This year's cotton crop on the High Plains appears to be the best ever, excellent overall, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. With a large percentage of the crop already harvested, the yield is being estimated at 3.6 to 3.8 million bales in the 25-county area often called the nation's biggest

cotton patch. The High Plains has exceeded a 3-million bale harvest only three times, according to the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service. The previous record crop was 3.5 million bales in 1981; some 3.2 million bales were harvested in 1977 and 1988.

Fields in the northern part of the region, most of which are irrigated, are averaging 6.58 pounds of lint per acre. The estimated yield for those 620,000 acres is 850,000 bales. Growers in the southern area, much of which is dryland, are harvesting 2.48 million acres which are averaging yield of 503 pounds an acre, or some 2.6

million bales. Cotton specialists with the Extension Service say conditions throughout the 1993 growing season weren't what producers would have requested, but the results are more than satisfactory. Only some 180,000 of the 3.3

million acres planted to cottonabout five percent--were lost to drought or other causes. The area's long-term average loss between planting and harvest is 14 percent of the acreage.

Last year, more than half the 3.2 million acres of cotton planted on the South Plains was lost to bad weather, insects and disease. As a result, area producers harvested only 1.4 million bales.

"The quality of this year's crop is another cause for joy among producers," Kater Hake, cotton agronomist with the Texas

Business highlights included the election of regional vice presidents, the adoption of a resolution, and the adoption and reaffirmation of the association's legislative positions.





What do stale seedbeds and beet armyworms have in common? They can both affect American cotton farmers' production costs and

Stale seedbeds and beet armyworms share something else in common. They'll be discussed at the 47th annual Beltwide Cotton Conferences, set for Jan. 5-8 at the San Diego Marriott Hotel and Marina. Peach Freezer Jam

4 peaches, finely chopped (2 1/4 cups)

3 1/4 cups granulated sugar

1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg 1 (3 ozs.) pouch liquid fruit pectin

5 Tbsp. lemon juice

In large bowl, combine peaches, sugar, and nutmeg. Let stand 10 minutes until juices run, stir occasionally. In small bowl, combine pectin and lemon juice; add to peach mixture and stir 3 minutes. Ladle into clean half-pint jars or freezer storage bags. Label. Let stand at room temperature 24 hours. After about 5 hours, stir each jar gently to evenly distribute fruit. Store in freezer 1 year or in a refrigerator up to 3 weeks. Makes 5 half-pints.

Pear Mustard

1 pear, peach or nectarine, quartered 3 Tbsp. Dijon-style mustard

2 Tbsp. light sour cream

Combine fruit, mustard and sour cream in blender or food processor; blend until smooth. Refrigerate. Store in tightly sealed container in refrigerator for up to 1 week. Makes about 1 cup. Serving suggestions: Use as a spread with your favorite sandwich or burger. Serve as a condiment with roast beef or ham.

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Hectic Holiday Meals Can Cause Food Poisoning

Hectic holiday meal preparations can increase the chances for food poisoning especially among young children, said an expert at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center.

"Children are vulnerable because their intestinal tract and immune system are not fully developed," said Dr. Kathleen Motil, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "They may have less resistance to the bacteria that causes food-borne illnesses."

The severity of the illness varies from person to person. Symptoms include stomach cramps, nausea, diarrhea and vomiting and, in some cases, fever. Symptoms can appear anywhere from two to 36 hours after eating and last several days.

When children become ill, parents should make sure they are given plenty to drink to prevent dehydration.

"Oral rehydrating solutions, available in most pharmacies, are better for toddlers and pre-school age children because they contain appropriate concentrations of salts (electrolytes) that maintain their body fluids," she said.

Alert your physician if you suspect that your child may be suffering from food poisoning since a young child's condition can deteriorate quickly.

To safeguard holiday feasts, Dr. Corinne Montandon, CNRC nutritionist and assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor provides the following food safety tips:

* Buy quality foods. Check expiration dates carefully.

* Do not defrost turkey at room temperature. Bacteria can multiply to disease-causing levels before the turkey is completely thawed. Instead, place it in its original wrapper on a tray or in a pan, and let it gradually defrost in the refrigerator. Follow manufacturer's instructions if meat or poultry is to be thawed in the microwave.

* Be aware of the dangers of "cross contamination." Avoid transferring vacteria by washing hands, utensils and work surfaces with hot soapy water. Uncooked poultry or meat should not come into contact with other foods.

* Cook turkey until thermometer inserted into bird registers 180 F to 185 F. Juices should run clear.

* Consider cooking the stuffing separately. Flavor the cavity with onion, celery, and herbs. If you

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prefer to cook the dressing in the bird, mix dressing and stuff turkey loosely just before putting it in the oven. As soon as the turkey is cooked, remove the dressing.

* To prevent bacterial growth, keep hot foods above 140 F. and cold foods below 40 F.

* Foods containing dairy products, mayonnaise, or eggs should be refrigerated until served. That includes salads, pumpkin or creamtype pies, cakes with cream cheese or cooked icings and eggnog.

If children help out in the kitchen, discourage them from tasting cookie dough, or other goodies that contain raw eggs.

The risk of food poisoning does not end after food is cooked, so treat leftovers with care.

Never leave perishable food out on the table or counter for more than 2 hours. It is best to promptly refrigerate or freeze leftovers in small, shallow containers for quick cooling.

Use leftover turkey within three to four days or freeze for up to one month. Do not keep dressing and gravy for longer than two days and bring gravy to a boil before

Agricultural Extension Service said. "Fiber strength is running 28..5 to 29, staple is 33 to 34 and micronaire (fineness) is near or above 40. All three measures are in the upper levels of qualities desired by cotton mills.

"Weather conditions this season weren't all that good. Many fields were extremely dry early in the season and cold weather persisted into early May. However, these "problems" turned out to be more of a bonus than a hindrance in most fields.

"The low rainfall in 1993 kept seedling disease under control and allowed for excellent rooting of the crop to take place. The lack of precipitation also kept blowing sand to a minimum and saved many stands of cotton that would have otherwise been damaged.

So you're "thirty-something" and you've worked for 10 years or more. You've been paying into Social Security all that time. And now you're thinking about the years that lie ahead until you're "sixty-something" and can start receiving Social Security retirement benefits. The good news is that you may have already worked long enough to become eligible for benefits when you reach retirement. The bad news is you need to keep

In addition to working for the money you need for the necessities and luxuries in your life, you'll need to work to increase the amount of your Social Security retirement benefit. If you were able to retire at "thirty-something" after acquiring the maximum credits needed to qualify for Social Security (40 credits--equivalent to 10 years--of work) your benefit amount would be far below the amount you would receive after working 30 or more years at higher wages. In general, a Social Security benefit is based on your earnings adjusted for inflation and averaged over your highest 35 years.

But there's more to Social Security than just the monthly checks you'll receive when you retire. All through those years you are working and paying into Social Security, you and your family are protected by the disability and survivor's programs.

This means that if you become disabled and are unable to do any kind of work for which you are suited for at least 12 months, you could receive monthly Social Security disability checks. To get those checks, you must have worked and paid Social Security taxes for up to 5 years just prior to becoming disabled, and earned enough credits to be fully insured-no more than 40 credits.

The chances of becoming disabled are not as remote as you may think. Studies show that one out of four young workers will become disabled some time during his or her lifetime. If that happens to you, not only would you receive Social Security benefits, but your spouse and young children may qualify as well.

If you die before reaching retirement age, members of your family may be eligible for benefits on your Social Security record. They include a widow or widower age 60 or older or age 50 or older and disabled; a widow or widower any age who is caring for your child who is under age 16 or disabled; your unmarried children under age 18 or under age 19 who are still in high school; a child age 18 or older who is severely disabled; and your parents, if they are dependent on you for at least

half of their support.

No one likes to think that they will be disabled or die before enjoying a long life. But it should be comforting to know that if the unthinkable happens, you and your family will have a safety net.

Holiday Crime Prevention Tips

While the Holiday Season is traditionally a time of joy, it has a dark side too. The police departments in our state's four largest cities report that crime rates soar during this time of year-particularly the number of home burglaries and car break-ins. Enjoy the holidays, but exercise a little extra caution. Don't let someone else "have themselves a Merry Little Christmas" at your expense.

Safer Shopping Sprees

The overwhelming majority of assaults occur when the victim is alone, so plan to shop with a friend or in a group. Let someone know where you're going, the route you'll be taking to get there, and when you expect to return. In case your car breaks down, keep a few quarters and a list of important phone numbers handy. If another motorist stops to offer assistance, say that the police have been called and are expected momentarily, then offer them a quarter and ask that they call someone on your list to let them know your whereabouts.

When you arrive at your destination, park in a well lighted area. Lock your car and roll up the windows, even if you are only going to be gone for a few minutes. Don't leave packages visible in the car; lock them up safely in the trunk.

Once you're in the store, hold on tightly to your purse or wallet. Better yet, leave it at home and keep credit cards, your driver's license, and money in your pocket. Avoid carrying large amounts of cash; pay with a check or credit card whenever possible. Try to carry only those credit cards that you intend to use and make sure that you have all of your card numbers recorded and stored in a safe place at home. Teach your children to go immediately to a store clerk or security guard if you become separated while shopping, and caution them never to go into a narking lot alone.

Children, of course, are not the only ones who should avoid deserted parking areas. Don't be the last one to leave a store. Finish your shopping 30-45 minutes

before the store closes and have your keys in your hand when you return to the car. When taking your purchases from the car to your house, don't leave the car unlocked with packages inside--not even for a

Holiday Safety At Home

December is a peak month for home burglaries, so safeguard your home by taking some precautions. Don't display gifts where they can be seen from a window or doorway. Be diligent about locking your doors and windows every time you leave, even if it's only for a few minutes. When going out to holiday parties, turn on a few lights and a radio or television to make the house look occupied.

If you plan to travel during the holidays, take steps to protect your home while you're away:

·Get an automatic timer for your

•Turn down the ringer on your

 Arrange for a neighbor to accept packages while you're gone, or cancel all deliveries until you

·Store gifts out of sight, in a safe place, before you leave.

·Ask a neighbor to keep an eye on your home, pick up the mail and newspapers, and park your car in your driveway from time to time.

Finally, common sense crime prevention doesn't end when the Holiday Season is over. Start the New Year out right by marking your new gifts with your license number or some other form of identification. While I hope that you are never the victim of a robbery, should that unhappy event occur, your unique identification number will assist the police in recovering your possessions.

Other Folks Giving Is How Some Crooks Make A Living

With the holiday season rapidly approaching, you probably will receive more calls and be approached by more people wanting you to give to charity. There are many good charities, but there are also unscrupulous characters seeking to take advantage of your kindness and generosity. Many consumers do not stop to ask where their money is going to or to check the credentials of the people to whom they give. However, millions of dollars are taken by phony charities that do nothing more than put your money in their pockets. When their shady practices are exposed to the public, it makes it more difficult for legitimate charities to raise money for good

Two Recent Cases

In the Dallas area, two men dressed as Catholic priests claimed that they were affiliated with the Texas Orphanage Outreach Charity, and that they were collecting money to help orphans. They operated out of the Dallas airport for months before my office received complaints from several people suspicious of their motives. Investigators from the Office of the Attorney General (OAG) went to the "priests" to get information on how the money was being spent, and they refused to answer any questions. In fact, no money had been given to charity, and they two men were not priests.

In Houston, con artists posing as University of Houston students went door-to-door collecting money, claiming that it would be used to renovate housing for the homeless. The kids were neatly dressed, carrying clipboards and brochures. When someone asked them where the money was going, however, they did not respond. We investigated and found out that this same group ran a similar scam in North Carolina. Once again, no money went to charity, and these crooks simply moved from state to

Ask Questions!

Easy as it seems, you can get a good idea about a charity just by asking some basic questions. Who gets the money? How much of the money that they collect will actually be used for charity? Many crooks, like those described above, will refuse to answer, or will even

run when questioned. If they do respond, they should be specific. Ask for the name of their organization, as well as an address and a telephone number.

Call the number. If the charity is phony, you may never get an answer, or you may get someone's home. In that case, be suspicious! If you do get an answer, ask what percentage of donations is actually used to support charitable programs. Many reputable organizations will be able to provide annual reports. Small local charities may not be able to do that, but they may be able to give you references like the local police or a neighborhood church.

What If You Suspect Fraud?

If you suspect fraud, contact the Philanthropic Advisory Service of the Better Business Bureau at (703) 276-0100; the National Charities Information Bureau at (212) 929-6300; or the nearest OAG Consumer Protection Office. It may take a few minutes to make that call, but if the charity is legitimate, they will appreciate your efforts to ensure that your money reaches people who really need it. And if they are legitimate, they will still be there tomorrow. Your impulse to give is important, but don't give impulsively. Take the time to make your gift count!

Give Your Child A Legal Father This Year

Under Texas law, a child born to unmarried parents has no legal father until paternity is established. If you are not married to your child's mother, you have no legal relationship with the child. You have no right to visitation, and no right to participate in decision making about your child's future. Your child won't be legally entitled to your Social Security benefits and may not be able to inherit from your estate. Last, but certainly not least, you and your child deserve to know each other and to develop a warm and loving relationship-legally establishing paternity will help to ensure that happens.

If you choose to establish paternity, your first step is to sign a form called a Statement of

Paternity. These forms are available through the Office of the Attorney General's (OAG) Regional Child Support Offices. Based on this document, an order of paternity. can be entered and signed by a judge. Volunteering to work with my office to establish paternity will save you money. By avoiding a lawsuit, you escape court costs, attorney's fees, and the cost of paternity testing.






