When Bossy refuses to eat grass, farmers in India think nothing of it. ### The Forces Of Freedom . . .

It is estimated that there are more men under arms now than shortly before the Second World War. Save in the Western Hemisphere, there is no real peace anywhere on earth. Violence, disorder, oppression—these are the symbols of the postwar world. And, as inevitably occurs in an age of suspicion and unrest, the liberties of peoples everywhere are being limited and destroyed.

The position of the United States in this dark and dangerous time is clear. We, with a handful of allies, none of whom are economically or militarily powerful, are the last citadel of individual freedom. With few exceptions, the English speaking world alone still maintains and respects the basic rights of man—and even in that world there are ominous signs of weakening. The American government, in its dealing with the other powers, is the leader of the forces of freedom against the forces of darkness and the total state.

The duty of the United States is equally clear. To put it in a phrase, this duty is to maintain our strength. And strength can be divided into two different and distinct classifications. There is military strength—the strength of force. Much as Americans hate war and thought of war, we must maintain this, in the interest of self-preservation.

Second and still more vital, there is the kind of inner strength which only a free people can possess. This is the heart and soul of a nation and its institutions. It is a nation's greatest resource in time of trial. And it rests upon the proposition that the rights of the individual are inviolate. So long as we have this, we shall be ready to meet whatever the coming years bring.

## Veterans' News

Almost 230,000 disabled veterans of World War II now are in training under the provisions of the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16), the Veterans Administration has announced.

As of May 1, approximately 56 percent of those in training—or 128,877—were enrolled in recognized colleges, universities, and other educational institutions.

The remaining 44 per cent—or 100,769—were taking on-the-job training in business and industrial

establishments. To date, approximately 169,000 such establishments have been approved for this type training.

Since the inception of the vocational rehabilitation program in March, 1943, upwards of 8,500 disabled veterans have been declared rehabilitated, VA said.

Disabled veterans in training by states included: Texas, 14,306; Louisiana, 3,248; and Mississippi, 3,978.

God can bring blessing out of the most unpromising of circumstances. Yes, and men can make chaos out of God's greatest gifts.

surrounded by godly counselors who helped him become an outstanding ruler for God.

II. A Book Found and Read (22:10, 11; 23:1, 2).

The Word of God had been neglected for about sixty years. How sad! Yes and how sad that in our homes the Bible is so often neglected—on a book shelf, or in a trunk, or gathering dust on a living room table.

Observe that they not only found the book, but they read it. That was true of the ones who found it as well as those to whom they passed it on.

In Josiah's day it was thus first received

1. By the King. The ruler of rulers of the people need to return to God's Word in our day. It is all too often neglected in the council chambers of the nations.

Josiah was moved by what he read to real repentance. He realized that the judgment of God must come. Inquiry at Jerusalem brought word from Huldah the prophetess that it would come, but not in Josiah's day.

The king was not content to keep this word to himself, and insisted that it be read

2. By the religious leaders.

The priests and the prophets who were doubly guilty in neglecting it were now brought face to face with God's revelation.

Who will say that the great need in America is not just this, that its preachers and denominational leaders get back to the reading and teaching of God's Word. Book reviews, lectures in economics and politics, discussions of one world—almost anything but the Bible.

Josiah knew what was needed and the Word was now read

3. By the people.

Applying that to our day, it is true that the Bible is our best seller, that it is available to every home, and that most decent households have not one but many Bibles. But are they being read? The answer is obviously no.

II. A Book Believed and Practiced (23:3-5, 21).

Josiah saw that it was not enough to read and rejoice over the Word of God. Something must be done about it, and he did it.

1. The king made a covenant with God.

Standing in a prominent place before his people, he humbly and solemnly renewed his consecration to the Lord, and promised to abide by his Word with all his heart and soul (v. 3). Such a leader could not but inspire his people to do the same.

What a blessing it is to us when we hear of some man prominent in the affairs of the nation or state who loves the Lord, and keeps his commandments. He is not only an inspiring example, but a real witness for God.

2. The priests cast out the idols (vv. 4, 5).

The king required this of them, and they proceeded thus to cleanse the places of worship and prepare the way for a true devotion to God.

Here again we say that when religious leaders get back to their first devotion to God and put away the empty philosophies of this world, we shall see a revival.

What did the people do? Josiah saw that they needed some positive expression of their faith. It was not enough to tear down the idols; they must re-establish the true worship of God. So we find that

3. The people kept the Passover. This was the great feast of the Jews which spoke of redemption from bondage. It pointed forward to Christ the Redeemer from sin. He is our Passover (I Cor. 5:7).

In these dark and bewildering days people are looking to Christian leaders to prepare a feast of remembrance of the death of Christ and of his glorious redemption. Let the people gather round him and, cleansed by his precious blood, keep the feast with joy and purity of heart (I Cor. 5:8).

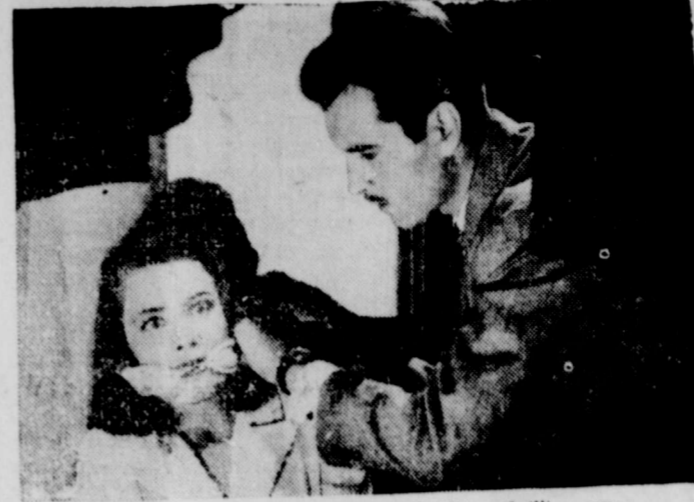

**Weekly SURPLUS NEWS WAA**

Continual replenishing of furniture articles on sale as set aside items to veterans will afford a wide selection for purchasers until June 25, according to officials of the Grand Prairie office of War Assets Administration. Sales will continue to be made daily, Monday through Friday, to World War II Veterans on presentation of discharges or other service proof. Each veteran may buy one each of desks, chairs, file cabinets and other items of office equipment on a fixed price basis.

Hundreds of veterans in attendance at the opening day of the furniture sale expressed warm approval of a new registration plan by which veterans are enabled to buy during successive days of the sale. The attending veterans are given registration numbers by which they are able to determine their own order of purchase. Sales are rationed at the rate of 150 a

day. Leroy Young, veteran of Foreign Wars representative of Grand Prairie, who supervised a drawing to set up the first day's registration, said the plan seemed to be the fairest method possible for the large number of veterans in the region.

Paint in large quantities was "tight" in the Dallas region and was moving slowly in Spokane, Washington. As the result of the cooperation through the Customer Service Center between WAA regions, 70,000 gallons of the paint at Spokane was sold to a Dallas dealer. Items scarce in one region are sometimes more plentiful in others. The regions are cooperating through the Customer Service Centers to make merchandise available to purchasers over the nation.

Unused nylon marquisette netting and nylon tricot netting which cost the government \$3,000,000 will be offered for sale by the War Assets Administration in a nationwide sale now in progress and which will close June 23. Samples of the netting may be seen at the Customers Service Center of the Grand Prairie regional office of WAA. The surplus netting is being offered at fixed prices of 15 cents a yard for the marquisette and 12 cents a yard for the tricot respectively.

**Q. At what age should roosts be provided for chicks?**  
A. By the time chicks are three weeks old, low roosts protected by wire should be in place. Teaching chicks to roost early avoids crowding and piling up, thus encouraging fast, uniform growth.

**Q. What is the best time to apply 2-4-D to wheat and oat fields?**  
A. Apply 2-4-D when weeds are small. Spray after the grain has three or four leaves but before the stem begins to elongate. Grain should not be sprayed after the heads begin to show. The earlier the spraying is done within this period, the smaller the weeds will be and the easier they will be killed.

**Q. Why should dairy cows be fed a special ration during the dry period?**  
A. It is especially important that the dry cow be fed a special grain ration high in minerals and vitamins, since a high producing cow is unable to consume enough food nutrients to nourish the unborn calf, produce a heavy flow

of milk, and keep up its body.  
Records at the Research Farm of  
the Ralston Purina Company show  
that each pound of condition dur-  
ing the 60 day dry period will give  
the following amounts of extra  
milk during the next lactation  
period:

- 15 lbs. of extra milk for Jerseys
- 20 lbs. of extra milk for Guernseys
- 25 lbs. extra milk for Holsteins

**Q. I have been told that late hatched pullets will not lay as many eggs as early hatched pullets. Why is this?**  
A. Although this belief is held by many, actually there is no truth in it. Late hatched chickens, if raised on a program of good breeding, sound management, careful sanitation, and good feeding, will produce as many eggs as early hatched chicks raised on the same program. Of course, the peak production for late hatched chicks will come later in the year.

**Polio Occuring in Certain Sections of The State Now**

Dr. George W. Cox, State health officer, has issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and prevention of poliomyelitis which is now occurring in certain sections of the State.

At one time it was generally believed that this infection was transmitted primarily by discharges from the respiratory tract. It is now believed that poliomyelitis may be another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measures must include clean-up campaigns and improvements in sanitation.

Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate house-flies, mosquitoes, and rodents to destroy their breeding places. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems, and secure safe water supplies. Where adequate municipal sewage disposal systems are not in operation, it is necessary to install and maintain sanitary septic tanks and outdoor privies.

All swimming pools should maintain those standards approved by the Texas State Department of Health. This includes maintenance of proper chlorine level. Where such standards are not maintained, those pools should be closed to the public.

All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use and protected from filth and insects. All food handling establishments should adhere strictly to the State law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils. Those restaurants with insufficient personnel to maintain approved sanitation, should close one or two hours a day so that employees can assist in maintaining cleanliness and high sanitation standards.

Approved milk supplies, rodent control measures, high sanitation standards, and strict personal hygiene are all important. Polio cases should be quarantined for 14 days and excreta from cases and contacts should be handled and disinfected with the same scrupulous care as in typhoid fever or bacillary dysentery.

Over-exertion in children should be avoided. Children should not visit homes where there is illness. It is advisable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts, especially in children during an outbreak of this disease. It is not advocated that schools, churches and theatres be closed.
