

Producers Get Seven-Pound Allowance

Texas cotton farmers will recieve a 7-pound per bale allowance for cotton wrapped in cotton patterns this year. The new program, under which cotton is substituted for the traditional jute wrapping the culmination of years of intensive action by state and federal agencies to get buyers and handlers of cotton to make allowance for the additiona clotton in a bale wrapped with the fabric.

Cotton patterns and ties on a 600 -pound ba's weigh about 14 bounds while the jute wrapper and ties weigh from 21 to 22 lbs. Fred Rennels, assistant administrative officer of the AAA in

The cotton bale covering not only gives a neat appearing and vell protected bale, but permits he packing of more lint per bale and gives producers and opportto use a fabric manufactured from their own product, he explained.

The 1942 program provides for roduction of 4.000,000 cotton paterns which will be sold by the ersmills to producers at a fixed price of \$1.10 and to wholesale distributors at \$1.00 per pattern. This is close to prevailing prices or jute patterns.

CHILDREN SHOULD HAVE PHYSICAL EXAMINATION

The State Health Department urges all parents to have their children underge a thorough physical examination before entering school next month.

The importance of such examinations can not be over-emphasized according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Officer, who declares that the health of the child has a direct bearing on his progress in school.

"It is advisable to have school children examined several days or even weeks before school begins," Dr. Cox asserted, "so that minor ailments can be corrected and any possible serious ones placed under treatment."

Dr. Cox also advised parents to take their children to a dentist for a through dental check-up and cautioned that an examination of the eyes be not neglected.

"In the old days it was considered only necessary to have school children provided with necessary books and some new fall clothing, Dr. Cox said, "but today we recognize that it is more important to be sure that his health has been properly safeguarded."
