EDWIN NORRIS writes to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Mart Norris: Dearest Folks, Just a line this evening to say hello. And also to thank you all for the luck you wished me. I know somebody did for I made out okay with the Carbine today. I fired 55 rounds for record. That is 55 shots, if you don't know how much a round is. One round is one shot. The first five rounds were sitting at 200 yards, the next was kneeling 200 yards, and offhand 5 rounds at 200 yards. Those were the hardest.

They were slow fire, that is, you take the piece out of your shoulder and reload for each round. That is the hardest for everybody. I lost nearly all of the points that I lost in those positions. Next we fired 10 rounds rapid fire. Rapid fire is firing just as fast as you can and hit the bulley. On the carbine, you have 65 seconds to get in position and fire your shots. As I was saying, we fired ten rounds rapid fire sitting. Those are my best positions and I only dropped three points on each of them. We then moved up to the 100 yard line and fired 10 rounds in kneeling and offhand position, 55 rounds, altogether.

Each bullseye counts five points, the next ring 4 and 3-2. 275 is the most possible 250 expert, 235 sharpshooter, and 215 marksman, below that is not qualifying. My score was 243. Almost made expert, but was tickled to make sharpshooter. We got firing pins for our M1's today and start firing them tomorrow. We'll be glad when we get off the firing line, just two weeks from tomorrow night. It sure hurts your ears. My carbine coach said it was a worse noise than Iwo Jima. He was a swell guy. I hope the one I get on the M1 range tomorrow is half as good. We fire it from 300, 400, and 500 yards. I will need some good coaching.

Well, I must change the linen on my bed, clean my rifle, and I do mean clean it. I don't think it was quite clean enough to suit the Captain at inspection this morning. He looked me in the eye and asked me "Where the heck are you from, Texas?" I looked him straight back and said, "Yes sir!" The gang all thought I was really going to catch it and so did I. He then looked sort of funny and asked if I had ever been to Borger, Amarillo, or Pampa. I told him I knew Amarillo like a book. He grinned and said I was the first one he had ever asked in that tone of voice that had answered him in a way that made a person think that you were proud to be a Texan. He said he liked it because he knew Amarillo too and hadn't lived there but 25 years. He then decided he was getting too friendly with a yardbird and his eyes spit

fire. He said, but xxxx you better get the stain off that butt plate." Boy oh boy, the DI was sure one more surprised fellow. He is from New York and really rides a Texan. He didn't know till then that I was one and doesn't say anything now because the Bn. Com. is one. Well, so much for that. I had better stop and run for chow.

I am back from chow and my rifle is shining like a bottle of gold beer on a gay summer eve, so I guess it is safe for me to continue my correspondence.

Say mom, why don't you send me some cookies? And another thing, get some little cookies like vanilla wafers about seventy-five

of them because we have to give everybody something when we get a package and I want some myself. Such as that is scarce here. Do not send any candy, that is unless it can be placed in some cookies or something where its not so visible. Ha!

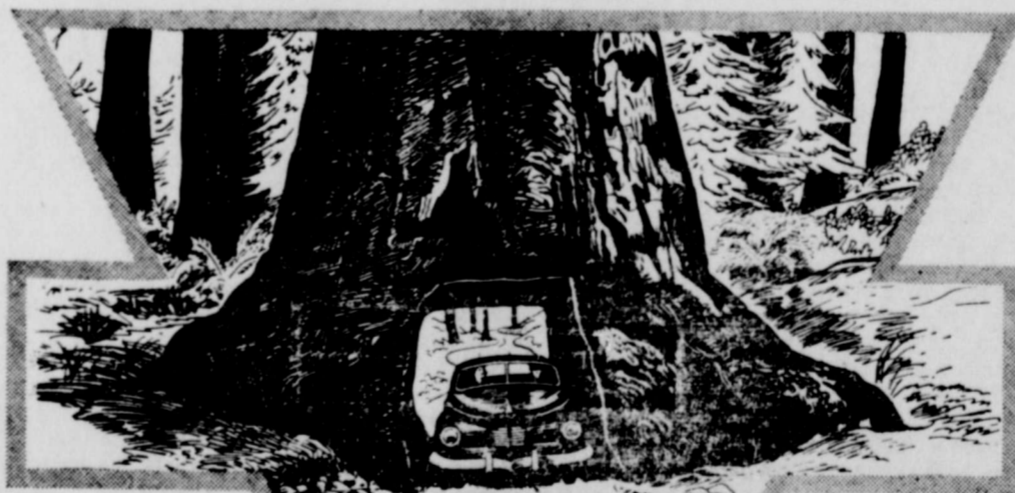

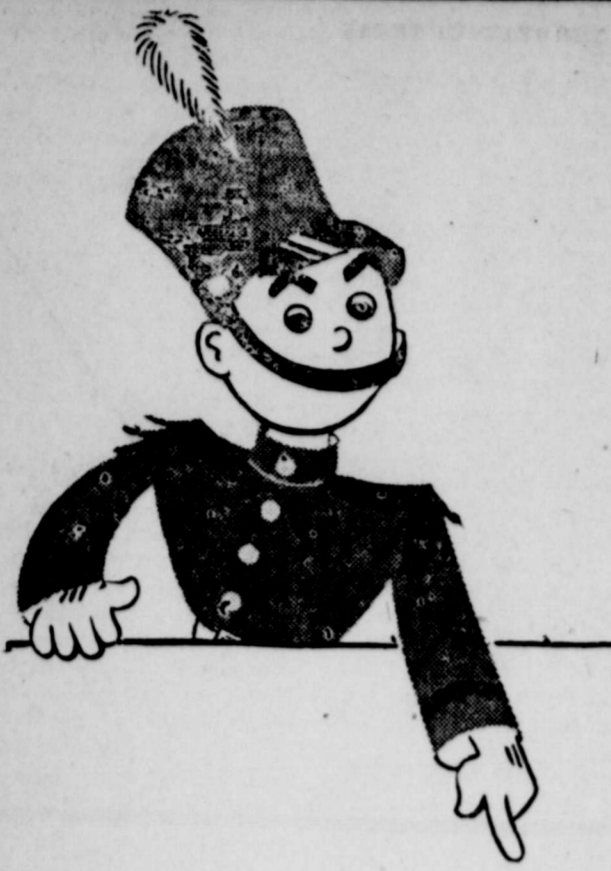

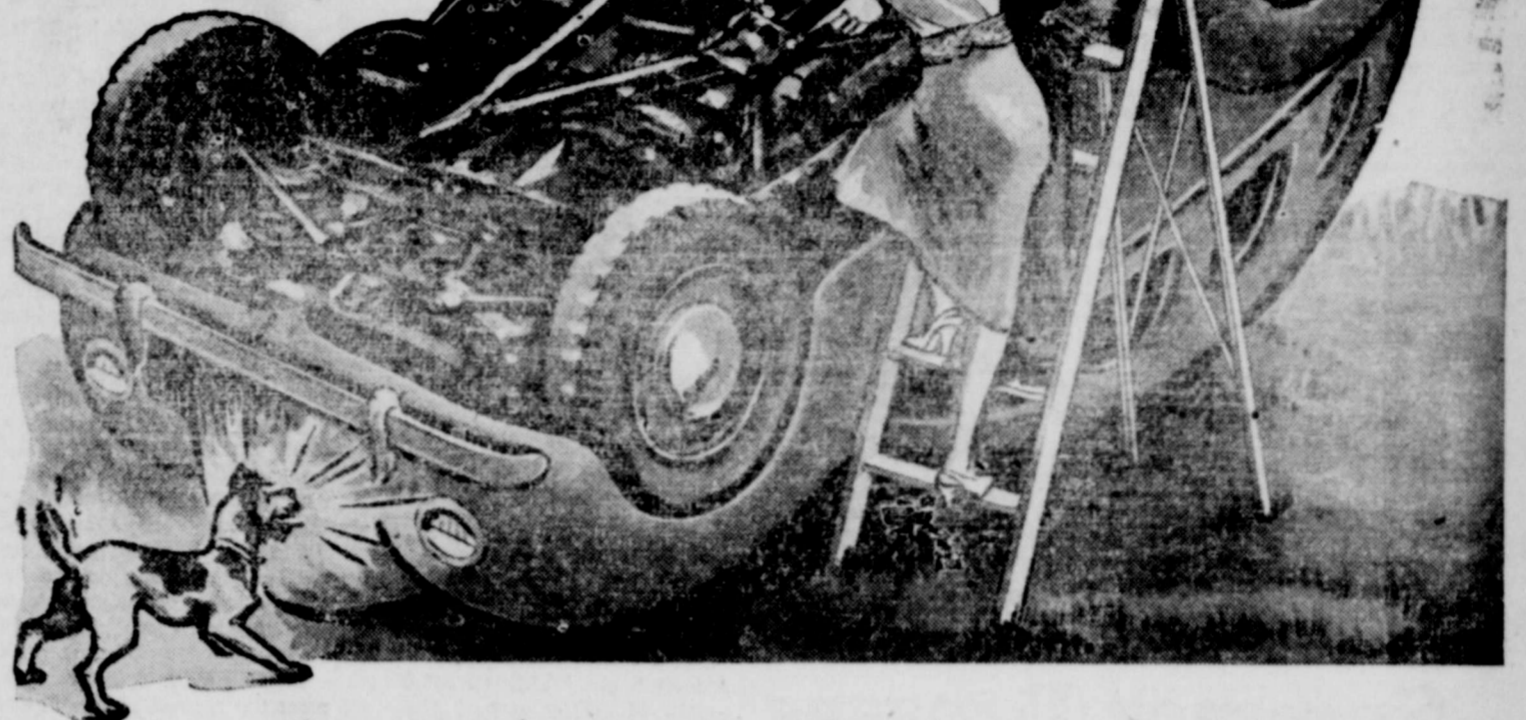

**MILK IS SOURCE OF  
UNDULANT FEVER**

As a safeguard against the serious and disabling disease known as undulant fever or Malta fever, milk only from approved sources. Undulant fever is usually acquired by human beings as a result of consuming raw milk or raw milk products from cows infected with Bang's disease.

Raw milk or milk products can be consumed with safety only when they are known to be produced by cows tested and found to be free of Bang's disease. Pasteurization, of course, will kill the germs if present.

To lower the incidence of undulant fever all dairyman are asked to cooperate with the State Department of Health by removing cattle infected with Bang's disease from their herds as soon as the disease is discovered. Even if the milk is made safe for human consumption by pasteurization, infected cows are still a menace to health since they can transmit the

disease to healthy animals and to their owner and other persons who handle them.

"Undulant fever," Dr. Cox said, "is one health menace we can eradicate in our State through absolutely safe milk supplies from dairy herds free from Bang's disease."

"Unless a herd is known to be free from this infection, only pasteurized milk should be used so that the disease cannot be passed on to the consumer of milk and dairy products"

**U. S. MARITIME SERVICE  
PHYSICAL REQUIREMENTS  
MODIFIED**

Lt. (jg) A. F. Thomson, Regional Enrolling Officer for the 10th Area of the United States Maritime Service was notified today by the Medical Section of National Headquarters that the physical standards for apprentice seamen enrollments has been modified to permit the enrollment of men with a minimum weight of one hundred and twenty (120) pounds Formerly the minimum weight was one hundred and thirty (130) pounds.

Lt. Thomson pointed out that this modification was made in view of the urgent need of men at this time. He hopes that this modification of physical requirements will aid materially in the efforts to meet the recruiting quota of two hundred (200) men per week which has been assigned this area. Eligible men, 17 to 50, who can meet the revised physical requirements should apply immediately to the United States Maritime Service Enrolling Office in Houston, Dallas, Galveston, or Port Arthur, Texas.

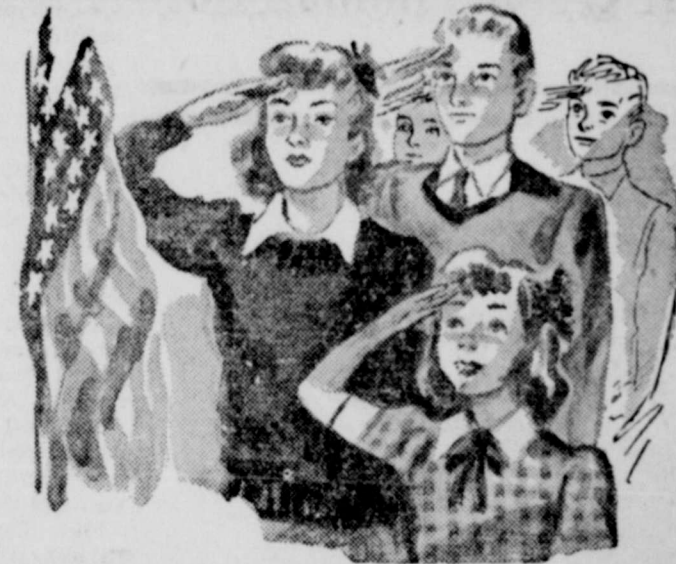
