# **OUR SECOND FRONT**

The Fortresses on the Home Front

He is too often taken for granted, and may not be fully appraciated by most of us until his institution dies through sheer exhauston. "It is too late to lock the barn door after the horse is stolen." This trite adage applies to every institution in the community.

We are to accomplish the maintainance of every institution through mutual and unselfish cooperation by all the members in the community.
