Capt. Joe Haynes, son of John T. Haynes, has been declared missing in action, according to a telegram received Wednesday by his uncle, Orlin Stark of Quitaque. The telegram, which was from the Adjutant General, read: "The Secretary of War desires me to express his deep regret that your nephew, Capt. Joseph E. Haynes, has been reported missing in flight since August eleventh, in the Asiatic area. If further details or other information are received, you will be promptly notified."

Joe is very well known here and graduated from high school here in 1934. He attended the University of Oklahoma where he received his degree as a Petroleum Engineer.

He was a member of a combat mapping squadron, and at least until a short time ago, was not on flying duty. The telegram states that he was "missing in flight" so it is presumed that he was serving as an aerial photographer. That is one of the most dangerous branches of the service, as photo planes are unarmed, yet are flying constantly over enemy territory.

Captain Haynes has two brothers, Jack, a first lieutenant in the Marines, who has 18 months combat fighting against the Japs; and Jim, who is an immigration officer on the Mexican border. His father is a civilian construction worker attached to the Navy. He is stationed at Pearl Harbor. It is said that in the Asiatic Area, there is a fifty-fifty chance of the missing flyers being found. Joe has the hopes and prayers of everyone who knows him.

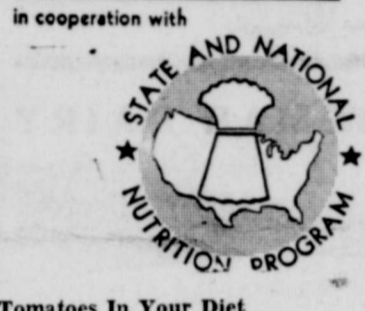

**Tomatoes In Your Diet**

Tomatoes, oranges lemons limes and grapefruit have one thing in common. They are all important sources of vitamin C. Although the citrus fruits have higher percentages of vitamin C, from a practical point of view tomatoes or tomato juice may be used interchangeably with citrus fruits if larger quantities of tomatoes are used. This vitamin is one of the important factors our foods must supply daily, because it cannot be stored. Scurvy which existed at the time of the Crusades and at the time of the discovery of America, was caused by the lack of the constant supply of foods containing vitamin C. Chief reason all members of the family need a food rich in this vitamin is because it ties many tissues together such as muscles, blood vessels, teeth, and bones. If the body is deficient in vitamin C, teeth and bones lose calcium and become fragile, blood vessels rupture under slight pressure and muscles bruise easily. Vitamin C also helps to raise general body resistance. It is a well known fact that many vegetables have a good deal of vitamin C, but there are few that hold on to it as well as do tomatoes and tomato juice, because they retain their vitamin C content well in cooking and canning. The acid in a tomato protects it against any considerable loss in cooking unless soda is used in the process. There is little loss of vitamins in canning tomatoes or the juice if the process follows directions given by specialists of the Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics, that is to process in a water bath and not under pressure.

For more detailed use of tomatoes you might take a peek inside the cover of two bulletins just out. They are "Home Canning of Fruits and Vegetables" and "Family Food Plans for Good Nutrition". Both are issued by the Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics, United States Department of Agriculture and are available on request to the Office of Information U. S. D. A., Washington 25 D. C.

## Briscoe County Veterans' Building Fund Silvertown, Texas

Dear Friend:

This letter is being written you in the interest of over FOUR HUNDRED Briscoe County men, who are serving our country in every theatre of war. In short it is in the interest of raising an adequate fund to build a Veteran's Memorial Building after their return from the war.

We want your personal help in raising this money. It is our idea to contact every citizen and ask their financial aid. From the contacts we have already made, practically every person is anxious to do their part in raising the building fund. As this is written, August 30, there has been about \$2,000 raised. That has been done with very little personal solicitation.

The idea in mind is for a building fund of perhaps \$15,000 that will be raised NOW and turned over to the men in service after their return. They will build their own place, just as they want it, and it will be for every veteran, of every war, regardless of his affiliation with any local or national organization.

It should be borne in mind, should you accept this responsibility, that the donations will have to be rather large, compared to other donations asked for in the past. It has been pointed out that 100 men giving \$100 each, will raise \$10,000.00.

Perhaps this doesn't sound important to you, but we think that it does. The most we can do to help these men adjust themselves to civilian life, and to induce them to remain in our county, is far too little.

**THE TEXANS SHARE IN THE WAR**

A Texas sergeant serving in France wrote the following report of the fighting there:

"The Texas army is advancing steadily on Paris and will be in Berlin before long." As an afterthought, he added: "We are taking along with us some units from other states, to show them how." It isn't exactly like that, perhaps, but there are so many Texans in the battle for France that at times it must seem that the Lone Star army really is there in force. Sgt. Bob Jackson of San Marcos, fighting in Italy, used an old Texas trick to wipe out a group of embattled Nazis. When he found himself unable to use his grenade thrower because a chicken wire fence was between him and the Nazis, he jumped into an old building, captured a German sniper, and used him as a shield while advancing on an enemy strong point. Then with grenades and rifle fire, he drove out the Nazis, capturing six more.

Enemy planes aren't as numerous over France these days as they once were, but Capt. Burt Marshall of Greenville managed to find one recently. He quickly shot it down. Other Texas airmen who have been cited or decorated for air victories include Lt. M. M. Tomme, Navy pilot from Troup; Lt. (j. g.) Roy Bechtol of Lubbock

a former Silverton boy and Ensign Jack Hogue of Graham each of whom was credited with shooting down one or more Japs. Ensign Hogue failed to return after the fight, and Bechtol has since been killed in action.

On the home front, Texans are also helping win the war. Few men are doing more than the volunteer division, region and county leaders chosen to spearhead the coming campaign for the National War Fund. Under direction of Wayland D. Towner, general manager of the United War Chest of Texas, they will help put the nation's biggest state-wide drive over the top, and are now working at top speed recruiting workers and perfecting local campaign organizations.

The National War Fund finances USO, War Prisoners Aid and 17 other agencies serving our own fighting men and our allies.

Lucky is Pte. Jose Lopez, a

tough Brownsville scrapper. Fighting in Normandy, the Texan was hit squarely in the body by a bullet. The impact spun him around, but Lopez recovered his balance and with one bullet killed the German who had fired the shot. Then he discovered why he was not wounded—the Nazi bullet had hit an ammunition clip at his belt, and lodged there.

**SMITH URGES HARVEST OF SEEDS**

The increased demand for forage and grazing crops, and unfavorable weather in some areas have decreased the legume and grass seed harvest the past two years. Unless everything possible is done to increase the harvest of these seeds in 1944 the available supply will fall far short of the requirements. Unless more seed is harvested, we cannot hope to supply our own needs and if at all possible we should share some seeds with farmers of countries now being liberated, to assist in their rehabilitation.

In recognizing this critical situation, congress has provided \$12,500,000 in additional funds as a part of the "Conservation and Use" appropriation for harvesting grass and legume seed. It is estimated that approximately 60 percent of these funds will be used to make payments for harvesting and additional acreage of grass and legume seeds, such as Sudan, Ryegrass, Rescue, Buffalo, Bluestem, Side-oats, Grama, Blue Grama, and Grama grass mixtures, Alfalfa and several varieties of Clover. The balance of the funds will be used to make poundage payments for the harvest of alsike, red clover and alfalfa seed.

The acreage payment for harvesting sudan grass is \$3.50 per acre for sudan producing 300 lbs.

per acre testing 90 percent purity and the payment for harvesting alfalfa is \$3.50 per acre where as 90 percent purity is harvested much as 150 pounds of seed test per acre, plus 1 1/2 cents per pound of clean seed.

The above payments are not limited by the production practice allowance established for the farm. Provisions have been made for Warehouse Storage (depending on the availability of storage space.) Loans on all of the above varieties of seed and for Farm Storage Loans on Sudan grass seed.

The Warehouse Storage Loan rates for common Sudan grass seed range from \$6.00 per 100 pounds of seed testing 98 percent pure and 85 percent to 100 percent germination, down to \$4.38 per hundred for seed testing 94 percent pure and 70 percent to 75 percent germination with a deduction of not to exceed 90 cents per 100 pounds for cleaning and sacking.

The Farm Storage loan rates for Sudan grass seed range from \$5.00 per 100 pounds of seed testing 85 to 100 percent germination down to \$4.25 per 100 pounds of seed testing 70 to 75 percent germination. Seed testing lower than 70 percent germination and (or) seed containing more than 45 seeds per pound of White Top, Canada Thistle, Dodder, Quackgrass, Johnson Grass, Bindweed, Russian, Knape-weed, Perennial Sow Thistle or Leafy Spurge, will not be eligible for a loan.

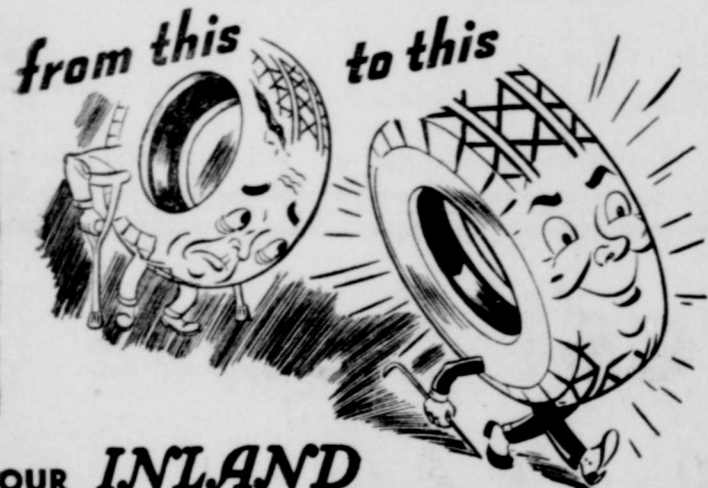
