline, Quitaque, and Silverton. Last week, the Quitaque boys pulled a dark one and defeated the Turkey Turks 6-0. They had the week before tied Estelline. The win over Turkey put them in the lead for conference honors with a standing of .750. With Flomot trailing the league, all other teams have a standing of .500.

### OWLS AERIAL ATTACK BEATS CALVES. 13-0

With passes as their chief offensive weapon and mixing in a potent running attack, the Silverton Owls outplayed and outscored the Canyon Calves in their second encounter of the season to win by a score of 13-0.

The first quarter was, for several minutes, uneventful, with neither team doing a great deal. However, three minutes before the end of the quarter the Owls started clicking when Johnnie Quillen crashed thru the line for 12 yards and a first down on the midfield stripe. Three plays later Bruce Burleson reeled off 38 yards on a quarterback sneak and placed the ball 12 yards from paydirt as the quarter ended. An incomplete pass and two line plays netted only a yard. With fourth down coming up and still 11 yards from the pay-off stripe, Hank Brown, who didn't start the game because of injuries, was sent in. He flipped a pass to Grady Martin in the end zone who made a spectacular catch for the first score. Perry's kick was true and the score stood 7-0.

The game rocked along uneventful thru the rest of the second, the third, and most of the fourth quarter when the Owls took the ball over on downs on the Canyon 41. A pass Jack Burleson to Bruce Burleson placed the ball on the 19, and two plays later the same combination, Jack to Bruce, clicked for a touchdown. Try for extra point failed and the game ended 13-0.

The Owls were clearly superior to the Calves in every department, and chalked up 9 first downs to Canyon's 4.

## AGGIE BRIEFS

### Seeding or Re-seeding Insured Wheat

We are receiving a few questions in the county office relative to the re-seeding of insured crops in case the first seeding failed. We would like to quote a part of the regulations which require that an adjustment be made and the total production charged at the time of loss in those cases in which the wheat was not re-seeded in areas and under circumstances where it is customary to re-seed. It is obvious therefore, if the first seeding has failed and conditions are such in the community which would make re-seeding practical and customary, that insured producers should reseed.

Due to the fact that it is still dry in some sections of the county we are being asked if there is a final date for seeding wheat. No final date has been set by the county committee, however, they are of the opinion that seeding should be completed in the month of November if good farming practices are to be followed.

### Cancellation of Application For Crop Insurance

We have received a few scattered requests for cancellation of applications for crop insurance. We understand that applications for insurance may not be cancelled except through the failure of the applicant to seed wheat on the farm covered by the application. It is obvious that insurance applications could not be cancelled at the option of the producer, since applications would often be cancelled as the crop outlook improves and would never be cancelled when the outlook is poor.

### Wheat Loans

With the advance in wheat prices many producers who have taken the 1939 wheat loan will probably want to call these loans if the price of wheat advances to where there is a profit to the farmers. Therefore, we would like to advise all producers to contact the lending agency who made the loan and find out where the warehouse receipts are now being held. Should the wheat prices advance sufficiently above the loan value to warrant the borrower to pay off his note before the note is due and the warehouse receipt upon investigation is found to be in New York or Kansas City, it can readily be seen that some delay will be experienced before warehouse receipts could be obtained to complete the liquidation of the loan and by the time the warehouse receipt is received, the market could change adversely to the producer and might mean a loss to him.

Any producer that is interested in liquidating a 1939 loan should contact the office for proper procedure.

We would like to call to the attention of all producers who are leaving sweet sorghums or sudan on the land as a soil building practice that should this be grazed off they would not be entitled to this practice. We are calling your attention to this because several producers are having this practice shown on their application for pay at this time. Of course it will be necessary that we have reporters to check this acreage at this time and again before the delivery of checks and should it be found grazed off the check would have to be returned for correction, thereby delaying the check to the producer.

#### Tulia Growing

According to the Tulia Herald, that city is growing. Among other constructions is the reconstruction of the Baptist Church. Building permits in Tulia for the past six months are nearly \$25,000.

#### Big Cotton Crop at Olton

The three gins at Olton last week reported that 5,214 bales of cotton had been ginned and that it is estimated that that is half the crop. The Olton Enterprise notes that already more cotton has been ginned than during the whole 1938 season.

#### Ducks Damaging Feed

Farmers near the Buffalo Lake in Randall county are seeking aid to do away with ducks and cranes which are so thick there that they are damaging feed crops. The Canyon News reports that there are probably 300,000 ducks on the lake.

#### Good Judges

Donley County, besides winning many prizes at the State Fair and the American Royal with the livestock the 4-H boys entered, is proud of their milk judging team which placed second in the United States. Both the Donley County Leader and the Clarendon News are staunch boosters of their county club work.

#### Prison Diet

A prisoner in the Hall County Jail complained of being very ill, and was placed in the Memphis Hospital, where it was thought that he might have appendicitis. During the night, he made a rope of sheets and escaped, says the Memphis Democrat. An investigation by Sheriff Anderson disclosed the fact that the prisoner had eaten soap and snuff in order to be sent to the hospital.

#### Baby Drowned

The two year old son of Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Huff of near Miami was drowned last week in a water trough at their farm. The baby had been gone from the house about fifteen or twenty minutes, according to the Miami Chief.

#### May Lose Underpass

Land owners along Highway 86 in Parmer County have ten days to refuse to accept the values set on their land by a jury of view. And according to the State Line Tribune, unless the right-of-way is secured by November 9, the State Highway Department will withdraw its offer to build a \$200,000 underpass west of Bovina.

### WHEN GOD SPEAKS

When God speaks attention is demanded. We often fail to hear God's voice because of our divided attention. We are giving one ear to the voice of God, and the other to the human voices around us. Jesus says: "When thou prayest, enter thy closet and shut the door." The closet is the "closed place", the place from which all noise is shut out, the place where one is shut in with God and He alone is heard to speak. By the first radios that were constructed several voices were heard speaking at once. Now one voice can be selected and all others tuned out, and not only all distracting voices, but all disturbing noises whatsoever. "The Babe in the Blazing House"

HELLO EVERYBODY: These adventures provide a cross-section of life, and if they didn't show its grimmer side occasionally, they wouldn't show a faithful picture.

Imagine running back into a blazing house to rescue your eight-months-old baby brother only to find the smoke so dense you couldn't see what you were doing.

That's what happened to Mary. The time was the fall of 1921, around September, and at that time Mary's father and mother and Mary's three brothers lived in Thayer, a small mining town in the lower part of West Virginia.

Thayer is a valley, situated between two large hills. To get out of the valley, Mary tells us, you had to ride on a sort of incline. It was a box-shaped affair, the car, let up and down the side of the hill by means of a cable.

On this fateful morning Mary's mother and dad had to go to town, where mother was going to have her teeth fixed. Before she left she called Mary, who was the eldest child, and warned her to watch the three younger children, her brothers, while her parents were away.

Of the three John was the oldest brother, then came six-year-old Pete, and last of all little Eddie, who could show only a scant eight months. Mary had her hands full keeping them all out of mischief, and when night began to fall she began to glance nervously out the window, wondering why mother and dad didn't come.

Children Were Locked Inside House.

To set the scene for this story it is necessary to explain that next to the house there had a little wash-house, where Mary's dad used to wash when he came home from work.

And so it came to pass that as the children sat huddled in the darkness, queer red shadows, ghostly and lengthening, began to dance on the walls of the children's room.

Remember, this was no grown-up. This was a nine-year-old child with the care and responsibility of three younger brothers on her shoulders.

This will explain, perhaps, how it happened that on looking around, they discovered that eight-months-old Eddie was missing.

Meanwhile, inside the burning house, little Eddie lay asleep in his crib. The thought of her beloved little brother in that blazing inferno was too much for Mary.

By this time, Mary says, the smoke was getting so thick that she could hardly see. Reaching the bedroom she found herself in the center of a dense, rolling fog, choking her, blinding her, so that she could not see her hand before her face.

Outside, safe under the open sky again, she thought of the bundle in her arms. In the smoke-suffused house, Mary says herself, "I did not know for sure whether I had him or not."

When you contemplate how easy it would be for a nearly hysterical child of Mary's age to mistake her precious burden in a fog of rolling smoke, you will understand how close is the line between happiness and tragedy.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

RIGHTEOUSNESS IN THE KINGDOM

Lesson for November 5

LESSON TEXT—Matthew 5:17-30, 38-45: 6:1-4

"Righteousness in the kingdom," the title of our lesson, properly relates its teaching to the kingdom of the Messiah which is to come on the earth, and to the condition which shall then prevail.

Certainly it is true that if all of the men and all of the nations of the earth were on this Armistice Sunday true followers of Christ and ready to carry out the teachings of this lesson, there would no longer be any possibility of war.

Our lesson should be studied and taught with great care lest we confuse morality with Christianity and make it appear that men are justified before God by their good works rather than by their faith in Christ.

The law of God is eternal, never to be abrogated, never set aside. Christ Himself, although we might properly say that He was in reality the Law-giver and thus had power and authority over the law, indicated His purpose in coming to be that of giving the law its full meaning, not of destroying it.

Recognizing Christ as the fulfillment of the law should prepare one to manifest obedience to every moral precept through His grace and by His strength.

Look at verses 21 to 37. The spirit of murder is anger (vv. 21, 22). A lustful look is adultery (vv. 27-30), and it is better to be blind than to be guilty of it.

He goes on to make plain that God alone is wise enough to take vengeance, that we ought never to retaliate with evil for evil.

Possibly it would be more appropriate for us to say that Christ here illustrates the right and the wrong way of fulfilling the law.

Why does it that the memory of some days in the past, unmarked by any striking event, always come to us like the breath of spring? It may be that on those days, in reward for some forgotten act, God drew us close to Him, and that we absorbed something of His eternal peace and happiness.

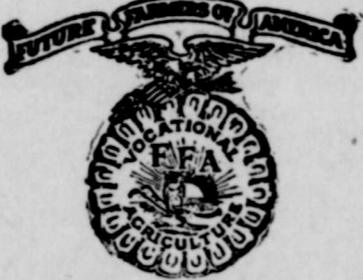

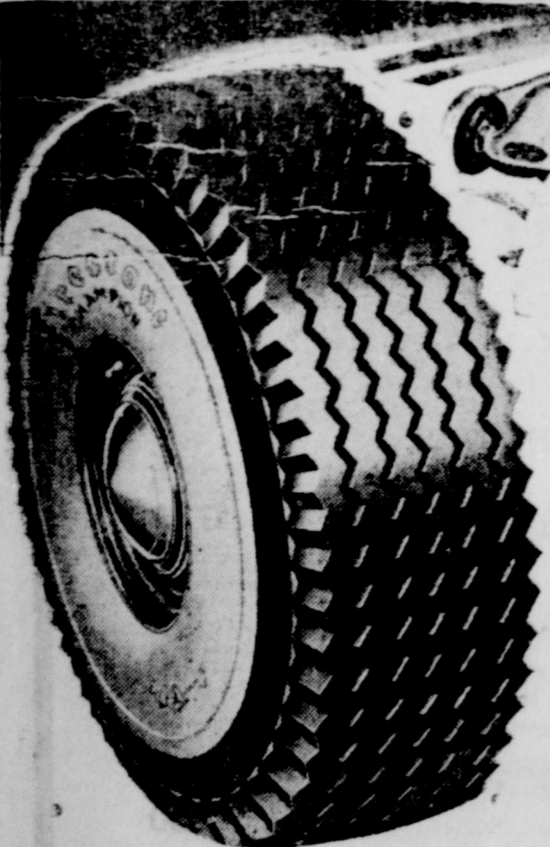

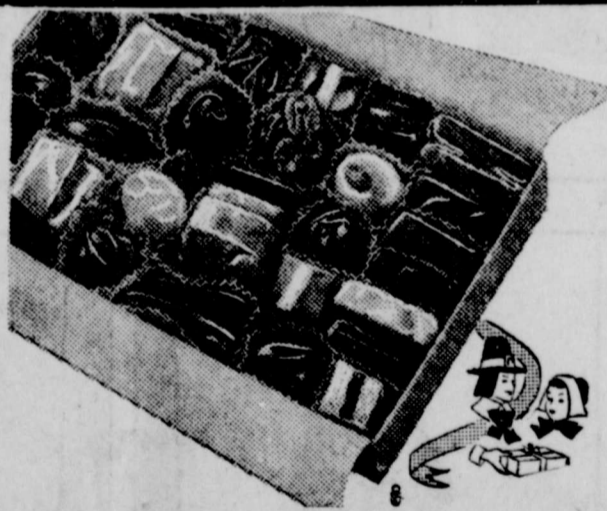

CHAPTER XXI

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'Algae' Worry Scientists Seeking Pure Water Supply

Supplying pure, good-tasting water to a modern city has its ups and downs. One of the biggest "downs" is the sudden appearance of a smell or taste suggesting moldy basements, cucumbers, pig pens or long-dead fishes. This means that algae is in the reservoir and instead of calling the police with a drag-net, the trouble shooters at the water works go hunting with a microscope.

Algae are the simplest and most ancient forms of plant life. They do not bother drinking water as long as they behave themselves. Usually they are taken care of by filtration and other purification. But, like any crowd, there is always a smart aleck or two. That is when the superintendent of the reservoir has his worries.

Nearly every city water system that draws its supply from surface reservoirs must be guarded constantly against sudden invasions of such algae and their relatives, writes Walter E. Burton in Nature Magazine. The chemist at the water works keeps a rogue's gallery of photomicrographs of the offenders. Once they are identified he

starts in to round them up—and out. One of the most offensive algae—Reservoir Enemy No. 1—is Synura Uvella. He is a two-tailed creature that likes to travel in gangs of 50 or so. Such a bunch, magnified 60 times, makes a spot about the size of a quarter. Three of these gangs in a gallon of water will make it taste pretty awful—some say like geraniums; others like dead fish. Synura loves the cold, so is especially offensive in winter.

Anabaena is good-looking algae—under the microscope—with cells arranged in graceful curlicues. However, it creates an odor and taste described as "grassy, moldy and vile." Asterionella adds the delightful touch of a pig-pen odor to the reservoir water, and it, too, is pretty, with its cells arranged like a star.

These and other public water enemies are one reason why you have a water bill to pay. Just as you need a police department to protect you, so you need the men at the water works, particularly the trained chemists, to keep the water pure and tasty.
