Confidentially, I admire a guy who can take it, and if it has bothered him a bit taking a little drubbing in the election, you wouldn't know it.

FROM A SPEECH by Congressman Gibson of Georgia, I've found the things I have been wondering about in the Fair Employment Practices Committee. This is the committee which has as its object that "no one shall be discriminated against because of color or race." The committee consists of 106 paid employees—61 negroes and 45 whites. Each 12 months this committee costs \$317,160.00 or a million dollars every three years. This money is spent in salaries and taking Washington as an example, violating the very principles for which they stand. In that city there are 13 white employees and 35 negro employees, the whites drawing \$48,540 per annum and the negroes \$94,220. There are 4 regional directors in the entire United States, one negro at \$5,600 and one negro at \$4,600, and two whites at \$4,600 a year. Congressman Gibson goes on to say that it should be borne in mind that Congress had no part in establishing this committee. It was not consulted in any way, and it has appropriated no money for the operation of the outfit. The President created the Committee by executive order May 27, 1943, and the money is taken from the President's emergency fund. In other words it is completely free of the people in its operations. It owes nothing to the voters and the voters have nothing to say as to its high handed orders. It is probably the most useless and most communistic of any of the dozens of bureaus established by

the president. Oh, I don't know, maybe it isn't useless. What do you think?

IN SPITE OF all the ribbing I give T. R. Whiteside in this column, in my own mind he is one of the best citizens we have. And he has been here long enough that most of you will say the same thing. I was talking to him today and he asked me, "Say what are your plans for a post-war Silverton?" Of course I said I didn't know. Well Whiteside has been doing a little thinking between the sales of khaki pants and he said, "We might as well make up our minds here to make some plans. In the next year or so, we are going to have some 400 boys back home again—wanting jobs. And we won't have them. We need to do some thinking and some building. In the first place we need some building improvements. In the second, we ought to be getting our plans made for some feeder roads from the country—not roads leading to some larger town, but roads leading to Silverton, for the convenience of our biggest customers, the farmers. In the third place we need to have a place for these planes to land. Maybe a strip by the highway, or a field or something. There's going to be lots of private planes in the air after the war, and if we want them to land at Silverton, we've got to have a place for it."

WHICH IS A long speech for T. R. But he's right. He's looking to the future and it's going to be a great future, if we are prepared for it. Silverton has been at a standstill for the past ten years. If we don't do something about it, it isn't going to be at a standstill, it's going backwards.

RIGHT HERE might be a good place to remind you that we do not have a bank. Right now we have a little extra money maybe. Let's get some of these things started—at least in the planning stage.

ANOTHER THING THAT I'd give my right ear for Silverton to have is a swimming pool. Those things can be worked out on a self sustaining basis. I lived for a short time in a town no larger than Silverton. They had a nice swimming pool and every kid in town from five years up was a good swimmer. It was a municipal undertaking. A guard was on hand all the time, suits were for rent, and I think a summer's season ticket cost \$4.00.

LET'S START talking and planning—then let's start doing.
