## Lady Mules Face Perryton Friday, 7 p.m., at Tascosa

The Muleshoe Lady Mules will open post-season play Friday in Amarillo when they take on the Perryton Lady Rangers at 7 p.m. in the Tascosa High School Activity Center.

The Lady Mules, the District 2-3A champions at 20-9 overall and 8-2 in the

league, clinched their first district championship in 32 years last week with a victory over Dimmitt in the final game of the regular season.

Perryton comes into the contest at 16-10 as the runner-up from District 1-3A. The Lady Rangers finished second behind top-ranked Canyon.

In the other bi-district contest affecting a 2-3A team, the Tulia Lady Hornets will take on Canyon, with the time and site still to be arranged. Tulia survived a three-way shootout for the second seeding from 2-3A earlier this week.

After losing its final two regular-season games to drop

into a tie for second place in the district, Tulia beat Littlefield 50-44 Monday night in Abernathy, then downed Friona 45-31 Tuesday night (also in Abernathy) to earn the playoff spot. The Lady Hornets, one of two district teams to beat the Lady Mules this season, improved

to 22-9. Canyon, Tulia's bi-district opponent, is 26-3 overall. The Lady Eagles eliminated the Lady Mules from the state playoff picture last season in the bi-district round.

In other Class 3A bi-district games this weekend, Slaton (28-4) takes on Bowie (25-5)

excluded for consideration for an award. This rule also applies to the manager and his immediate family.

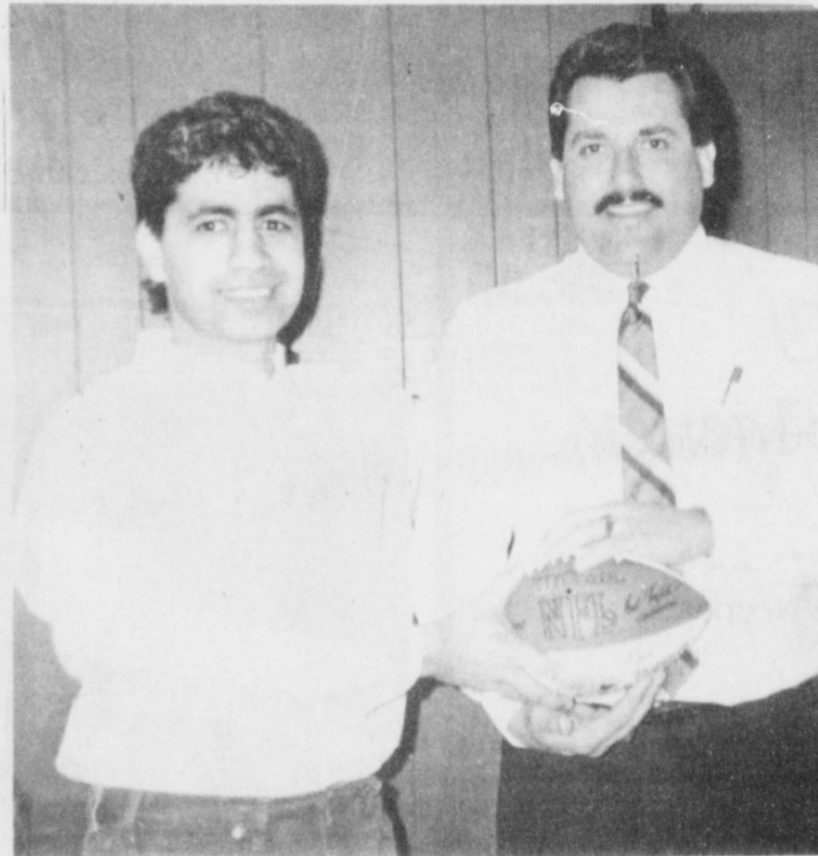
An individual may receive an award he/she has previously received provided a lapse of five (5) years has occurred since the individual's last recognition.

## Moisture needed to bring B.C. soils to field capacity

Bailey County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 need four to eight inches of water from precipitation and/or irrigation to bring the five foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before

the 1994 spring planting, according to pre-plant soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the USDA Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS).

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron

probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube at each monitoring site in the Water District. These sites are chosen based upon the soil type, the variations in the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indi-

cates possible well yields, and typical farming operations in the area.

Soil moisture sites were also analyzed by crop type. For cotton, soil moisture readings indicate an average of 0.20 inches per foot in the top three

feet, increasing to 0.70 inches at the five foot depth.

Sorghum shows an average of 0.35 inches of available soil moisture per foot in the top three feet, increasing to 0.75 in

## Scientists work to identify virus in corn and wheat

Texas A&M University scientists studying a new virus being reported in wheat and corn fields scattered across the Great Plains say it doesn't readily fit existing groups of known plant viruses. And there isn't enough information to tell the economic impact of the disease, they say.

The virus first appeared last June in silage and sweet corn in the Texas Panhandle. Infected plants were yellowed and severely stunted. Diseased corn samples were sent to several laboratories for diagnosis. Tests ruled out maize dwarf mosaic, wheat streak mosaic and several other vi-

ruses.

By October, the virus was found on plants in many Texas Panhandle wheat fields. Plants appeared yellowed or streaked and stunted. Incidence also has been reported in a wheat field in Kansas.

The fact that the virus has appeared on some plants in corn

and wheat fields in so many states may indicate it has been present for some time but was favored last Spring by a particular set of environmental conditions in corn which made it obvious, they said.

This could also indicate the virus may not ordinarily have a

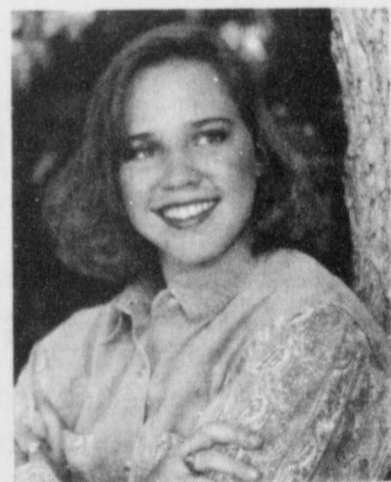
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## Redwine among finalists

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## E.N.M.U. receives grant

PORTALES - The Eastern New Mexico University Department of Physical Sciences and Mathematical Science and Technology recently received a \$25,000 grant designed to increase participation by minority students in the Physical Science, Mathematics and Engineering fields at ENMU.

Dr. John W. Kenney and Dr. Regina Aragon have created five programs to help benefit the minority community of New Mexico and also at ENMU.

A solid program of academic performance tracking of all minority science, engineering and mathematics (SEM) students at ENMU will be established based upon multiple contacts between the minority SEM student and his/her advisor.

This, Dr. Kenney, believes, will "help minorities reach a higher level of excellence, academically and professionally."

A Minority Visiting SEM Professionals Program will be initiated to provide minority SEM students direct contact with successful minority SEM professionals.

A Peer Role Model Research Program will be started with an emphasis on chemistry in 1994. This will give students access to successful minorities in their desired field of research.

A Minority SEM Student Advisory Committee will be established to provide feedback

on minority SEM Programs, activities and the needs at ENMU.

Critical to the SEM Program at ENMU is the Summer Bridge Program in Mathematics. There is a need for a strong basic mathematical background for science participation.

In the summer, ENMU will offer a program designed to bring 15 potential SEM minority students (1994 high school graduates) to a college algebra level of proficiency. Students will be taught in four intensive weeks by a minority math-

ematics professor fundamental skills of college algebra.

Students will receive college credit for Mathematics 110. It will also feature field trips to national laboratories and high tech industries in New Mexico plus a number of on-campus demonstrations and tours.

This program will require an application process and is open to minority students in New Mexico with an emphasis on the southeastern region.

This is awarded through a scholarship which pays for the entire program. However, it is only available to 15 students.

ENMU will actively advertise its SEM programs to prospective minority students through visits by ENMU recruiters to high schools, mailings, personal contacts with peer minority recruiters and campus visits.

ENMU will develop special brochures and mailings detailing opportunities that specifically target prospective minority SEM students, parents and teachers.

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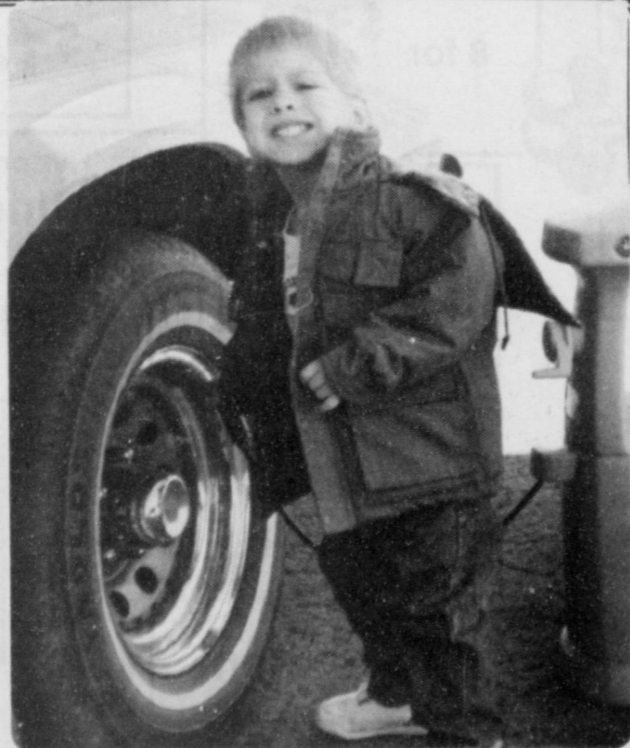

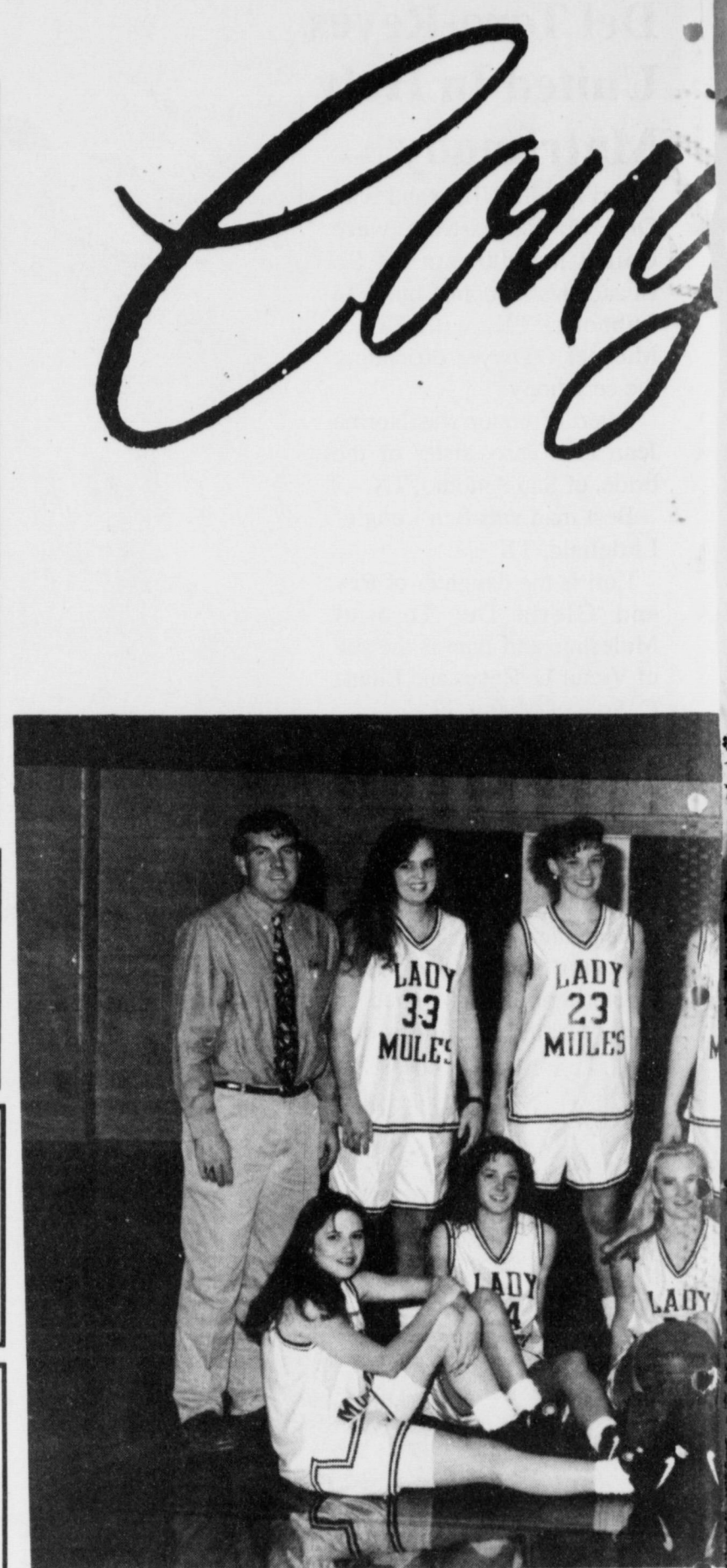

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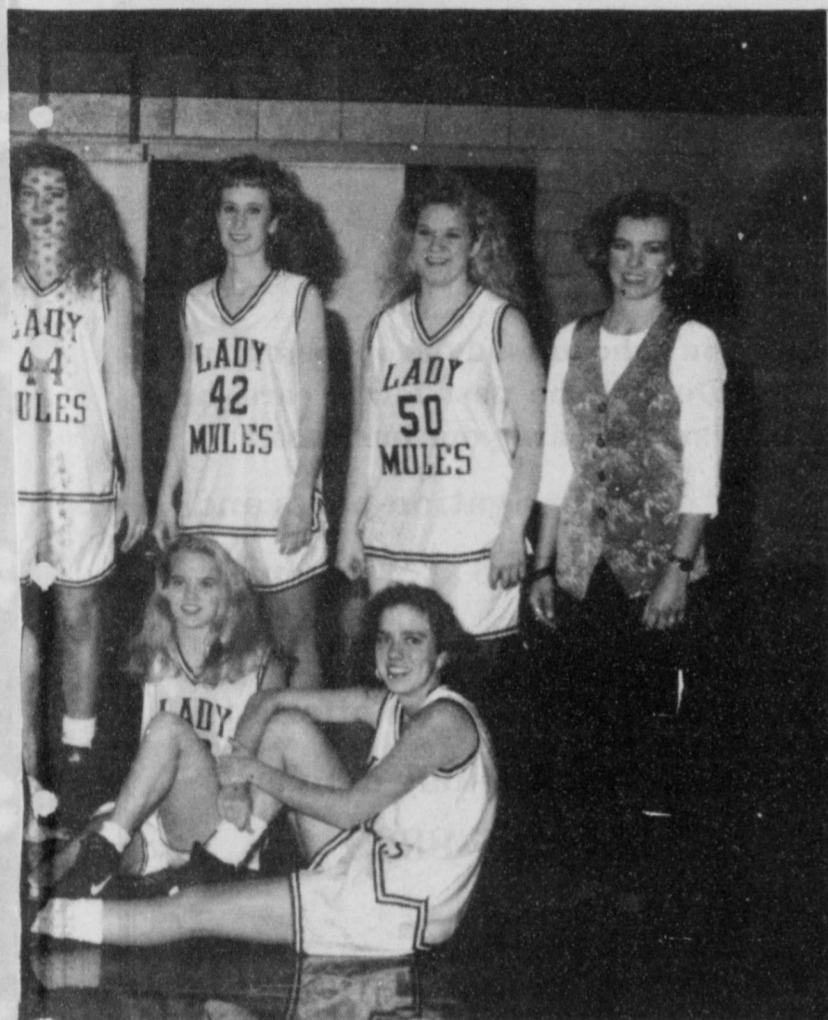

major economic impact on wheat, although it had a serious effect last year on infected sweet corn. But scientists stress this is purely speculative at this point.

Initially, plant pathologists in Nebraska, Kansas, and Texas tentatively labeled the virus as a tenuivirus. Laboratory tests of infected corn specimens showed some similarities to tenuivirus.

But Dr. Nancy Robertson, virologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at College Station, says subsequent tests have failed to positively link the "new" virus to the tenui group.

"The only connection is that the coat protein fits the size of a tenuivirus," she said.

Scientists at A&M, the University of Nebraska and Kan-

sas State University haven't been able to mechanically transmit the disease to healthy plants. This suggests it is transmitted by an insect.

To date, the insect which actually vectors the virus is

unknown. All diseases caused by tenuiviruses are vectored by planthoppers. Last season in the Texas Panhandle, large infestations of leafhoppers, a totally different insect than planthoppers, were found in fields with diseased plants leading some people to speculate that leafhoppers might be associated with the disease, noted Dr. Brent Bean, Texas Agricultural Extension Service agronomist in Amarillo.

"Virologists working with tenuiviruses say only planthoppers can vector the disease, but I suppose there's always a first time," Robertson added.

The late appearance of the disease last season has handicapped research according to Dr. Charles Rush, Experiment

Station plant pathologist at Amarillo.

"By the time we knew there was something different in corn, all the sweet corn had been harvested," he said. And, wheat had gone dormant only a few weeks after Dr. Robertson began finding specimens in scattered fields, noted Rush.

Dr. Harold Kaufman, Extension Service plant pathologist at Lubbock, suggested that the virus might be endemic and that the more obvious appearance of symptoms last year might have been due to environmental conditions that favored the virus or vector.

"Not all of the yellow wheat in Texas is because of a new virus," said Dr. David Worrall, Experiment Station wheat breeder at Vernon. "We've had

a relatively warm, breezy winter with little or no precipitation and when moisture is limited, wheat plants tend to sluff off older vegetation," He explained. Older leaves turn yellow before they die. Other factors, such as greenbug feeding and leaf rust, another disease, also cause yellowing.

"It has been amazing how rapidly our yellow wheat much of which was assumed to be

virus-infected' turned green following recent meager showers of only one-tenth to three-tenths inch, Worrall said.

Scientists are watching the situation closely and will continue monitoring and characterizing the virus. They are saying simply not enough is known about the disease to make predictions about its economic impact.

the next two feet. Wheat shows 0.70 inches available in the top foot of the soil, 0.40 inches at the three foot level, and 0.70 inches at the five foot layer.

Corn has the highest available soil moisture due to irrigation. The top foot of the soil shows 0.90 inches of available soil moisture, 0.60 at the three foot level, and 1.10 inches at the four and five foot levels.

Generally, each foot of soil holds two inches of soil moisture or a total of about 10 inches in the five foot root zone soil profile.

Data was collected at the Bailey County soil moisture sites in late November and early

December. Since then, very little precipitation has fallen to replenish the soil moisture. Recent snows have added small amounts of moisture, but farmers are encouraged to check moisture conditions at the two and three foot levels.

Historical data shows that above average crop yields are more likely when the five foot root zone soil profile is at or near field capacity at planting. Any precipitation received between now and the start of planting will improve soil moisture conditions and influence prospective crop yields.

Furrow diking will help maximize the benefits of any

rainfall that occurs prior to spring planting. Maintaining furrow dikes during the growing season will continue to benefit crops by keeping rainfall on the field to be soaked into the soil.

The annual pre-plant soil moisture survey data informs irrigators about general plant-available soil moisture conditions across the 15 county Water District service area.

"Irrigators can use this information to estimate the amount of water needed to bring their soil to field capacity without over-irrigation. Producers should remember

that this information reflects general soil moisture trends and should not be used in place of individual testing on their farms," says Wilfred E. "Willie" Crenweige, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist.

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


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# Muleshoe Volunteer Fire Department News

## Bailey County Commissioners Court Meets

The Bailey County Commissioners Court on Monday approved a request by Danny and Pamela Sue Shipman to exchange deeds made in 1947 for an easement on their property.

According to Butch Vandiver, Commissioner for Precinct #1, Shipman was deeded this property some time ago but there was a previous deed in which the county was also deeded this land for a road so the two legal descriptions overlapped.

Shipman was basically asking the county to deed the portion of the property back to him that is already in his deed. In exchange for the deed though, Shipman said he would allow the county easement to the same property where the road is.

Vandiver said, "He (Shipman) has sold this property and in his deed, the property was back about 2/10 of an acre. So it is just a few feet off of the road that will be deeded back to him."

Shipman's property is located on the south part of Section 83, Block Y, W, D and F, W. Johnson Subdivision.

The Commission on Monday also reviewed proposed amendments to the Personnel Policy & Employee Manual to incorporate changes suggested by the Texas Association of Counties.

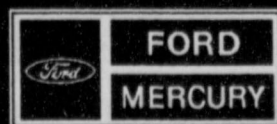

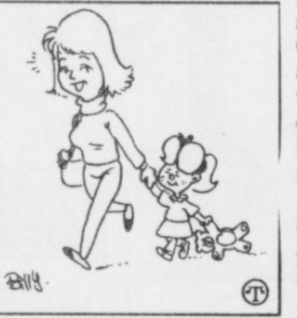

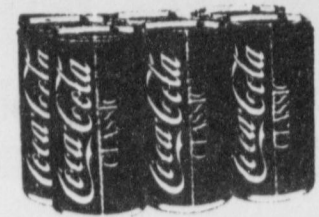
