Dec. 31, 1993 is the last day any person can legally use any existing stocks (product in a grower's possession) of Arsenic Acid.

Dec. 31, 1993 through March 31, 1994 ELF Atochem will buy back unopened containers of Arsenic Acid from retailers and growers.

On or before Feb. 1, 1994 VPG will notify retailers and growers of the procedures to follow for returning unopened containers of Arsenic Acid. They will purchase the product back for 45 days from the date the notice is given.





with the exception of the junior dairy cattle show, which is open to all 4H or FFA students.

Entries in the junior market swine and junior lamb shows are limited and early entry is encouraged, according to Steve L. Lewis, fair manager.

Open livestock shows, open to adults and students who are not 4H or FFA members, are scheduled throughout the weekdays of the fair. Junior shows are set for opening and closing Saturdays of the fair, except for the junior dairy cattle show, which is slated for Tuesday, Sept. 28.



What Next


An active volcano only 600 miles from the South Pole is heating things up in Antartica.

Don Blankenship, a geophysicist at the University of Texas at Austin, and Robin Bell, a colleague New York's Columbia University, discovered the icebound mountain after a three-year search.

Using a small airplane equipped with special instruments, they flew back and forth for hundreds of hours over more than 36,000 square miles of ice. They say the buried volcano is a cone-shaped mountain about 2,000 feet high.

The volcano is active and erupts occasionally. Its warming has caused a depression in the ice about 150 feet deep and four miles wide. Scientists already worried about

The Texas Rangers love their oats, too. Owner, George W. Bush, is very particular about his oatmeal. he likes to combine


