Most cattle classes sold strong to higher last week, but grass steers and yearlings lost 50 cents to a dollar at some places, and beef cows weakened at Fort Worth and Houston, Good beef cows brought \$13 to \$15.50 at Houston and San Antonio, \$15 50 to \$17 at Fort Worth and Wichita, and up to \$19 at Oklahoma City and Den-

Hogs gained generally 25 cents to \$1 or more for the week, but butcher hogs and sows dropped 25 to 50 cents at San Antonio, while stocker pigs fell sharply lower at Oklahoma City and Wichita. Late top was \$26.75 at San Antonio, \$27.75 at Fort Worth, \$28 at Oklahoma City, \$28.25 at Wichita, and \$29.50 at Denver.

Spot cotton prices declined \$3.75 to \$5.50 last week as liberal new crop offerings in South Texas eased the most urgent demand. Farmers sold less readily in Central and North Texas, where picking of some drough-opened cotton got started
