

These flours or meals are sifted or mixed with the wheat flour and then the bread is made by the standard method for white bread offered in any reliable

In using potatoes in bread, both the proportions and the method of mixing are different. Only a mall quantity of potato can be potatoes to five or six cups o flour. The mashed potato is thinned with potato water, then mixed with the softened yeast cake before the flour is stirred in to the sponge with the flour.
