

In May, the President's Conference on Fire Prevention adopted an Action Program which should be put into effect in every state we hour delay. One of its essential proposals is that all governors amount statewide fire safety committees and that each state holds a far prevention conference to establish a practical line of action indered to its own particular needs.

The Action Program is all-inclusive. It contains recommendations. framed by the leading fire prevention experts of the nation, on such with matters as law enforcement, building construction, fire-fighting services, public education, and research. But it will be of no avail of states and communities fail to put it into effect. It offers the nation an epportunity-and it is up to the people to accept it.
