

Wheat Prospect Given Big Boost

Definitely breaking the drouth and getting wheat off to a big start for a bumper crop, two snows and a slow, 10-hour drizzle over the past six days soaked farm and ranch lands in Briscoe County. It was the first moisture of any consequence since last October 1. Precipitation for the spell, according to Weatherman Ray Bomar, amounted to 1.1 inches, but coming under ideal conditions it was equivalent to at least a two-inch rain, farmers and stockmen said.

Starting off last Thursday with .22 of an inch moisture when a good, wet snow blanketed the county a slow rain set in early Monday and fell most of the day. This moisture measured .29 of an inch, and by dark had turned into a heavy, wet snowfall.



NOTICE Tax Payers

PAY YOUR TAXES NOW AND SAVE YOURSELF TIME

Your 1945 TAXES are now due and must be paid before the first day of February, 1946, to avoid penalty. Both men and women are required to pay their poll tax. Unpaid poll taxes are a lien upon any real or personal property you may own, or come into possession of.

Those who were 60 years of age or more on January 1, 1945 are not required to have an exemption to vote; those who have moved into the county since January 1, 1945 are required to have an exemption; those who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1945 or will become 21 before election are required to secure an exemption certificate during January, 1946, before they may vote in any of the elections during the year; no charge is made for these exemptions.

In 1946 automobile license fees cannot be paid before February 1st, 1946, but must be paid between February 1st and April 1st, 1946.



The Committee points out that this difference of \$14 per acre in favor of cotton was made during a season very unfavorable for the crop, and despite the fact that the 1945 lint yield in Texas was only 146 pounds per acre, or 103 pounds less than the United States average of 249.6 pounds per acre.

"By following practices that will increase acre yields and improve cotton quality, such as the sevenpoint program recommended by the Extension Service, Texas farmers in 1946 can greatly increase the acre value of their cotton and their net income," the Committee added. "No other state has a greater opportunity than Texas has for soil building, use of better planting seed, control of insects and diseases, and other practices that will make cotton more productive Training Union and profitable.
