He who was about to wash his disciples feet was fully conscious who he was, whence he came. what his power was, and where he was going.

Verse 3 gives us a clear view of our Lord's knowledge of himself as divine, sent by the Father and to return to him. He was conscious that he was King of kings and Lord of lords-all things had been put into his hands.

What followed would seem to be a mistake—a misfit in the pattern of the life of a being so great as the one described in verse 3except for the fact that it was Jesus of whom it was said.

When he resumed his place at the table. Jesus faced a humbled and ashamed group of men ready to have driven home to their On the eve of his crucifixion hearts the powerful meaning of the example which had been set before them.

They called him Lord and Mas ter, and he agreed that they were right. Now he had set them a pattern of lowly service. They had already sensed the rebuke involved, so he stressed only the positive side, the need for them to do what he had done.

It is one thing to understand what has been taught, it is another thing to put into practice. Jesus conditioned his blessing on the doing, rather than the hearing (see vv. 16, 17).

We are told in James 1:22 that the one who is a hearer of the Word and not a doer of it is selfdeceived. He is fooling himself about his supposed spiritual progress. God is not deceived by it, and usually his fellow men are not deceived by his profession of what he does not have. How sad then to go on deceiving himself and how foolish.

III. Command (wv. 34, 35). It is really not a matter of choice for the believer whether he will live in the light of this great example-it is a commandment of God. Oh, yes, it is a commandment of love but that makes it not less but more binding on us

who believe in Christ. By act and example he set before his disciples the great and new commandment of love, ex-
