

Delayed Letter From Wm. Curby, Jap **Prisoner** of War

No word has as yet been received from Pvt. William W. Curby, who has been a prisoner of the Japs since the fall of Corrigidor. He has been at Camp Osaka, which was liberated several weeks ago. The following letter to Mrs. Stodghill was undated and so, of course may be many months, or even years since it was written:

Dear Mother Stodghill: I thought I would drop

you a few lines to let you know I was still alive and kicking.

I guess Bill Edd and R. H. are in the army also, and the two little boys are still going to school. So far my health is fine and I am feeling Okay, working every day. I hope Pop Stodghill is doing the same. If you ever see Fornie, and them, tell them "hello" for me. I have written several times but never received an answer. Well I must close, As ever, -Bill






