



#### FIRST BALE OF 1946 COTTON REACHED LUBBOCK GIN THURSDAY, AUGUST 15

L. L. Rucker, tenant on the A. M. Pfluger farm 12 miles east of Lubbock, received a \$50 award from the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce today for the first reported bale of cotton grown and ginned in Lubbock county.

Rucker brought the bale to Jones and McCoy Gin Company. Lubbock, where it was ginned at 5:30 p.m., August 15, three weeks earlier than last year's first bale. Rucker has about 90 acres of "dry land" cotton, it was said, and planted about April 9. He lives two miles south of Roosevelt school.

Last year's first bale was brought in September 5 by Ernest Exum from the J. E. Vickers farm, Lubbock, route 3. Exum received a \$50 reward and the bale was sold at auction here for 21 cents a pound.

It is expected that Rucker will sell his prize-winning bale around August 20.

States acquired sovereignty over the Philippines as a result of the Treaty of Peace with Spain, December 10, 1898, and obtained such sovereignty and exercised urisdiction and control over said Islands and people for 48 years. In March of 1934, the Philippines Independence Act was approved by Congress by which we should relinquish sovereignty except for the retention of certain naval and military bases which were deemed necessary for our future pro-

It was July 3 at Manila with the Independence Day celebration scheduled for the same day as our own Independence Day, July 4. In spite of the fact it was 3 a.m. and in spite of the downpour, we were met by Commissioner Paul McNutt who has spent many years in the Islands. Driving through the darkness into downtown Manila, we could see the shambles left of many buildings by the Japanese when our forces returned. As you will recall, Mac-Arthur had declared Manila an open city when our forces retired to Bataan and Corregidor but the Japanese had elected to fight it out in the return engagement. Consequently, most of Manila was badly shot up. In the Manila hotel for example, our forces had to eliminate the Japs from floor to floor and room to room with the result that bullet holes are still heavily scattered all over the place and one wing virtually demolished.
