Your new car tag must be installed by April 1st to comply with the Texas law.

The tag is a single tag this year but the rules and regulations for obtaining it are the same as last year.

If you car was registered in Briscoe County, we have all the information we need to re-register you car or truck.

However, if your car was registered elsewhere, you must bring your certificate of title.




