MORE ABOUT CANNING

A second period for the issuance of home canning sugar which will run from July to December 1 of this year has been announced.

The purpose of this second period is to take care of late fruits available for canning. If you have already received sugar for home canning during the first period and can establish eligibility for additional sugar, application may be made to your War Price & Rationing Board for it, according to George H. Wilson, District Food Rationing Officer.

The rationing official stated that if you did not apply during the first period for the first allotment you may apply now and attach to your application spare stamp No. 37 for each member of your household for which you are applying. Failure to apply during the first period will not prohibit your receiving the maximum amount for home caning if you can establish eligibility for all of it.

Voting Instructions

Owing to the fact that there will be many new voters this year and that Texas has a special election ballot, the following information together with a copy of the ballot, will be a guide to follow for the July Primary Election.

The voter shall vote by RUNNING A LINE THROUGH the names of such candidates as he or she shall desiire to vote against and leaving the name of the candidate for whom he wishes to vote, and leaving only one name for each place. According to the Statutes of the State of Texas a check mark is no vote at all, but the voter must run a line through the name of the candidate he desires to vote AGAINST.
