With some communities yet to be heard from, Briscoe County has for the fourth straight year broken the previous years record in contributing to the National Foundation for the Prevention and Cure of Infantile Paralysis. This year is by far the greatest, with a total already on hand of \$1,751.03, which compares with a gross of \$1,008 last year. The amount looms still larger for the fund when one considers that there is no expense at all. In fact the drive has already doubled last year's net receipts.

Holt and Gasoline are yet to be heard from, while some workers in other communities have promised more. Special mention should go to the Presbyterian Sunday School for their extra contribution of \$17.62, and to the Silverton School where the children contributed \$107.23.

Last year Briscoe County was second in the state for per capita contributions to the fund and it will not be at all surprising if the county ranks first for the state in the 1945 drive.

This year the drive has been conducted on the personal contribution plan and more people have taken part in it than ever before. Special credit should go to the community chairmen for their time and trouble in contacting the people of their district. Most of the credit for the success belongs to each individual contributor.

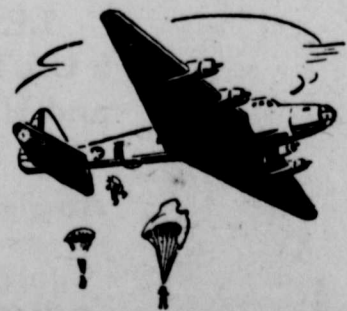
Silverton Faculty Entertains

"Don't hold back, boys," he'd say, "No one's going to see this but you and me."

Of course, each party would get so wrapped up in presenting the other man's story that he'd begin to really see that fellow's side of the argument. Then Mr. Lincoln would take the two pieces of paper look at them, tear them up and say: "Now that you two boys are off dead center, maybe we can talk." And they'd reach a compromise. And the compromise would work.

Abe Lincoln was a good lawyer and he knew the only way to really settle a case was out of court. Compromise. Conciliation. What we like to think of as sort of an American way of settling things. A way that always respects the other fellow's point of view.

That's about all there is to the story but it's a pity more people today don't know about Mr. Lincoln's method and practise it and save a lot of wasted energy we can all better put to winning the war. If viewpoints are irreconcilable then all the fighting our boys are doing overseas is for nothing.

Take just a little thing, like complaining about a cold cup of coffee in a restaurant. Stop and figure the waitress's side of it. Eight tables to care for and dead on her feet. Give her a smile and tell her she's doing a good job—and can she, please, bring you a hotter cup. Thanks.

Abe Lincoln's method was a simple one after all. To think of human beings not as bosses or peddlers or cops or cooks or friends-or-enemies but just as people. People who are okay. Folks Just Folks.

That's why, eighty years later, folks the world over still remember Abraham Lincoln.
