High production and higher incomes explain the paradox-how this country could eat more meat and at the same time ship quantities to its armed services and to its war-time allies, according to Tyrus R. Timm, economist in farm management for the A. and M. college extension service, who compiled the report from U. S. D. A. reports.

One trend in the report of importance to Texas farm families is the increase in the amount of poultry products eaten by the average person Per capita consumption of turkey in 1945 was 65 per cent above the figure for 1935-39. Consumption of chicken was up 41 per cent and of eggs 31 per cent.
