"Pleasant-polished-professional-dedicated-encerned---those are some of the adjectives that describe the August Support Staff of the Month Awardee," said Bill Moore, superintendent of MISD, during the board meeting Monday night.

The Texas Department of Agriculture released the following dates concerning the sale and use of Arsenic Acid: Oct. 31, 1993 is the last day any person can legally sell, offer for sale or deliver for sale stocks of Arsenic Acid.

Dec. 31, 1993 is the last day any person can legally use any existing stocks (product in a grower's possession) of Arsenic Acid.

Dec. 31, 1993 through March 31, 1994 ELF Atochem will buy back unopened containers of Arsenic Acid from retailers and growers.

On or before Feb. 1, 1994 VPG will notify retailers and growers of the procedures to follow for returning unopened containers of Arsenic Acid. They will purchase the product back for 45 days from the date the notice is given.

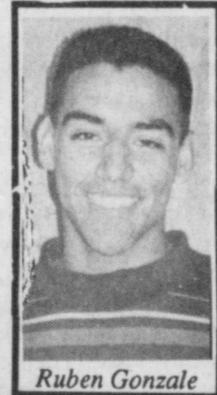

Back for the Mules will be Coach Randy Adair, 21 lettermen, and 8-11 starters. The Mules lost eight lettermen this year.

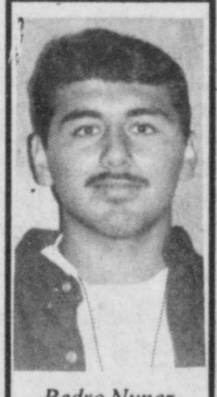

Guidelines for use of the MISD Local Pass Card are as follows:

B. Certain District 2-AAA or Regional UIL activities, even though they may be held in Muleshoe, are not covered by this pass. (e.g.-district 2AAA One Act Plays)

C. The MISD Local Pass is not acceptable for activities such as dinner theater productions, suppers, etc.

D. The MISD Local Pass covers only one admittance and is non-transferable.

E. The MISD Local Pass is not acceptable for department activities (such as speech/drama, home economics, etc.) used as fundraisers unless approved by the sponsorship.

### What Next

An active volcano only 600 miles from the South Pole is heating things up in Antarctica.

Don Blankenship, a geophysicist at the University of Texas at Austin, and Robin Bell, a colleague at New York's Columbia University, discovered the ice-bound mountain after a three-year search.

Using a small airplane equipped with special instruments, they flew back and forth for hundreds of hours over more than 36,000 square miles of ice. They say the buried volcano is a cone-shaped mountain about 2,000 feet high.

The volcano is active and erupts occasionally. Its warming has caused a depression in the ice about 150 feet deep and four miles wide.

Scientists already worried about global warming now have to consider the effect of the fires beneath the Antarctic ice sheet. Blankenship says it is likely that there are other volcanoes under the ice.

## News From Commissioner Rick Perry

Calling their commitment to New Braunfels a Texas-sized celebration of jobs, work and economic opportunity, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry joined business and government officials in honoring John P. Lewis, president of the Dallas-based Lewis Company, and the senior management group at Mission Valley Textiles Inc.

In a ceremony held here today, Perry said, "It's a celebration of jobs for the entire Lone State, and one that's going to be heard all the way from Landa Park to Lubbock and from the Mission Valley Textiles Mill to Mission, Texas."

The Lewis Company helped Mission Valley Textiles acquire the large Westpoint Pepperell mill in New Braunfels, saving 800 jobs for the city and Comal County. Estimates project that closing the mill would have represented a \$60 million loss to the local economy.

"The perseverance, dedication and commitment of the Lewis Company and the senior management group at Mission Valley have woven a strong partnership for progress," Perry said.

"And I'm proud that the Texas Department of Agriculture, through its 'Naturally TEXAS' program is part of this jobs team because New Braunfels and Mission Valley have a strong investment in the agricultural future of Texas."

Launched by Perry in March 1992, "Naturally TEXAS" has enhanced consumer awareness of items made from Texas natural fibers. The program has created a

network of manufacturers, processors, retailers and producers who have kept jobs and dollars in Texas working for Texans.

Mission Valley was the first Textile mill in Texas to join "Naturally TEXAS." "This was a giant step for Texas agriculture, and I'm proud that Mission Valley took that first step -- that first natural step," Perry said.

Currently, 104 businesses are

enrolled in the "Naturally TEXAS" program.

"And the folks at Mission Valley can certainly brag about another first," Perry said. "This was the first textile mill in the United States to be state certified as an organic cotton manufacturer."

Texas is a leader in environmental fashion, and the state currently produces more than 80 percent of the nation's organic cotton.

Doolittle was commanding general of the 8th Air Force in England which conducted the all-out assault on Germany from 1943 to 1945.

The 8th Air Force sustained far heavier casualties than any other. The losses of this single air force totaled about ten percent of all U.S. losses, army, navy, marines, and air, in the four years of World War II.

Chances of survival for U.S. bomber crews in 1943 were about one in three, for fighter pilots a bit better.

The British Imperial Museum has assembled the largest collection of American combat aircraft outside the U.S. The American air museum will be a glass-domed sphere housing them--at Duxford Air Base, near Cambridge.

# Roming Produce Winds Down Corn Processing Season

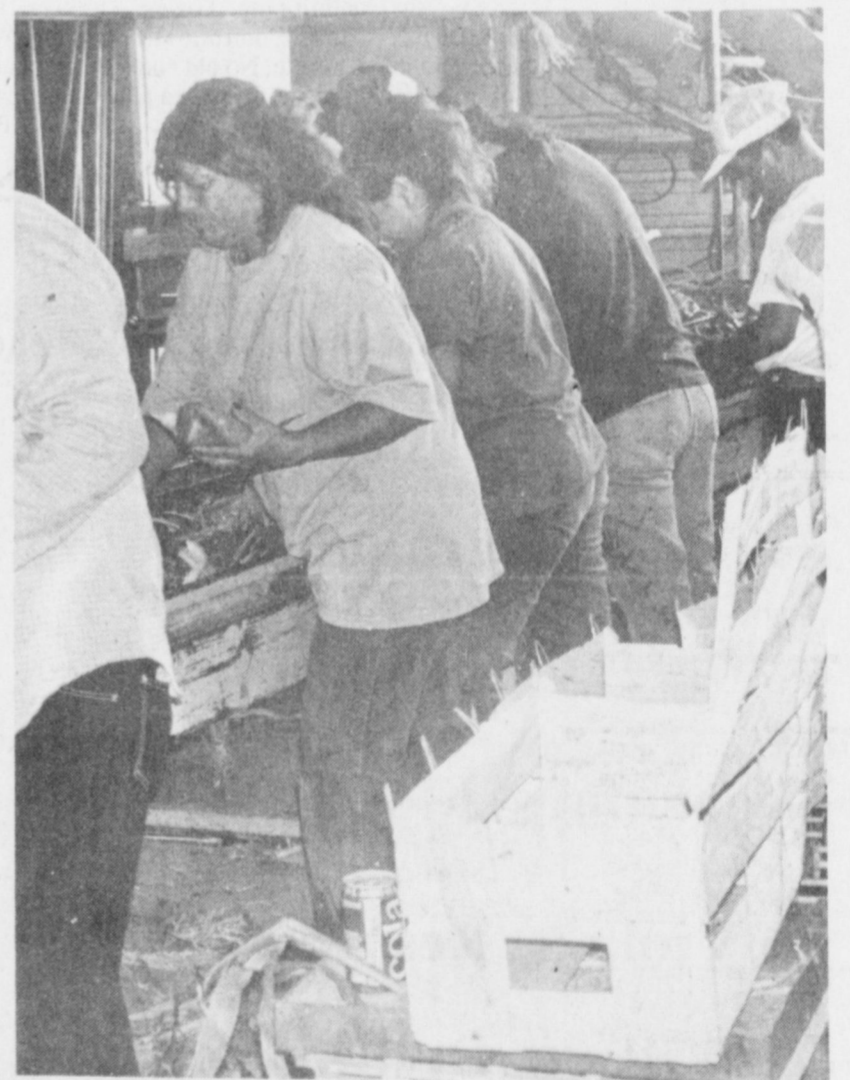
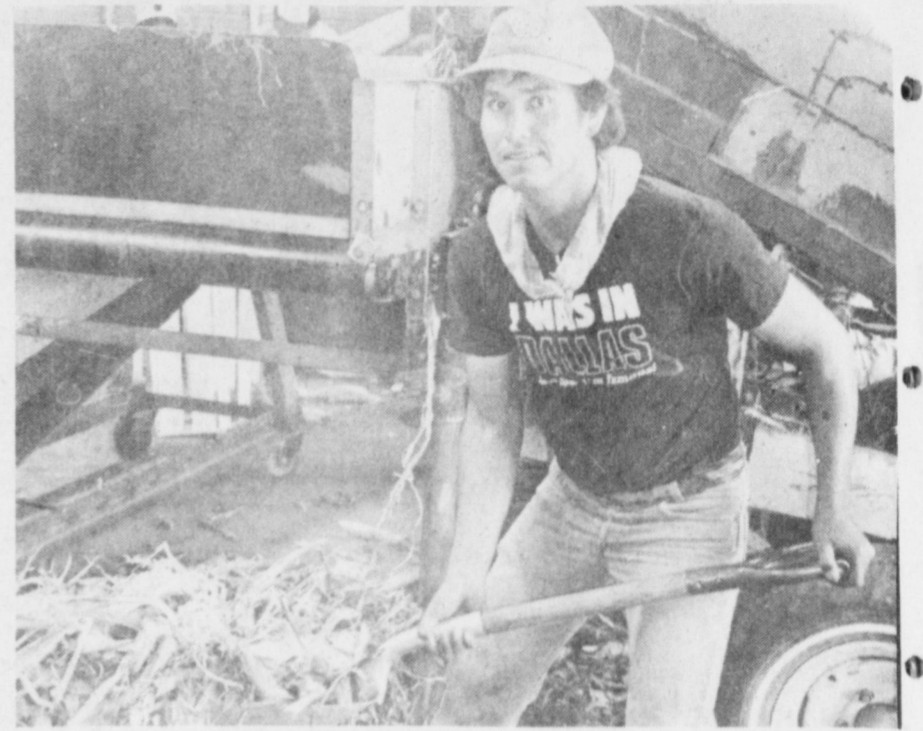


Ben Roming's Produce at Progress just finished another year of processing corn. Harvesting began a little earlier this year, mid-July and ran through August 19.

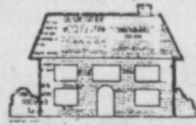

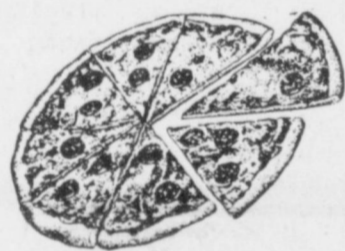

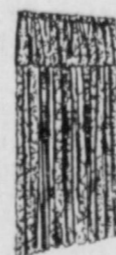
